CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES: Prohibits a person convicted of a violation involving a Schedule I controlled dangerous substance from holding an alcoholic beverage permit

1	AN ACT
2	To enact R.S. 40:966(I), relative to violations of the Controlled Dangerous Substances Law;
3	to provide for additional penalties for certain violations involving Schedule I
4	controlled dangerous substances; to permanently prohibit a person convicted of
5	certain controlled dangerous substances violations from holding an alcoholic
6	beverage permit; and to provide for related matters.
7	Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana:
8	Section 1. R.S. 40:966(I) is hereby enacted to read as follows:
9	§966. Penalty for distribution or possession with intent to distribute narcotic drugs
10	listed in Schedule I; possession of marijuana, possession of synthetic
11	cannabinoids
12	* * *
13	I.(1) Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary, any person
14	who violates the provisions of Subsection A of this Section with respect to a
15	substance classified in Schedule I, upon conviction, shall be permanently prohibited
16	from holding any permit issued pursuant to the Alcoholic Beverages Control Law.
17	(2) If the person is holding a permit issued pursuant to the Alcoholic
18	Beverages Control Law at the time of conviction, he shall surrender the permit
19	immediately upon conviction.
20	(3) The prohibition provided for in this Subsection shall be for the lifetime
21	of the offender.

Abstract: Prohibits a person convicted of a Schedule I CDS violation from holding an alcoholic beverage permit.

Present law provides for violations of the controlled dangerous substances law.

<u>Present law</u> provides that Schedule I CDS are highly addictive and have no accepted medical use.

<u>Present law</u> provides for the permitting of alcoholic beverage facilities.

Proposed law retains these provisions of present law.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides that any person who is convicted of manufacturing, production, distribution, or dispensing or possession with intent to manufacture, produce, distribute, or dispense a Schedule I CDS, shall be permanently prohibited from holding any permit issued pursuant to the Alcoholic Beverages Control Law.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides that if the person currently has an alcoholic beverage permit, he shall surrender it immediately.
