23		(f)	"Interim assessments" means assessments that are given periodically
24			throughout the year to provide diagnostic information and to show individual
25			student performance against content standards;
26		(g)	"Summative assessment" means an assessment given at the end of the school
27			year, semester, or other period of time to evaluate students' performance

1			against content standards within a unit of instruction or a course; and
2		(h)	"Writing" means a purposeful act of thinking and expression that uses
3			language to explore ideas and communicate meaning to others. Writing is a
4			complex, multifaceted act of communication.
5	(2)	(a)	Beginning in fiscal year 2017-2018, and every six (6) years thereafter, the
6			Kentucky Department of Education shall implement a process for reviewing
7			Kentucky's academic standards and the alignment of corresponding
8			assessments for possible revision or replacement to ensure alignment with
9			transition readiness standards necessary for global competitiveness and with
10			state career and technical education standards.
11		(b)	The revisions to the content standards shall:
12			1. Focus on critical knowledge, skills, and capacities needed for success in
13			the global economy;
14			2. Result in fewer but more in-depth standards to facilitate mastery
15			learning;
16			3. Communicate expectations more clearly and concisely to teachers,
17			parents, students, and citizens;
18			4. Be based on evidence-based research;
19			5. Consider international benchmarks; and
20			6. Ensure that the standards are aligned from elementary to high school to
21			postsecondary education so that students can be successful at each
22			education level.
23		(c)	1. The department shall establish four (4) standards and assessments
24			review committees, with each committee composed of a minimum of six
25			(6) Kentucky public school teachers and a minimum of two (2)
26			representatives from Kentucky institutions of higher education,
27			including at least one (1) representative from a public institution of

1			higher education. Each committee member shall teach in the subject area
2			that his or her committee is assigned to review and have no prior or
3			current affiliation with a curriculum or assessment resources vendor.
4		2.	One (1) of the four (4) committees shall be assigned to focus on the
5			review of language arts and writing academic standards and
6			assessments, one (1) on the review of mathematics academic standards
7			and assessments, one (1) on the review of science academic standards
8			and assessments, and one (1) on the review of social studies academic
9			standards and assessments.
10	(d)	1.	The department shall establish twelve (12) advisory panels to advise and
11			assist each of the four (4) standards and assessments review committees.
12		2.	Three (3) advisory panels shall be assigned to each standards and
13			assessments review committee. One (1) panel shall review the standards
14			and assessments for kindergarten through grade five (5), one (1) shall
15			review the standards and assessments for grades six (6) through eight
16			(8), and one (1) shall review the standards and assessments for grades
17			nine (9) through twelve (12).
18		3.	Each advisory panel shall be composed of at least one (1) representative
19			from a Kentucky institution of higher education and a minimum of six
20			(6) Kentucky public school teachers who teach in the grade level and
21			subject reviewed by the advisory panel to which they are assigned and
22			have no prior or current affiliation with a curriculum or assessment

resources vendor.

(e) The commissioner of education and the president of the Council on
 Postsecondary Education shall also provide consultants for the standards and
 assessments review committees and the advisory panels who are business and
 industry professionals actively engaged in career fields that depend on the

2	(f)	1.	The standards and assessments process review committee is hereby
3			established and shall be composed of the commissioner of education or
4			designee as a nonvoting member and nine (9) voting representatives of
5			public schools, of whom at least two (2) shall be parents of public
6			school students, appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Senate
7			in accordance with KRS 11.160 as follows:
8			a. One (1) language arts teacher;
9			b. One (1) math teacher;
10			c. One (1) science teacher;
11			d. One (1) social studies teacher;
12			e. Two (2) school principals;
13			f. Two (2) school superintendents; and
14			g. One (1) school board member.

