1 AN ACT relating to education. 2 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky: 3 → SECTION 1. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 158 IS CREATED TO 4 **READ AS FOLLOWS:** 5 As used in Sections 1 to 6 of this Act: 6 "Biological sex" means the physical condition of being male or female, as (1) 7 determined by a person's unambiguous internal and external genitalia or, if 8 necessary, sex chromosomes present at birth, and formally recognized on the 9 person's original birth certificate or the child's school enrollment documentation; "Child" means a person who has not reached the age of eighteen (18); 10 (2)"Community standard state of dress" means the condition of being fully clothed, 11 **(3)** 12 or partially or fully unclothed in which the bodily coverage by opaque clothing is 13 appropriate as determined by the average adult citizen of the Commonwealth 14 applying contemporary community standards of what is appropriate dress, given: 15 (a) The age, biological sex, and other demographic factors of the unclothed 16 person; (b) The age, biological sex, familial relation, and other demographic factors of 17 persons able to view the person within the situational context; and 18 19 (c) The conditions of expectation of privacy within the situational context; 20 "Parent" means any biological, foster, or adoptive parent, de facto custodian as (4) 21 defined in KRS 403.270, legal guardian who has legal custody of a child, or any 22 adult caregiver authorized to make school-related decisions for a child under KRS 158.144, whose custody of the child has not been suspended or terminated 23 24 by a court order; "Public school" means any school district or public charter school organization, 25 (5) any public school operated by those entities, the governing boards of those 26 27 entities, and the employees, agents, and officers of those entities; and

1	(6) "School enrollment documentation" means either:
2	(a) A certified copy of the child's birth certificate; or
3	(b) Other reliable proof of the child's identity, age, and biological sex and an
4	affidavit of the inability to produce a copy of the birth certificate as provided
5	upon enrollment of the child for the first time in any primary or secondary
6	school to fulfill the requirements of KRS 158.032.
7	→ SECTION 2. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 158 IS CREATED TO
8	READ AS FOLLOWS:
9	(1) As it relates to public education, the General Assembly hereby finds and declares
10	that:
11	(a) A parent of a child shall have the fundamental right to make decisions
12	concerning the child's care, custody, and control without obstruction or
13	interference from a public school. As it relates to public schools, this shall
14	include the:
15	1. Right to make decisions concerning the child's education, including
16	the right to cause the child to be educated in any manner that meets
17	the compulsory attendance requirements and exemptions established
18	in KRS 159.010 and 159.030 and in any other manner established by
19	statute or the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Kentucky; and
20	2. High duty and right to nurture and direct their children's destiny,
21	including their upbringing and education; mental, emotional, and
22	physical health care; and moral and religious development;
23	(b) The interests and role of parents in the care, custody, and control of their
24	children are implicit in the concept of ordered liberty, deeply embedded in
25	our nation's history and tradition, and among the unalienable rights
26	retained by the people under the Ninth Amendment to the Constitution of
27	the United States;

1		(c) A parent of a child in this Commonwealth has inalienable rights that are
2		more comprehensive than those listed in Sections 1 to 6 of this Act, unless
3		such rights have been lawfully waived or terminated;
4		(d) The Commonwealth has independent authority to protect the parental rights
5		of its citizens; and
6		(e) The rights recognized and the protections established in Sections 1 to 6 of
7		this Act as they are related to public school are rooted in the right to due
8		process of law guaranteed pursuant to the Constitution of the United States.
9	(2)	The public schools of the Commonwealth shall not violate a parent's
10		fundamental rights identified in Sections 1 to 6 of this Act. Any restriction of or
11		interference with these rights shall not be upheld unless it is demonstrated by
12		<u>clear and convincing evidence to be:</u>
13		(a) Essential to further a compelling governmental interest; and
14		(b) The least restrictive means available for the furthering of that compelling
15		governmental interest.
16	<u>(3)</u>	To guard the rights established in Sections 1 to 6 of this Act, each local board of
17		education and charter school board of directors shall establish a process to
18		receive complaints regarding violations of those rights that includes:
19		(a) A designated recipient of complaints for each school;
20		(b) The procedure for submission of the complaint;
21		(c) Written confirmation to the parent that the complaint has been received
22		within five (5) business days of receipt of the complaint;
23		(d) A written response to the complaint within thirty (30) business days of
24		receipt of the complaint that outlines how the school will resolve the
25		complaint or a written statement of the specific reasons for not resolving the
26		<u>complaint; and</u>
27		(e) A final written determination of the merits of the complaint and the actions

