A RESOLUTION urging first responders, including state police, city police, county
 sheriffs and deputies, firefighters, and emergency medical services personnel, to receive
 training on autism spectrum disorders.

WHEREAS, "autism spectrum disorders" refers to a group of complex
neurodevelopment disorders characterized by repetitive and characteristic patterns of
behavior and difficulties with social communication and interaction; and

WHEREAS, the "spectrum" refers to a wide range of symptoms, skills, and levels
of disability in functioning that can occur; and

9 WHEREAS, autism spectrum disorders occur in every racial and ethnic group,
10 across all socioeconomic levels, and represent the fastest growing serious developmental
11 disability in the United States, affecting approximately 1 in 68 children; and

WHEREAS, first responders may not be aware that an individual has autism when arriving on the scene in an emergency or crisis situation, and being able to identify and interact constructively in these cases can be essential to their safe resolution; and

WHEREAS, the difficulties individuals with autism may have with social communication and interaction can include a variety of responses to certain stressful stimuli; and

WHEREAS, some individuals with autism do not have a range of sensations and
may not feel the cold, heat, or pain in a typical manner, or may fail to acknowledge pain
or may respond to pain in unusual ways; and

WHEREAS, some may have tactile sensory issues and sensory perception issues,
which can increase anxiety and aggression in response to routine procedures carried out
by a first responder; and

WHEREAS, persons with autism may also have an impaired sense of danger or may
not respond to verbal commands, which can be mistaken for disobedience; and

WHEREAS, the level of noise and commotion that may accompany a crisis situation may overwhelm an individual with autism, as well as the very presence of

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uniformed first responders; and

WHEREAS, first responders are trained to respond to crisis situations according to
a set protocol, but that protocol may not always be best, or may inadvertently be harmful
or escalating, for a person with autism; and

5 WHEREAS, for these reasons and many others, it is critical that first responders, 6 including state police, city police, county sheriffs and deputies, firefighters, and 7 emergency medical services personnel, receive training on autism spectrum disorders; 8 and

9 WHEREAS, because first responders are vital in their role as protectors of people 10 and public safety, such training could be not only effective and valuable, but also life-11 saving for the people of the Commonwealth of Kentucky;

12 NOW, THEREFORE,

Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of
Kentucky:

Section 1. The Senate expresses appreciation for the integral role first
responders play in caring for the citizens of Kentucky, and urges first responders,
including state police, city police, county sheriffs and deputies, firefighters, and
emergency medical services personnel, to receive training on autism spectrum disorders.
