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1	A RESOLUTION urging adoption of racial and ethnic community criminal justice
2	and public safety impact statements.
3	WHEREAS, public policymakers are increasingly concerned with the disparity
4	between the number of minorities in the population and the number incarcerated in jails
5	and prisons; and
6	WHEREAS, racial and ethnic disparities in America's criminal justice system result
7	in devastating consequences to society; and
8	WHEREAS, families of incarcerated individuals face the shame and stigma
9	associated with incarceration, as well as the loss of financial and emotional support of a
10	loved one; and
11	WHEREAS, individuals reentering society face daunting employment challenges,
12	reduced lifetime employment earnings, and lack of access to public benefits; and
13	WHEREAS, high rates of recidivism and burgeoning prison system costs affect all
14	communities; and
15	WHEREAS, nationally, one of every nine black males between 20 and 34 years old
16	is incarcerated; and
17	WHEREAS, 37 percent of prisoners under federal and state jurisdiction at the end
18	of 2014 were black, 32 percent were white, and 22 percent were Hispanic; and
19	WHEREAS, according to 2014 United States Census data, 13.2 percent of the
20	United States population is black; and
21	WHEREAS, in Kentucky, 21 percent of the prison population is African-American
22	but, according to 2016 United States Census data, 10.2 percent of the Kentucky
23	population is black or reports two or more races; and
24	WHEREAS, criminal justice policies, while neutral on their face, often adversely
25	affect minority communities, and these unintended consequences could be more
26	adequately addressed prior to adoption of a new initiative, particularly since such
27	initiatives, once adopted, often are difficult to reverse; and

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1	WHEREAS, strong independent state legislatures need the tools, information, and
2	resources to craft the best solutions to difficult problems; and
3	WHEREAS, racial and ethnic community criminal justice and public safety impact
4	statements are tools to guide policymakers in proactively assessing how proposed
5	sentencing initiatives affect racial and ethnic disparities of adults and juveniles in the
6	criminal justice system. Similar to fiscal and corrections impact statements, they provide
7	legislators and agencies with a statistical analysis of the projected impact of policy
8	changes before legislative deliberation or administrative regulation adoption; and
9	WHEREAS, four states - Iowa, Connecticut, Oregon, and New Jersey - have
10	implemented racial impact statement requirements in order to guide the creation of fair
11	criminal justice policies; and
12	WHEREAS, it is altogether fitting and proper, and in the public interest, to require
13	racial and ethnic community criminal justice and public safety impact statements to be
14	prepared for bills, resolutions, or amendments that may result in an increase or a decrease
15	in adult and juvenile pretrial detention, sentencing, probation, or parole populations; and
16	WHEREAS, it is also altogether fitting and proper, and in the public interest, to
17	require racial and ethnic community criminal justice and public safety impact statements
18	to be included in the notice of a proposed agency rule that could increase or decrease
19	adult and juvenile pretrial detention, sentencing, probation, or parole populations;
20	NOW, THEREFORE,
21	Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of
22	Kentucky:
23	→ Section 1. The Kentucky Senate supports criminal justice reform to make our
24	justice system more effective and more reflective of our highest ideals.
25	→ Section 2. The Kentucky Senate urges the General Assembly to adopt
26	legislation requiring racial and ethnic community criminal justice and public safety

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impact statements, in order to better guide legislative decision making.

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