1			taken, if any, by the school to resolve the complaint within sixty (60) days
2			following the receipt of the complaint or the basis for taking no action.
3	<u>(4)</u>	(a)	After exhausting the complaint process established in subsection (3) of this
4			section without satisfactory resolution, or if the school does not issue the
5			final written determination within the time established under subsection (3)
6			of this section, a parent shall have a civil cause of action.
7		<u>(b)</u>	The complaint shall be filed within sixty (60) days of the school's failure to
8			comply within the time established under subsection (3) of this section or
9			within sixty (60) days of the final written determination, whichever occurs
10			<u>last.</u>
11		<u>(c)</u>	The action shall be brought in the Circuit Court of the county in which the
12			school is located or the parent resides.
13		<u>(d)</u>	Remedies available to a parent under this subsection shall include:
14			1. Declaratory relief;
15			2. Injunctive relief to prevent or remedy a violation of Sections 1 to 6 of
16			this Act or the effects of such a violation;
17			3. Compensatory damages for pecuniary or nonpecuniary losses;
18			4. Reasonable attorney's fees and costs; and
19			5. Any other appropriate relief.
20		<u>(e)</u>	If a parent brings an unsuccessful civil action against a public school, the
21			parent shall not be required to pay any associated attorney's fees or costs
22			incurred by the public school.
23		<u>(f)</u>	All claims shall be initiated within one (1) year of the violation.
24	(5)	Noth	hing in Sections 1 to 6 of this Act shall be construed:
25		<u>(a)</u>	To prescribe all rights held by the parent of a child in this state; or
26		<u>(b)</u>	As altering the established presumption in favor of the constitutionality of
27			statutes and regulations.

1	<u>(6)</u>	Any portion or section of Sections 1 to 6 of this Act declared invalid shall not
2		affect the validity of the remaining portions or sections of Sections 1 to 6 of this
3		<u>Act.</u>
4		→SECTION 3. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 158 IS CREATED TO
5	REA	AD AS FOLLOWS:
6	<u>(1)</u>	In accordance with Section 2 of this Act, a parent shall have the following rights
7		as they relate to the parent's child and a public school:
8		(a) To access and review:
9		1. All education records relating to his or her minor child as provided in
10		<u>KRS 160.700 to 160.730;</u>
11		2. Any record associated with the selection or approval of any guest
12		lecturer, guest instructor, or outside presenter who participates in the
13		child's education;
14		3. Any records in the possession of the school relating to third-party
15		individuals and organizations contracted with the school that the child
16		attends; and
17		4. Any student well-being questionnaire or health screening form used
18		for research purposes;
19		(b) To provide consent prior to:
20		1. A well-being questionnaire or health screening form used for research
21		purposes being given to the child. A school shall not require a grant of
22		general consent to these questionnaires or forms by a parent, but shall
23		request consent specific to each questionnaire or form to be provided
24		to the child;
25		2. A biometric scan of the child is made, shared, or stored by a school;
26		3. Any record of the child's blood or deoxyribonucleic acid is created,
27		stored, or shared by a school, except as required by law and authorized

1	pursuant to a court order; and
2	4. Each video or voice recording of the child is made by a school unless
3	it is made during or as part of a court-ordered proceeding or a
4	forensic interview in a criminal investigation or is to be used primarily
5	for the following purposes:
6	a. Documentation of regular classroom instruction, such as
7	participation in journalism;
8	b. Security or surveillance of buildings, grounds, or transportation
9	<u>vehicles; or</u>
10	c. Documentation of an extracurricular activity or public event
11	where recording is common practice;
12	(c) To know the people to whom and material to which the child is exposed
13	while on property owned, leased, or operated by the school;
14	(d) To know the identity of the people and entities, including but not limited to
15	organizations, agencies, third-party clearinghouses, and consultants, that
16	have accessed the child's education records, whether authorized by the
17	<u>school or not;</u>
18	(e) To access and review information identified in this section without entering
19	into a nondisclosure agreement;
20	(f) To access and review, in physical or digital format, and make copies of any
21	curricular documents, books, and other educational materials used in the
22	child's education;
23	(g) To receive, without request, any course syllabus or course reading list prior
24	to the child's beginning of the coursework or upon the child's enrollment in
25	the course;
26	(h) To visit his or her child at school during school hours unless the visit would
27	disrupt the educational process of other children;

