1	AN ACT relating to dyslexia.
2	WHEREAS, dyslexia legislation passed during the 2018 legislative session after
3	many years of unwavering support; and
4	WHEREAS, dyslexia remains a dramatic barrier for Kentucky students to meet
5	their educational potential and lead successful productive lives; and
6	WHEREAS, it is now necessary to respectfully clarify implementation expectations
7	for local school districts;
8	WHEREAS, it is necessary to properly reflect the collaboration having taken place
9	with postsecondary education;
10	WHEREAS, it is necessary to be respectful of the demands made on local school
11	districts and attempt to reduce such demands;
12	WHEREAS, the following proposed legislation makes only three modifications to
13	House Bill 187 which was passed in 2018 and became law in Kentucky;
14	NOW, THEREFORE,
15	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:
16	→ Section 1. KRS 158.307 is amended to read as follows:
17	(1) As used in this section:
18	(a) "Dyslexia" means a specific learning disability that is neurological in origin. It
19	is characterized by difficulties with accurate or fluent word recognition and by
20	poor spelling and decoding abilities. These difficulties typically result from a
21	deficit in the phonological component of language that is often unexpected in
22	relation to other cognitive abilities and the provision of effective classroom
23	instruction. Secondary consequences may include problems in reading
24	comprehension and reduced reading experience that can impede the growth of
25	vocabulary and background knowledge;

27 (c) "Phonemic awareness" means the ability to recognize that a spoken word

"Evidence-based" has the same meaning as in 20 U.S.C. sec. 7801(21); and

1			consists of a sequence of individual sounds and the ability to manipulate
2			individual sounds in speaking.
3	(2)	Ву	January 1, 2019, the Department of Education shall make available a dyslexia
4		tool	kit that includes guidance, technical assistance, and training to assist all local
5		scho	ool districts in the implementation of evidence-based practices for instructing
6		stud	ents identified with or displaying characteristics of dyslexia.
7	(3)	The	dyslexia toolkit shall include but not be limited to the following guidance for
8		loca	l districts targeting students in kindergarten through grade three (3) who have
9		beer	identified with or displaying characteristics of dyslexia:
10		(a)	Evidence-based practices designed specifically for students with dyslexia;
11		(b)	Characteristics of targeted instruction for dyslexia;

14		(e)	Structured multisensory and literacy approaches to teaching language and
15			reading skills; and
16		(f)	Suggested professional development activities.
17	(4)	The	department shall collaborate with the Education Professional Standards Board,
18		Cou	ncil on Postsecondary Education, and other groups as necessary to improve and
19		upda	ate professional development opportunities for teachers specifically related to
20		dysl	exia. Professional development opportunities may focus on:
21		(a)	Development and ongoing implementation of training and coaching for
22			teachers;
23		(b)	Identifying high-quality trainers to provide support to local districts utilizing a
24			coaching model to develop building level dyslexia experts;
25		(c)	Developing awareness training modules for all instructional staff to include
26			information about characteristics of dyslexia; and
27		(d)	Evidence-based interventions, structured multisensory and literacy approaches

I			to teach language and reading skills, and accommodations for dyslexia and
2			other specific learning disabilities.
3	(5)	Eacl	n local board of education <u>shall</u> [may] develop a policy addressing the
4		imp	ementation of a program for the identification of and strategies for assisting
5		stud	ents in kindergarten through grade three (3) with dyslexia.
6	(6)	The	local board policies shall [may] include but not be limited to:
7		(a)	The definition and characteristics of dyslexia;
8		(b)	A process for identifying students who are displaying characteristics of
9			dyslexia;
10		(c)	A process for the utilization of evaluation tools to accurately identify students
11			who are displaying characteristics of dyslexia. Any qualified dyslexia
12			evaluation tool utilized by a local district shall address but not be limited to
13			the following components:
14			1. Phonological awareness and phonemic awareness;
15			2. Sound symbol recognition;
16			3. Alphabet knowledge;
17			4. Decoding skills;
18			5. Encoding skills; and
19			6. Rapid naming;
20		(d)	A process for how evaluation tools are administered and evaluated by trained
21			district personnel or licensed professionals;
22		(e)	A process for outreach to parents of students identified with or displaying the
23			characteristics of dyslexia with information and resource materials and how
24			dyslexia may be addressed in the student's educational setting;
25		(f)	Identification of evidence-based interventions, structured multisensory and
26			literacy approaches to teach language and reading skills, and accommodations
27			that schools may utilize to provide services to students identified as having

1		dyslexia; and
2		(g) A process for monitoring a student's progress after the positive identification,
3		including assessments to ascertain whether the intervention services improve
4		the student's language processing and reading skills.
5	(7)	By June 30 of each year, each local school district shall utilize a reporting tool
6		provided by the department to provide[that developed a policy addressing the
7		implementation of a program for the identification of and strategies for assisting
8		students in kindergarten through grade three (3) with dyslexia shall provide the
9		department] the following data for the current school year:
10		(a) [The number of students in kindergarten through grade three (3) that were
11		identified as displaying characteristics of dyslexia;
12		(b) The number of students in paragraph (a) of this subsection that were identified
13		through the response to intervention process;
14		(c) The number of students in kindergarten through grade three (3) that were
15		evaluated for dyslexia;
16		(d) The number of students in kindergarten through grade three (3) that were
17		identified with dyslexia;
18		(b)[(e) ]The dyslexia evaluation tools used to identify students;
19		(c) The number of students in kindergarten through grade three (3) that were
20		participating in interventions within the school setting[;
21		(g) The process or tools used to evaluate student progress; and
22		(h) The number of trained district personnel or licensed professionals used to
23		administer the dyslexia evaluation tools].
24	(8)	(a) The department shall establish a study project to gather information on early
25		screening and intervention services for children with characteristics of
26		dyslexia. The commissioner of education shall select three (3) school districts
27		to participate in the study project, one (1) of which shall be located in an

1			urban setting, one (1) of which shall be located in a suburban setting, and one
2			(1) of which shall be located in a rural setting.
3		(b)	The department shall establish guidelines and procedures for the study project.
4		(c)	The study project shall operate for three (3) full school years, beginning with
5			the school year that begins at least three (3) months after July 14, 2018.
6		(d)	The goal of the study project shall be to evaluate the effectiveness of early
7			reading assistance programs for children with characteristics of dyslexia.
8		(e)	The commissioner may consult with recognized organizations that specialize
9			in structured literacy programs for the treatment of dyslexia in establishing
10			and operating the study project.
11		(f)	The department shall submit a final report outlining the findings of the study
12			to the Interim Joint Committee on Education by November 1 after the final
13			academic year of the study project.

6		instructional practices in the classroom setting.