25			transparent process that allows all Kentuckians an opportunity to
26			participate. The department shall ensure the public's assistance in
27			reviewing and suggesting changes to the standards and alignment

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1	adjustments to corresponding state assessments by establishing a Web
2	site dedicated to collecting comments by the public and educators. An
3	independent third party, which has no prior or current affiliation with a
4	curriculum or assessment resources vendor, shall be selected by the
5	department to collect and transmit the comments to the department for
6	dissemination to the appropriate advisory panel for review and
7	consideration.
8 2.	Each advisory panel shall review the standards and assessments for its

9 assigned subject matter and grade level and the suggestions made by the 10 public and educators. After completing its review, each advisory panel 11 shall make recommendations for changes to the standards and alignment 12 adjustments for assessments to the appropriate standards and 13 assessments review committee.

- 143. Each standards and assessments review committee shall review the15findings and make recommendations to revise or replace existing16standards and to adjust alignment of assessments.
- 17 4. The recommendations shall be published on the Web site established in this subsection for the purpose of gathering additional feedback from the 18 19 public. The commissioner shall subsequently present the 20 recommendations and the public feedback to the Interim Joint 21 Committee on Education.

- (b) The board shall revise the annual statewide assessment program as needed in
 accordance with revised academic standards and corresponding assessment
 alignment adjustments approved by the board under subsection (2) of this

2		(c)	The statewide assessments shall not include any academic standards not
3			approved by the board under subsection (2) of this section.
4		(d)	The board shall seek the advice of the Office of Education Accountability; the
5			School Curriculum, Assessment, and Accountability Council; the Education
6			Assessment and Accountability Review Subcommittee, and the National
7			Technical Advisory Panel on Assessment and Accountability in the
8			development of the assessment program. The statewide assessment program
9			shall not include measurement of a student's ability to become a self-sufficient

13			its successor, as determined by the United States Department of Education;
14		(d)	The criterion-referenced components required in this subsection shall be
15			composed of constructed response items and multiple choice items;
16		(e)	The Kentucky Board of Education may incorporate end-of-course
17			examinations into the assessment program to be used in lieu of requirements
18			for criterion-referenced tests required under paragraph (b) of this subsection;
19			and
20		(f)	The results of the assessment program developed under this subsection shall
21			be used by schools and districts to determine appropriate instructional
22			modifications for all students in order for students to make continuous
23			progress, including that needed by advanced learners.
24	(6)	Each	a school district shall administer the statewide student assessment during the
25		last	fourteen (14) days of school in the district's instructional calendar. The

4		(c) No state agency, local board of education, school district, or school shall
5		take punitive action against any individual who provides information to
6		students, parents, or legal guardians regarding the ability to choose that a
7		student not participate in statewide student assessments.
8		(d) A student shall not receive an unexcused absence on any day statewide
9		student assessments are given due to the decision to not participate, if the
10		student is in attendance on that day.
11		(e) A student's non-participation in statewide student assessments shall not
12		affect the aggregate score of the district, school, class, educator, or student
13		for state-, district-, school-, or teacher-level accountability purposes.
14		(f) No school district, school, educator, student, parent, or legal guardian shall
15		be penalized by the state when parents or legal guardians choose for their
16		student to not participate in statewide student assessments.
17		(g) School districts, schools, and educators shall not selectively encourage any
18		parent or legal guardian of a student or group of students to choose not to
19		participate in statewide student assessments as an attempt to improve scores
20		for any district, school, class, or educator.
21	<u>(9)</u>	A local school district may select and use commercial interim or formative
22		assessments or develop and use its own formative assessments to provide data on
23		how well its students are growing toward mastery of Kentucky academic standards,
24		so long as the district's local school board develops a policy minimizing the
25		reduction in instructional time related to the administration of the interim
26		assessments. Nothing in this section precludes teachers from using ongoing teacher-
27		developed formative processes.

