6		connection with the college,] a model and practice school which shall be an
7		educational laboratory school under the supervision of thoroughly trained and
8		<u>certified education professionals</u> [teachers] for the purpose of <u>piloting and testing</u>
9		kindergarten through high school educational pedagogies, practices, programs,
10		assessments, and innovations to further the educational mission of the
11		<u>Commonwealth</u> [giving observation and practice work to the student teachers].
12	<u>(2)</u>	The model and practice school shall:
13		(a) Be a university-operated public school under the governance of the Eastern
14		Kentucky University board of regents that is separate from any school
15		<u>district;</u>
16		(b) If confirmed by the board of regents, serve as a local education agency for
17		the purposes of federal programs;
18		(c) Be subject to all statutes and regulations applicable to any other subdivision
19		of the university, and to those statutes and regulations identified in this
20		section or those relating to health, safety, and civil rights that are applicable
21		to school districts;
22		(d) Enroll students in grades kindergarten through twelve (12), from any
23		district in the Commonwealth, in compliance with the university's
24		nondiscrimination policy and in alignment with the school's research
25		objectives;
26		(e) Ensure students meet compulsory attendance requirements under KRS
27		158.030 and 158.100;

1	<u>(f)</u>	Ensure high school course offerings meet or exceed the minimum high
2		school requirements established pursuant to KRS 156.160;
3	<u>(g)</u>	Participate in the assessment and accountability system under KRS Chapter
4		158 in the same manner as a school district and be rated and reported in the
5		same manner as a school district;
6	<u>(h)</u>	Use the same system for recording student information data as utilized by
7		local school districts across the state in the same manner as a school
8		district;
9	<u>(i)</u>	Be subject to the same statutes requiring or authorizing criminal
10		background checks and clear CA/N checks as specified in KRS 160.380 and
11		161.148 in the same manner as a school district;
12	<u>(j)</u>	Provide instructional time that is at least equivalent to the student
13		instructional year specified in KRS 158.070;
14	<u>(k)</u>	Be eligible to participate in the education technology funding program
15		under the same conditions as a district under KRS 157.655 and 157.665;
16	<u>(l)</u>	Provide sufficient data to the Department of Education to generate school
17		report cards under KRS 158.6453;
18	<u>(m)</u>	Unless otherwise prevented by state or federal law, be eligible to apply for or
19		participate in any state grant programs offered to school districts;
20	<u>(n)</u>	Be eligible to participate in alternative educator certification, educator rank
21		change, and educator internship programs in the same manner as a school
22		district; and
23	<u>(0)</u>	Be eligible to participate in state-sponsored interscholastic athletics,
24		academic programs, competitions, awards, scholarships, and recognition
25		programs for students, educators, administrators, and schools to the same
26		extent, and subject to the same conditions, as any other public school or
27		individual.

6			University, other universities or state agencies, or as directed by the General
7			Assembly;

1		1. The superintendent of the school, who shall serve as chair;
2		2. One (1) member who shall be a faculty member working at the school;
3		3. Two (2) members who shall be faculty working outside of the school;
4		4. Two (2) members who shall be residing in counties in which students
5		attending the school reside;
6		5. Two (2) members who shall be parents of students attending the

- 21 (1) Not later than August 1, 1999, and each June 30 thereafter, each Kentucky high school shall submit to the authority, a compiled list of all high school students during the academic year. A high school shall report the grade point average of an eligible high school student pursuant to KRS 164.7874 by January 15 following the end of the fall academic term in which the student completed the high school graduation requirements. The list shall identify the high school and shall contain each high school student's name, Social Security number, address, grade point

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average for the academic year, expected or actual graduation date, highest ACT score, family eligibility status for free or reduced-price lunch, and each AP, Cambridge Advanced International, or IB examination score. The Gatton Academy of Mathematics and Science in Kentucky, [and] the Craft Academy for Excellence in Science and Mathematics, and the high school of a model and practice school under Section 1 of this Act shall report the data on its students to the authority. The list need not contain the ACT, AP, Cambridge Advanced International, or IB if the authority receives the scores directly from the testing services. The authority shall notify each eligible high school student of his or her Kentucky educational excellence scholarship award earned each academic year. The authority shall determine the final Kentucky educational excellence scholarship and supplemental award based upon the actual final grade point average, highest ACT score, and qualifying AP, Cambridge Advanced International, or IB scores and shall notify each eligible twelfth-grade high school student of the final determination. The authority shall make available a list of eligible high school and postsecondary students to participating institutions.

- (2) The authority shall provide data access only to the Kentucky Longitudinal Data System and to those participating institutions that have either received an admission application from an eligible high school or postsecondary student or have been listed by the eligible high school or postsecondary student on the Free Application For Federal Student Aid.
- 22 (3) For each eligible postsecondary student enrolling in a participating institution after 23 July 1, 1999, the participating institution shall verify to the authority:
