22	(4)	Executive directors and division directors appointed under this section shall be
23		appointed by the secretary with the approval of the Governor.
24		→ Section 4. KRS 42.650 is amended to read as follows:
25	(1)	The Division of <u>Geographic Information Systems</u> [Enterprise Portfolios] is hereby
26		established in the Office of [IT ]Architecture and Governance within the
27		Commonwealth Office of Technology in the Finance and Administration Cabinet.

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1	(2)	The Division of <u>Geographic Information Systems</u> [Enterprise Portfolios] shall be
2		headed by a division director, whose appointment is subject to KRS 12.050. The

22		directly to the commissioner. The office shall consist of the:

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assessments of public service companies and motor vehicles, and

5		Services, which shall be responsible for providing geographical

13		not limited to technical tax research, compliance, taxpayer assistance, tax-
14		specific training, and publications. The office shall consist of the:
15		1. Division of Sales and Use Tax, which shall administer the sales and use
16		tax; and
17		2. Division of Miscellaneous Taxes, which shall administer various other
18		taxes, including but not limited to alcoholic beverage taxes; cigarette
19		enforcement fees, stamps, meters, and taxes; gasoline tax; bank
20		franchise tax; inheritance and estate tax; insurance premiums and
21		insurance surcharge taxes; motor vehicle tire fees and usage taxes; and
22		special fuels taxes;
23	(f)	Office of Income Taxation, headed by an executive director who shall report
24		directly to the commissioner. The office shall administer all matters related to

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1		1. Division of Individual Tax, which shall administer the following taxes
2		or returns: individual income, fiduciary, and employer withholding; and
3		2. Division of Corporation Tax, which shall administer the corporation

6		(g) Office of Field Operations, headed by an executive director who shall report
7		directly to the commissioner. The office shall manage the regional taxpayer

11		enforcement activity related to due and owing tax assessments, including

14		agencies. The office shall consist of the Division of Collections.
15	(2)	The functions and duties of the department shall include conducting conferences,
16		administering taxpayer protests, and settling tax controversies on a fair and
17		equitable basis, taking into consideration the hazards of litigation to the
18		Commonwealth of Kentucky and the taxpayer. The mission of the department shall
19		be to afford an opportunity for taxpayers to have an independent informal review of
20		the determinations of the audit functions of the department, and to attempt to fairly
21		and equitably resolve tax controversies at the administrative level.
