A RESOLUTION recognizing and denouncing the persecution of Christians around
 the world.

WHEREAS, citizens of Kentucky and the United States at-large are blessed to be
able to worship God freely and to have their religious freedoms protected; and

5 WHEREAS, these same freedoms are not enjoyed in other places around the world.
6 Christians are enduring persecution, whether it be through discrimination, violence, or
7 oppressive government policies; and

8 WHEREAS, in Nigeria, more than 50,000 Christians have been killed since 2009 as 9 terrorist groups like Boko Haram, ISIS-West Africa, and Fulani militants run rampant. 10 More Christians die because of their faith in Nigeria each year than in all other countries 11 combined. On average, a Christian is killed in Nigeria every two hours; and

WHEREAS, in India, 12 of the 28 states have implemented anti-conversion laws which prevent individuals from changing their faith. Individuals who try to convert could spend up to ten years in prison and face hundreds of dollars in fines. Further, since May of 2023, unrest in India's Manipur state has resulted in the destruction of approximately 200 to 400 churches and 3,500 Christian homes; and

WHEREAS, in Pakistan, Christian women and girls are forcibly married andconverted to Islam; and

WHEREAS, in Algeria, the government has closed more than 40 Protestant Christian churches since 2018. A 2006 law which requires non-Muslims to worship only in government-approved buildings is frequently used to target Christians. Dozens of church pastors have been arrested for producing and distributing the Bible and sharing their faith; and

WHEREAS, in Vietnam, Christians provide yet another example of religious prosecution that is mischaracterized as ethnic tensions. The Montagnard ethnic group in northern Vietnam has been persecuted due to its large Christian population in the repressive state. In the past several years, hundreds of Montagnards have been

imprisoned, and there have been multiple documented cases of Christians being assassinated as they fled to neighboring Thailand to escape persecution; and WHEREAS, International Christian Concern, a watchdog and advocacy group for persecuted Christians, estimates that between 200 and 300 million Christians are persecuted globally. In its 2023 Persecutors of the Year report, which highlights the biggest violators of Christian persecution, International Christian Concern included countries such as Nigeria, Iran, Eritrea, Azerbaijan, and India. Their findings also included government leaders, like China's Xi Jinping and Turkey's Tayyip Erdogan, as proponents for Christian persecution; NOW, THEREFORE,
Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:
◆Section 1. The Senate calls on the federal government to stand in solidarity with

Section 1. The Senate calls on the federal government to stand in solidarity with
our Christian brothers and sisters who are persecuted for their beliefs and champion the
cause of international religious freedom for all.

Section 2. The Senate stands united against the suppression and persecution of
religious groups wherever it may occur. All people should enjoy the freedom to practice
one's religion without fear.