8	of th	e assessment results for the same students shall be made available.
9	<u>(12)</u> [(11)]	The following provisions shall apply to the college admissions examinations

11	(a)	The cost of both college admissions examinations administered to students in
12		high school shall be paid for by the Kentucky Department of Education. The
13		costs of additional college admissions examinations shall be the responsibility
14		of the student;

4	(13) [(12)] Kentucky teachers shall have a significant role in providing feedback about					
5	the design of the assessments, except for the college admissions exams described in					
6	subsection (5)(b)5. of this section. The assessments shall be designed to:					
7	(a) Measure grade appropriate core academic content, basic skills, and higher-					
8	order thinking skills and their application;					
9	(b) Provide valid and reliable scores for schools. If scores are reported for					
10	students individually, they shall be valid and reliable;					
11	(c) Minimize the time spent by teachers and students on assessment; and					
12	(d) Assess Kentucky academic standards only.					
13	(14)[(13)] The results from assessment under subsections (3) and (5) of this section shall					
14	be reported to the school districts and schools no later than seventy-five (75) days					
15	following the last day the assessment can be administered. Assessment reports					
16	provided to the school districts and schools shall include an electronic copy of an					
17	operational subset of test items from each assessment administered to their students					
18	and the results for each of those test items by student and by school.					
19	(15) [(14)] The Department of Education shall gather information to establish the validity					
20	of the assessment and accountability program. It shall develop a biennial plan for					
21	validation studies that shall include but not be limited to the consistency of student					
22	results across multiple measures, the congruence of school scores with documented					
23	improvements in instructional practice and the school learning environment, and the					
24	potential for all scores to yield fair, consistent, and accurate student performance					
25	level and school accountability decisions. Validation activities shall take place in a					
26	timely manner and shall include a review of the accuracy of scores assigned to					
27	students and schools, as well as of the testing materials. The plan shall be submitted					

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to the Commission by July 1 of the first year of each biennium. A summary of the findings shall be submitted to the Legislative Research Commission by September 1 of the second year of the biennium.

- 4 (16)[(15)] The Department of Education and the state board shall offer optional
 assistance to local school districts and schools in developing and using continuous
 assessment strategies needed to assure student progress. The continuous assessment
 shall provide diagnostic information to improve instruction to meet the needs of
 individual students.
- 9 (<u>17)</u>[(16)] The Administration Code for Kentucky's Assessment Program shall include
 10 prohibitions of inappropriate test preparation activities by school district employees
 11 charged with test administration and oversight, including but not limited to the issue
 12 of teachers being required to do test practice in lieu of regular classroom instruction
 13 and test practice outside the normal work day. The code shall include disciplinary
 14 sanctions that may be taken toward a school or individuals.
- (18)[(17)] The Kentucky Board of Education, after the Department of Education has
 received advice from the Office of Education Accountability; the School
 Curriculum, Assessment, and Accountability Council; and the National Technical
 Advisory Panel on Assessment and Accountability, shall promulgate an
 administrative regulation under KRS Chapter 13A to establish the components of a
 reporting structure for assessments administered under this section. The reporting
 structure shall include the following components:
- (a) A school report card that clearly communicates with parents and the public
 about school performance. The school report card shall be sent to the parents
 of the students of the districts, and information on electronic access to a
 summary of the results for the district shall be published in the newspaper
 with the largest circulation in the county. It shall include but not be limited to
 the following components reported by race, gender, and disability when

- Student academic achievement, including the results from each of the
 assessments administered under this section;
- 4 2. For Advanced Placement, Cambridge Advanced International, and 5 International Baccalaureate, the courses offered, the number of students 6 enrolled, completing, and taking the examination for each course, and 7 the percentage of examinees receiving a score of three (3) or better on AP examinations, a score of "e" or better on Cambridge Advanced 8 9 International examinations, or a score of four (4) or better on IB 10 examinations. The data shall be disaggregated by gender, race, students 11 with disabilities, and economic status;
- Nonacademic achievement, including the school's attendance, retention,
 graduation rates, and student transition to postsecondary;
- 14 4. School learning environment, including measures of parental15 involvement; and
- 165. Any other school performance data required by the Every Student17Succeeds Act of 2015, Pub. L. No. 114-95, or its successor;
- (b) An individual student report to parents for each student in grades three (3)
 through eight (8) summarizing the student's skills in reading, science, social
 studies, and mathematics. The school's staff shall develop a plan for
 accelerated learning for any student with identified deficiencies or strengths;
 and
- (c) A student's highest scores on the college admissions assessments administered
 under subsection (5)(b)5. of this section.
- (19)[(18)] (a) Beginning in fiscal year 2017-2018, and every six (6) years thereafter,
 the Kentucky Department of Education shall implement a comprehensive
 process for reviewing and revising the academic standards in visual and

