26	(2)	Each local board of education shall adopt a policy for implementing school-based
27		decision making in the district which shall include but not be limited to a

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1 description of how the district's policies, including those developed pursuant to 2 KRS 160.340, have been amended to allow the professional staff members of a 3 school to be involved in the decision-making process as they work to meet 4 educational goals established in KRS 158.645 and 158.6451. The policy may 5 include a requirement that each school council make an annual report at a public 6 meeting of the board describing the school's progress in meeting the educational 7 goals set forth in KRS 158.6451 and district goals established by the board. The 8 policy shall also address and comply with the following:

9 (a) Except as provided in paragraph (b)2. of this subsection, each participating 10 school shall form a school council composed of two (2) parents, three (3) 11 teachers, and the principal or administrator. The membership of the council 12 may be increased, but it may only be increased proportionately. A parent 13 representative on the council shall not be an employee or a relative of an 14 employee of the school in which that parent serves, nor shall the parent 15 representative be an employee or a relative of an employee in the district 16 administrative offices. A parent representative shall not be a local board member or a board member's spouse. None of the members shall have a 17 18 conflict of interest pursuant to KRS Chapter 45A, except the salary paid to 19 district employees;

20 (b) 1. The teacher representatives shall be elected for one (1) year terms by a 21 majority of the teachers. A teacher elected to a school council shall not 22 be involuntarily transferred during his or her term of office. The parent 23 representatives shall be elected for one (1) year terms. The parent 24 members shall be elected by the parents of students preregistered to 25 attend the school during the term of office in an election conducted by 26 the parent and teacher organization of the school or, if none exists, the 27 largest organization of parents formed for this purpose. Council

1		elections may allow voting to occur over multiple days and via
2		electronic means. A school council, once elected, may adopt a policy
3		setting different terms of office for parent and teacher members
4		subsequently elected. The principal shall be the chair of the school
5		council.

27		administrator and the instructional leader of the school, and with the

1		assistance of the total school staff shall administer the policies
2		established by the school council and the local board.
3		2. If a school council establishes committees, it shall adopt a policy to
4		facilitate the participation of interested persons, including, but not
5		limited to, classified employees and parents. The policy shall include the
6		number of committees, their jurisdiction, composition, and the process
7		for membership selection;
8	(d)	The school council and each of its committees shall determine the frequency
9		of and agenda for their meetings. Matters relating to formation of school
10		councils that are not provided for by this section shall be addressed by local
11		board policy;
12	(e)	The meetings of the school council shall be open to the public and all
13		interested persons may attend. However, the exceptions to open meetings
14		provided in KRS 61.810 shall apply;
15	(f)	After receiving notification of the funds available for the school from the local
16		board, the school council shall determine, within the parameters of the total
17		available funds, the number of persons to be employed in each job
18		classification at the school. The council may make personnel decisions on
19		vacancies occurring after the school council is formed but shall not have the
20		authority to recommend transfers or dismissals;
21	(g)	The <i>local superintendent</i> [school council] shall determine which <i>curriculum</i> ,

8	(i)	The	school council shall adopt a policy that shall be consistent with local
9		<u>boar</u>	rd policy and shall [to] be implemented by the principal in the following

12			[development and] responsibilities under KRS 158.6453(19);
13		2.	Assignment of all instructional and noninstructional staff time;

- Procedures to assist the council with consultation in the selection of <u>the</u> *principal by the superintendent, and the selection of* personnel by the
 principal, including but not limited to meetings, timelines, interviews,
 review of written applications, and review of references. Procedures
 shall address situations in which members of the council are not
 available for consultation; and
- 10 Each school council shall annually review data as shown on state and local (i) 11 student assessments required under KRS 158.6453. The data shall include but 12 not be limited to information on performance levels of all students tested, and 13 information on the performance of students disaggregated by race, gender, 14 disability, and participation in the federal free and reduced price lunch 15 program. After completing the review of data, each school council, with the 16 involvement of parents, faculty, and staff, shall develop and adopt a plan to 17 ensure that each student makes progress toward meeting the goals set forth in 18 KRS 158.645 and 158.6451(1)(b) by April 1 of each year and submit the plan 19 to the superintendent and local board of education for review as described in 20 KRS 160.340. 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1 158.6455 may apply to the Kentucky Board of Education for exemption from the 2 requirement to implement school-based decision making, and the state board shall 3 grant the exemption. The voting by the parents on the matter of exemption from 4 implementing school-based decision making shall be in an election conducted by 5 the parent and teacher organization of the school or, if none exists, the largest 6 organization of parents formed for this purpose. Notwithstanding the provisions of 7 this section, a local school district shall not be required to implement school-based 8 decision making if the local school district contains only one (1) school.