1	(i) To be provided a consent form prior to, and give written prior consent:
2	1. To each specific nonemergency health care service provided by the
3	school to the child;
4	2. To each and every session of nonemergency mental health care service
5	provided by the school to the child;
6	3. That is not a grant of general consent but is specific to each service
7	provided to the child;
8	4. That shall not waive the parent's right to access the child's education
9	or health records or the right to receive notifications required by this
10	section; and
11	5. That, if not obtained from the parent, shall prohibit the school from
12	providing that service;
13	(j) To be notified:
14	1. At the beginning of each school year, or upon enrollment, of all
15	programs and health care services offered at the child's school;
16	2. Of major changes in his or her child's mental, emotional, and physical
17	health and well-being, including but not limited to:
18	a. Significant changes to the child's gender expression;
19	b. Any request to be referred to by a name, pronoun, or other
20	identifier inconsistent with the school enrollment documentation
21	submitted in accordance to KRS 158.032;
22	c. Indicators of eating disorders;
23	d. Indicators of chemical dependency;
24	e. Evidence of pregnancy, whether the result of consensual or
25	<u>nonconsensual sexual activity;</u>
26	<u>f. Evidence of self-harm; and</u>
27	g. Evidence of suicidal or violent ideation or intention;

1	3. At the beginning of the school year and upon a change of status,
2	whether the child's school campus is assigned a school resource
3	<u>officer or not;</u>
4	4. Within one (1) business day of the school attaining knowledge, of the
5	occurrence of the following incidents on the campus of the school the
6	child attends:
7	a. Physical assault;
8	<u>b. Sexual assault;</u>
9	c. Unlawful possession of a weapon on school property;
10	d. Unlawful drug use or possession;
11	e Police investigations, unless no report is requested by police;
12	f. Notice to the parent of the parent's child being involved in a
13	bullying incident, as defined in Section 7 of this Act; and
14	g. Regardless of the incident's location, serious crimes such as
15	capital offenses, felonies, or Class A misdemeanors, of which a
16	teacher or other school employee who works at the child's school
17	campus is charged or convicted; and
18	5. At the beginning of the school year or upon enrollment of a report
19	compiling the incidents outlined in subparagraph 4. of this paragraph
20	from the previous school year;
21	(k) To request and receive, without charge, one (1) copy of all information
22	identified in this subsection related to the child; and
23	(1) The rights outlined in the Sections 4 and 5 of this Act.
24	(2) To guard the rights outlined in Sections 1 to 6 of this Act, each local board of
25	education or charter school board of directors shall take necessary actions and
26	shall adopt policies and procedures to:
27	(a) Notify the parents of each enrolled child at the beginning of the school year

1		or upon enrollment of the parental rights outlined in Sections 1 to 6 of this
2		<u>Act;</u>
3	<u>(b)</u>	Ensure that no information relating to a child that requires prior consent
4		under Sections 1 to 6 of this Act is created, collected, stored, or shared
5		without the prior consent of the parent;
6	<u>(c)</u>	Ensure that no service or activity relating to a child that requires prior
7		consent under Sections 1 to 6 of this Act is conducted without the prior
8		consent of the parent;
9	<u>(d)</u>	Provide prompt notification without solicitation, request, or inquiry from a
10		parent as required by Sections 1 to 6 of this Act;
11	<u>(e)</u>	Provide the opportunity to access, review, and receive in digital form,
12		without charge, any requested information involving a parent's minor child
13		as permitted by Sections 1 to 6 of this Act, upon the written request of the
14		parent, within five (5) business days of the receipt of the request;
15	<u>(f)</u>	Notify parents of major changes in their child's mental, emotional, and
16		physical health and well-being, including but not limited to those listed in
17		subsection (1)(j) of this section;
18	<u>(g)</u>	Prohibit any teacher or other school employee from withholding any
19		information concerning a child's academic record or mental, emotional, or
20		physical well-being, including but not limited to those referenced in
21		subsection (1)(j) of this section, from the child's parent;
22	<u>(h)</u>	Prohibit any teacher or other school employee from coercing or
23		discouraging a child from sharing any information concerning the child's
24		academic record or mental, emotional, or physical well-being with his or
25		her parent, including but not limited to those listed in subsection (1)(j) of
26		this section;
27	<i>(i)</i>	Prohibit the funding of any professional development activity, consultant

