1 AN ACT relating to drug education.

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2 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:

- 3 → Section 1. KRS 156.160 is amended to read as follows:
- With the advice of the Local Superintendents Advisory Council, the Kentucky
 Board of Education shall promulgate administrative regulations establishing
 standards which school districts shall meet in student, program, service, and
 operational performance. These regulations shall comply with the expected
 outcomes for students and schools set forth in KRS 158.6451. Administrative
 regulations shall be promulgated for the following:
 - (a) Courses of study for the different grades and kinds of common schools identifying the common curriculum content directly tied to the goals, outcomes, and assessment strategies developed under KRS 158.645, 158.6451, and 158.6453 and distributed to local school districts and schools. The administrative regulations shall provide that:
 - If a school offers American sign language, the course shall be accepted
 as meeting the foreign language requirements in common schools
 notwithstanding other provisions of law; and
 - 2. If a school offers the Reserve Officers Training Corps program, the course shall be accepted as meeting the physical education requirement for high school graduation notwithstanding other provisions of law;
 - (b) Courses of study or educational experiences available to students in all middle and high schools to fulfill the prerequisites for courses in advanced science and mathematics as defined in KRS 158.845;
- 24 (c) The acquisition and use of educational equipment for the schools as 25 recommended by the Council for Education Technology;
- 26 (d) The minimum requirements for high school graduation in light of the expected outcomes for students and schools set forth in KRS 158.6451. Student scores

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1		from any assessment administered under KRS 158.6453 that are determined
2		by the National Technical Advisory Panel to be valid and reliable at the
3		individual level shall be included on the student transcript. The National
4		Technical Advisory Panel shall submit its determination to the commissioner
5		of education and the Legislative Research Commission;
6	(e)	The requirements for an alternative high school diploma for students with
7		disabilities whose individualized education program indicates that, in
8		accordance with 20 U.S.C. sec. 1414(d)(1)(A):
9		1. The student cannot participate in the regular statewide assessment; and
10		2. An appropriate alternate assessment has been selected for the student
11		based upon a modified curriculum and an individualized course of study;
12	(f)	Taking and keeping a school census, and the forms, blanks, and software to be
13		used in taking and keeping the census and in compiling the required reports.
14		The board shall create a statewide student identification numbering system
15		based on students' Social Security numbers. The system shall provide a
16		student identification number similar to, but distinct from, the Social Security
17		number, for each student who does not have a Social Security number or
18		whose parents or guardians choose not to disclose the Social Security number
19		for the student;
20	(g)	Sanitary and protective construction of public school buildings, toilets,
21		physical equipment of school grounds, school buildings, and classrooms. With
22		respect to physical standards of sanitary and protective construction for school
23		buildings, the Kentucky Board of Education shall adopt the Uniform State
24		Building Code;
25	(h)	Medical inspection, physical and health education and recreation, and other

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regulations necessary or advisable for the protection of the physical welfare

and safety of the public school children. The administrative regulations shall:

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1		<u>1.</u> Set requirements for student health standards to be met by all students in
2		grades four (4), eight (8), and twelve (12) pursuant to the outcomes
3		described in KRS 158.6451 <u>:[.]</u>
4		<u>2.</u> [The administrative regulations shall]Permit a student who received a
5		physical examination no more than six (6) months prior to his initial
6		admission to Head Start to substitute that physical examination for the
7		physical examination required by the Kentucky Board of Education of
8		all students upon initial admission to the public schools, if the physical
9		examination given in the Head Start program meets all the requirements
10		of the physical examinations prescribed by the Kentucky Board of
11		Education; and
12		3. Require appropriate physical and health education instruction
13		throughout elementary, middle, and high school levels in prescription
14		opioid abuse prevention, with an emphasis on the prescription drug
15		epidemic and the connection between prescription opioid abuse and
16		addiction to other drugs, such as heroin and synthetic drugs;
17	(i)	A vision examination by an optometrist or ophthalmologist that shall be
18		required by the Kentucky Board of Education. The administrative regulations
19		shall require evidence that a vision examination that meets the criteria
20		prescribed by the Kentucky Board of Education has been performed. This
21		evidence shall be submitted to the school no later than January 1 of the first
22		year that a three (3), four (4), five (5), or six (6) year-old child is enrolled in a
23		public school, public preschool, or Head Start program;
24	(j)	1. Beginning with the 2010-2011 school year, a dental screening or
25		examination by a dentist, dental hygienist, physician, registered nurse,
26		advanced practice registered nurse, or physician assistant that shall be
27		required by the Kentucky Board of Education. The administrative

