### MADAM PRESIDENT:

I offer the following resolution and move its adoption:

1 A SENATE RESOLUTION urging the legislative council 2 to assign the topic of providing an enhanced study on Black 3 history in each high school United States history course to the 4 appropriate study committee.

5 Whereas, The State of Indiana currently requires certain 6 topics, including the Holocaust, to be taught in public high 7 schools for students to obtain the Core 40 academic diploma;

8 Whereas, Black history is an underappreciated facet of 9 American history, including such important aspects as the 10 impacts of slavery and the Civil Rights Movement and the 11 Black contributions to the arts that define American culture;

12 Whereas, A comprehensive education regarding Black 13 Americans contributes to a better ability to empathize with 14 others, leading to an overall more cohesive and tolerant 15 society;

Whereas, Indiana has a distinct involvement in the political
and social history of Black individuals, as Indiana was a major
destination during the Underground Railroad in the 1800s as
well as the Great Migration in the early 1900s and was notable