1 performing arts and practical living skills and career studies for all levels and 2 in foreign language for middle and high schools. The department shall 3 develop review committees for the standards for each of the content areas that 4 include representation from certified specialist public school teachers and 5 postsecondary teachers in those subject areas.

6 (b) The academic standards in practical living skills for elementary, middle, and 7 high school levels shall include a focus on drug abuse prevention, with an 8 emphasis on the prescription drug epidemic and the connection between 9 prescription opioid abuse and addiction to other drugs, such as heroin and 10 synthetic drugs.

11 (c) The department shall provide to all schools guidelines for programs that 12 incorporate the adopted academic standards in visual and performing arts and 13 practical living and career studies. The department shall provide to middle and 14 high schools guidelines for including a foreign language program. The 15 guidelines shall address program length and time, courses offered, staffing, 16 resources, and facilities.

17 (d) The Kentucky Department of Education, in consultation with certified public
18 school teachers of visual and performing arts, may develop program standards
19 for the visual and performing arts.

20 (20)[(19)] The Kentucky Department of Education shall provide to all schools guidelines 21 for including an effective writing program within the curriculum. Each school-based 22 decision making council or, if there is no school council, a committee appointed by 23 the principal, shall adopt policies that determine the writing program for its school 24 and submit it to the Department of Education for review and comment. The writing program shall incorporate a variety of language resources, technological tools, and 25 26 multiple opportunities for students to develop complex communication skills for a 27 variety of purposes.

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1 <u>(</u> 2	$\frac{1}{20}$ (a) The Kentucky Department of Education, in consultation with the review
2	committees described in subsection (19) (18) of this section, shall develop a
3	school profile report to be used by all schools to document how they will

6	include student opportunities and experiences in extracurricular activities. The
7	department shall include the essential workplace ethics program on the school
8	profile report.

9 (b) By October 1 of each year, each school principal shall complete the school 10 profile report, which shall be signed by the members of the school council, or 11 the principal if no school council exists, and the superintendent. The report 12 shall be electronically transmitted to the Kentucky Department of Education, 13 and the original shall be maintained on file at the local board office and made 14 available to the public upon request. The department shall include a link to 15 each school's profile report on its Web site.

16 (c) If a school staff member, student, or a student's parent has concerns regarding

7 (11) Each school council of a school containing grades K-5 or any combination thereof, 8 or if there is no school council, the principal, shall develop and implement a 9 wellness policy that includes moderate to vigorous physical activity each day and 10 encourages healthy choices among students. The policy may permit physical activity 11 to be considered part of the instructional day, not to exceed thirty (30) minutes per 12 day, or one hundred and fifty (150) minutes per week. Each school council, or if 13 there is no school council, the principal, shall adopt an assessment tool to determine 14 each child's level of physical activity on an annual basis. The council or principal 15 may utilize an existing assessment program. The Kentucky Department of 16 Education shall make available a list of available resources to carry out the 17 provisions of this subsection. The department shall report to the Legislative 18 Research Commission no later than November 1 of each year on how the schools 19 are providing physical activity under this subsection and on the types of physical 20 activity being provided. The policy developed by the school council or principal 21 shall comply with provisions required by federal law, state law, or local board 22 policy.

(12) Discretionary authority exercised under subsection (2)(h)2.b. of this section shall
 not violate provisions of any employer-employee bargained contract existing
 between the district and its employees.