9 (6) The Department of Education shall provide professional development activities to 10 assist schools in implementing school-based decision making. School council 11 members elected for the first time shall complete a minimum of six (6) clock hours 12 of training in the process of school-based decision making, no later than thirty (30) 13 days after the beginning of the service year for which they are elected to serve. 14 School council members who have served on a school council at least one (1) year 15 shall complete a minimum of three (3) clock hours of training in the process of 16 school-based decision making no later than one hundred twenty (120) days after the 17 beginning of the service year for which they are elected to serve. Experienced 18 members may participate in the training for new members to fulfill their training 19 requirement. School council training required under this subsection shall be 20 conducted by trainers endorsed by the Department of Education. School council members 24 elected to fill a vacancy shall complete the applicable training within thirty (30) 25 days of their election.

19 (9) (a) No board member, superintendent of schools, district employee, or member of 20 a school council shall intentionally engage in a pattern of practice which is 21 detrimental to the successful implementation of or circumvents the intent of 22 school-based decision making to allow the professional staff members of a 23 school and parents to be involved in the decision making process in working 24 toward meeting the educational goals established in KRS 158.645 and 25 158.6451 or to make decisions in areas of policy assigned to a school council 26 pursuant to paragraph (i) of subsection (2) of this section.

(b) An affected party who believes a violation of this subsection has occurred may

file a written complaint with the Office of Education Accountability. The

- (11) Each school council of a school containing grades K-5 or any combination thereof,
 or if there is no school council, the principal, shall develop and implement a
 wellness policy that includes moderate to vigorous physical activity each day and
 encourages healthy choices among students. The policy may permit physical activity
 to be considered part of the instructional day, not to exceed thirty (30) minutes per

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1 day, or one hundred and fifty (150) minutes per week. Each school council, or if 2 there is no school council, the principal, shall adopt an assessment tool to determine 3 each child's level of physical activity on an annual basis. 15 → Section 2. KRS 158.6453 is amended to read as follows:

16 (1) As used in this section:

- (a) "Accelerated learning" means an organized way of helping students meet
 individual academic goals by providing direct instruction to eliminate student
 performance deficiencies or enable students to move more quickly through
 course requirements and pursue higher level skill development;
- (b) "Constructed-response items" or "performance-based items" means individual
 test items that require the student to create an answer rather than select a
 response and may include fill-in-the-blank, short-answer, extended-answer,
 open-response, and writing-on-demand formats;
- (c) "Criterion-referenced test" means a test that is aligned with defined academic
 content standards and measures an individual student's level of performance
 against the standards;

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(d) "End-of-course examination" means the same as defined in KRS 158.860;

(e) "Formative assessment" means a process used by teachers and students during
instruction to adjust ongoing teaching and learning to improve students'
achievement of intended instructional outcomes. Formative assessments may
include the use of commercial assessments, classroom observations, teacherdesigned classroom tests and assessments, and other processes and
assignments to gain information about individual student learning;

- 8 (f) "Interim assessments" means assessments that are given periodically 9 throughout the year to provide diagnostic information and to show individual 10 student performance against content standards;
- (g) "Summative assessment" means an assessment given at the end of the school
 year, semester, or other period of time to evaluate students' performance
 against content standards within a unit of instruction or a course; and
- (h) "Writing" means a purposeful act of thinking and expression that uses
 language to explore ideas and communicate meaning to others. Writing is a
 complex, multifaceted act of communication.
- (2) (a) Beginning in fiscal year 2017-2018, and every six (6) years thereafter, the

Section 9. Whereas school employees have been negatively impacted by the COVID-19 public health crisis, and while school employees who were quarantined due to COVID-19 were provided paid leave for that purpose while school employees with active COVID-19 infections were not afforded that same benefit, an emergency is declared to exist, and Section 6 of this Act takes effect upon its passage and approval by the Governor or upon its otherwise becoming a law.