1	services, trainings, or incentives, or the adoption of any policies, practices,
2	or procedures, that:
3	<u>1. Advise, compel, or incentivize any teacher, school employee, or</u>
4	presenter to use pronouns that are inconsistent with the information
5	on the child's school enrollment documentation;
6	2. Discourage, punish, or disadvantage a teacher, school employee, or
7	presenter in any way for refusal or failure to use a name or other
8	identifier in reference to a child that is inconsistent with the child's
9	information listed on the school enrollment documentation;
10	3. Assert that possessing any set of immutable characteristics makes a
11	person in any way responsible for, or a contributor to, the suffering or
12	adverse conditions experienced by another group of people; or
13	4. Advise, compel, or incentivize any persons to:
14	a. Segregate or form affinity groups according to any protected
15	<u>class;</u>
16	b. Engage in any activity meant to separate persons based upon any
17	immutable characteristic with the intent or effect of ascribing
18	disadvantage, advantage, inferiority, or superiority; or
19	c. Assert that a person, simply by virtue of any immutable
20	characteristic, is inherently more valuable than another person
21	or better qualified to understand or empathize with persons with
22	that characteristic; and
23	(i) 1. Prohibit the imposition of any requirement on any child as a condition
24	for school admittance or attendance, employment, participation in or
25	attendance at extra-curricular activities, or access or use of property
26	located in the Commonwealth of Kentucky, whether owned, leased, or
27	operated by the institution, to:

1	a. Force the use of any type of medical device, including but not
2	limited to any type of facial coverings; or
3	b. Submit to any type of medical procedure or treatment, including
4	but not limited to any type of vaccination or testing unless
5	otherwise directed by a court of competent jurisdiction.
6	2. Nothing in this paragraph shall:
7	a. Contradict the requirements of KRS 158.035 regarding
8	certificates of immunization;
9	b. Apply to nonmedical safety equipment used as a precaution to
10	avoid bodily injuries in athletic activities, physical education
11	instruction, extracurricular activities, classroom instruction, or
12	demonstrations involving dangerous materials or activities;
13	c. Apply to a physical examinations or fitness required to
14	participate or resume participation in any interscholastic athletic
15	<u>activity; or</u>
16	d. Invalidate requirements, including those of students that have
17	curricular or work responsibilities, necessary for student
18	presence in a medical setting.
19	(3) The Kentucky Department of Education and the Kentucky Board of Education
20	<u>shall:</u>
21	(a) Eliminate any administrative regulations or recommended practices or
22	procedures that are inconsistent with Sections 1 to 6 of this Act; and
23	(b) Develop and recommend best practices to facilitate compliance by schools
24	with Sections 1 to 6 of this Act.
25	(4) A school shall not be required to adopt or comply with the recommended best
26	practices developed under subsection (3)(b) of this section, so long as the school
27	complies with Sections 1 to 6 of this Act.

1	→SECTION 4. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 158 IS CREATED TO
2	READ AS FOLLOWS:
3	(1) As it relates to public schools, the General Assembly hereby finds and declares
4	<u>that:</u>
5	(a) Children have natural and normal concerns about bodily privacy while
6	partially or completely unclothed, and most children prefer that members of
7	the opposite biological sex not be present in those circumstances;
8	(b) A parent has the right, when entrusting the supervision of his or her child to
9	a school, to not have:
10	1. His or her child permitted to view persons of the opposite sex outside
11	of the community standard state of dress;
12	2. Persons of the opposite sex permitted to view his or her child outside
13	of the community standard state of dress; and
14	3. Persons of the opposite sex in the presence of his or her child where
15	there is a reasonable expectation of bodily privacy;
16	(c) Allowing students to share private quarters, restrooms, locker rooms, or
17	shower rooms where there is a reasonable expectation of bodily privacy,
18	which are reserved for students of a different biological sex creates:
19	1. A significant potential for disruption of school activities and unsafe
20	conditions; and
21	2. Potential embarrassment and shame to children; and
22	(d) Providing children who object to the use of private quarters, restrooms,
23	locker rooms, or shower rooms designated for the child's biological sex with
24	reasonable alternative accommodations, if and when available, avoids
25	potential complications and serves to protect their dignity and safety.
26	(2) To safeguard the rights recognized in subsection (1) of this section:
27	(a) Every school shall respect and protect the bodily privacy of children and

