A JOINT RESOLUTION granting the family of the last remaining World War II veteran in Kentucky, upon his or her passing, the option of the veteran to lie in state in the Capitol Rotunda and receive a funeral with full military honors.

WHEREAS, World War II was the most widespread war in history and lasted from 1939 until 1945. After the United States entered the war in 1941, following the attack on Pearl Harbor, over 16 million Americans and over 307,000 Kentuckians served their country and the Allied powers over the course of the war; and

WHEREAS, the generation of men and women who served our country in World War II has been called the "greatest generation" for their selfless sacrifice; and

WHEREAS, a young man or woman who entered service in 1945 as an 18-year old would now be 95 years old; and

WHEREAS, of the 16 million men and women who participated in World War II, approximately 300,000 remain. It is estimated that Kentucky is home to approximately 2,000 to 3,000 World War II veterans; and

WHEREAS, Americans owe our freedom to these World War II veterans who saved the world and as Kentuckians recognize their sacrifices and honor their legacy; and

WHEREAS, by granting these honors, the General Assembly signals its gratitude and profound respect for all those brave men and women who served during World War II;

NOW, THEREFORE,

## Be it resolved by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:

$\rightarrow$ Section 1. Upon the passing of the last World War II veteran in Kentucky, the Governor shall grant the honor of lying in state in the Capitol Rotunda and a full military funeral with honors to the family of the decedent. The Governor shall direct the Kentucky Department of Veterans Affairs to implement this Act and the department may promulgate administrative regulations in accordance with KRS Chapter 13A for its effectuation.