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1			regulations shall require evidence that a dental screening or examination
2			that meets the criteria prescribed by the Kentucky Board of Education
3			has been performed. This evidence shall be submitted to the school no
4			later than January 1 of the first year that a five (5) or six (6) year-old
5			child is enrolled in a public school.
6			2. A child shall be referred to a licensed dentist if a dental screening or
7			examination performed by anyone other than a licensed dentist identifies
8			the possibility of dental disease;
9		(k)	The transportation of children to and from school;
10		(l)	The fixing of holidays on which schools may be closed and special days to be
11			observed, and the pay of teachers during absence because of sickness or
12			quarantine or when the schools are closed because of quarantine;
13		(m)	The preparation of budgets and salary schedules for the several school districts
14			under the management and control of the Kentucky Board of Education;
15		(n)	A uniform series of forms and blanks, educational and financial, including
16			forms of contracts, for use in the several school districts; and
17		(o)	The disposal of real and personal property owned by local boards of
18			education.
19	(2)	(a)	At the request of a local board of education or a school council, a local school
20			district superintendent shall request that the Kentucky Board of Education
21			waive any administrative regulation promulgated by that board. Beginning in
22			the 1996-97 school year, a request for waiver of any administrative regulation
23			shall be submitted to the Kentucky Board of Education in writing with
24			appropriate justification for the waiver. The Kentucky Board of Education
25			may approve the request when the school district or school has demonstrated
26			circumstances that may include but are not limited to the following:

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1. An alternative approach will achieve the same result required by the

1			administrative regulation;
2			2. Implementation of the administrative regulation will cause a hardship on
3			the school district or school or jeopardize the continuation or
4			development of programs; or
5			3. There is a finding of good cause for the waiver.
6		(b)	The following shall not be subject to waiver:
7			1. Administrative regulations relating to health and safety;
8			2. Administrative regulations relating to civil rights;
9			3. Administrative regulations required by federal law; and
10			4. Administrative regulations promulgated in accordance with KRS
11			158.6451, 158.6453, 158.6455, 158.685, and this section, relating to
12			measurement of performance outcomes and determination of successful
13			districts or schools, except upon issues relating to the grade
14			configuration of schools.
15		(c)	Any waiver granted under this subsection shall be subject to revocation upon a
16			determination by the Kentucky Board of Education that the school district or
17			school holding the waiver has subsequently failed to meet the intent of the
18			waiver.
19	(3)	Any	private, parochial, or church school may voluntarily comply with curriculum,
20		certi	fication, and textbook standards established by the Kentucky Board of
21		Edu	cation and be certified upon application to the board by such schools.
22	(4)	Any	public school that violates the provisions of KRS 158.854 shall be subject to a
23		pena	alty to be assessed by the commissioner of education as follows:
24		(a)	The first violation shall result in a fine of no less than one (1) week's revenue
25			from the sale of the competitive food;
26		(b)	Subsequent violations shall result in a fine of no less than one (1) month's

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revenue from the sale of the competitive food;

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1	(c)	"Habitual violations," which means five (5) or more violations within a six (6)
2		month period, shall result in a six (6) month ban on competitive food sales for
3		the violating school; and
4	(d)	Revenue collected as a result of the fines in this subsection shall be transferred
5		to the food service fund of the local school district.
6	→ Se	ection 2. No later than December 31, 2017, the Office of Drug Control Policy
7	shall deve	lop recommendations for the instruction in prescription opioid abuse prevention
8	that is req	uired for physical and health education under subsection (1)(h)3. of Section 1.
9	of this A	ct, and submit them to the Department of Education. Upon receiving the
10	recommen	dations, the Department shall publish them in a prominent location on the
11	Departmen	nt's Web site for use by school districts in developing their health curriculum.

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