1	shall not compel or permit a student to be outside a community standard
2	state of dress in the presence, or within view of members of the opposite
3	biological sex;
4	(b) In the private areas identified in subsection (1) of this section where there is
5	a reasonable expectation of bodily privacy, school personnel shall provide
6	areas designated for students separated by their biological sex; and
7	(c) A student who informs school officials that the student's gender expression
8	is, or will be, different from the student's biological sex and whose parent
9	provides written consent to the school shall be provided with reasonable
10	alternative facility accommodations, if available. Reasonable facility
11	accommodations:
12	1. May include but are not limited to access to single-stall restrooms or
13	the controlled use of faculty bathrooms, locker rooms, or shower
14	rooms; and
15	2. Shall not include the use of school restrooms, locker rooms, or shower
16	rooms designated for use by persons of the opposite biological sex, or
17	the use of private quarters with members of the opposite biological sex
18	who are not family members of the student.
19	(3) While accessing private quarters, restrooms, locker rooms, or shower rooms
20	designated for use by the child's biological sex where there is a reasonable
21	expectation of bodily privacy, a child who encounters a person of the opposite
22	biological sex shall have a private cause of action against the school if school
23	personnel:
24	(a) Authorized the encountered person to use the facilities of the opposite
25	biological sex in the same manner as the child; or
26	(b) Failed to take reasonable steps to prevent the encountered person from
27	using facilities of the opposite biological sex in the same manner as the

1	<u>child.</u>
2	(4) Any student, teacher, or employee required by the school or school personnel to
3	share private quarters where there is a reasonable expectation of bodily privacy
4	with a member of the opposite biological sex shall have a cause of action against
5	the school, unless the person sharing the quarters is a family member of the
6	student, teacher, or employee, as applicable.
7	(5) Nothing in this section shall apply to the following persons:
8	(a) A child younger than six (6) years of age, who may be present in the
9	facilities designated for use by the opposite biological sex of the child if
10	accompanied by the child's caregiver of designated biological sex;
11	(b) A person engaged in sanctioned inspection, maintenance, janitorial, or
12	custodial activities if reasonable precautions are made to prevent being in
13	the presence of, or viewing, a person of the opposite sex;
14	(c) A medical professional engaging in the practices of the profession under the
15	accepted standard of care;
16	(d) A person rendering medical or other emergency services; or
17	(e) A person serving in a law enforcement or school safety capacity, including
18	but not limited to pursuing a fleeing criminal suspect, executing a duly
19	issued warrant, or conducting a school authorized activity.
20	→SECTION 5. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 158 IS CREATED TO
21	READ AS FOLLOWS:
22	(1) For the purposes of this section, "controversial subject matter" means an issue
23	that is a point made in the electoral platform of a political party as defined in
24	KRS 118.015 and is contested by the electoral platform of another political party
25	at the local, state, or federal level.
26	(2) The General Assembly hereby finds and declares that:
27	(a) The common school environment and interactions between teachers and

1		students in kindergarten through grade twelve (12) are primarily intended
2		to facilitate the learning of approved curricula and development of approved
3		sets of skills; and
4		(b) The common school environment is not an appropriate place to engage in
5		teacher-led or teacher-promoted social or political advocacy with respect to
6		controversial subject matter.
7	<u>(3)</u>	A parent has a right to have his or her child spend time at school primarily
8		learning approved curricula and developing approved sets of skills with no time
9		spent being indoctrinated into any partisan political position or being involved in
10		teacher-led or teacher-promoted social or political advocacy with respect to
11		controversial subject matter.
12	<u>(4)</u>	In the school setting or while serving in the scope of duties of temporary, part-
13		time, or full-time employment at a school, a teacher, school employee, guest
14		lecturer, guest instructor, or outside presenter shall not:
15		(a) Discuss with or provide instruction to any student in kindergarten through
16		grade eight (8) on the topics of sexual orientation, sexual preference, or
17		gender expression inconsistent with biological sex;
18		(b) Discuss with or provide instruction to any student in grades nine (9)
19		through twelve (12) the topics of sexual orientation, sexual preference, or
20		gender expression inconsistent with biological sex, unless required for
21		instruction of the school's approved curriculum for the course being taught;
22		(c) Discuss the person's own sexual orientation, sexual preference, or gender
23		expression that is inconsistent with his or her biological sex with any
24		student; or
25		(d) Display slogans, emblems, phrases, or symbols within view of any student
26		on school property that are associated with any sexual orientation, sexual
27		preference, or gender expression inconsistent with biological sex.

1	<u>(5)</u>	In th	he school setting or while serving in the scope of duties of temporary, part-
2		<u>time</u>	, or full-time employment at a school, a teacher, school employee, guest
3		<u>lectu</u>	urer, guest instructor, or outside presenter shall:
4		<u>(a)</u>	Not endorse, support, or oppose any candidate or nominee for public office
5			or any elected or appointed official of the local, state, or federal
6			government;
7		<u>(b)</u>	Not endorse, support, or oppose any pending, proposed, or enacted
8			legislation or regulation at the local, state, or federal level in the presence of
9			<u>students;</u>
10		<u>(c)</u>	Not endorse, support, or oppose any pending, proposed, or decided court
11			case or judicial action at the local, state, or federal level in the presence of
12			<u>students;</u>
13		<u>(d)</u>	Not endorse, support, or oppose any pending, proposed, or executed
14			executive action at the local, state, or federal level in the presence of
15			<u>students;</u>
16		<u>(e)</u>	Only introduce or discuss with students a controversial subject matter if it is
17			germane to the curriculum and topic of the course being taught and shall
18			not advocate in a partisan manner for a specific side;
19		<u>(f)</u>	Not display slogans, emblems, phrases, flags, or symbols that are associated
20			with any controversial subject matter, including the confederate flag, with
21			the exception of historical American, patriotic, war, or battle slogans,
22			emblems, phrases, flags, or symbols, even if they may have since acquired
23			secondary associations with controversial subject matter;
24		<u>(g)</u>	Not segregate students or form affinity groups of students according to any
25			protected class;
26		<u>(h)</u>	Not engage in any activity meant to separate one (1) or more students based
27			upon any immutable characteristic with the intent or effect of ascribing

1		disadvantage, advantage, inferiority or superiority;
2		(i) Not assert that a person, simply by virtue of any immutable characteristic, is
3		inherently more valuable than others, or better qualified to understand, or
4		empathize with, persons with that characteristic;
5		(j) Not assert that possessing any set of immutable characteristics makes a
6		person in any way responsible for, or a contributor to, the suffering or
7		adverse conditions experienced by another student or group of people; and
8		(k) Not encourage or coerce, or attempt to encourage or coerce, a child to
9		withhold any information about material or instruction presented to, or
10		conversation held with, the child from his or her parent.
11	<u>(6)</u>	Notwithstanding the prohibitions on conduct in this section, a teacher, school
12		employee, guest lecturer, guest instructor, outside presenter, or student shall not
13		<u>be compelled to endorse, affirm, support, oppose, or advocate for or against</u>
14		anything in opposition to his or her sincerely held beliefs and convictions,
15		religious or otherwise, including but not limited to:
16		(a) Political candidates, parties, platforms, issues, judicial judgements,
17		legislation, regulation, executive order, or policies;
18		(b) Any position on controversial subject matter;
19		(c) Any position on a religious belief, dogma, doctrine, or practice;
20		(d) Any perspective on sexual orientation, sexual preference, or gender
21		expression; or
22		(e) The use of pronouns or other identifiers to refer to a person that are
23		inconsistent with the person's biological sex.
24	<u>(7)</u>	In support of the rights outlined in this section, each local board of education or
25		charter school board of directors shall adopt policies and procedures to ensure
26		that:
27		(a) No funds are expended for any professional development, trainings, or

18		2. Is patently offensive to prevailing standards in the adult community as

26		buttocks with less than a fully opaque covering;

3	(g) "Obscene" means;
4	1. To the average person, applying contemporary community standards,
5	the predominant appeal of the matter, taken as a whole, is a prurient
6	interest in nudity, sexual conduct, excretion, sexual stimulation, or
7	sexual gratification;
8	2. The matter depicts or describes the nudity, sexual conduct, excretion,
9	sexual stimulation, or sexual gratification in a patently offensive way;

11	3. The matter, taken as a whole, lacks serious literary, artistic, political,

13	(h) "Obscene imagery representing minors" means a visual depiction of any

6		or matter's main contribution and importance, taken on the whole
