APPROPRIATIONS: Appropriates funds for the expenses of the judiciary for Fiscal Year 2024-2025

AN ACT

2 To appropriate funds to defray the expenses of the Louisiana Judiciary, including the 3 Supreme Court, Courts of Appeal, District Courts, Criminal District Court of Orleans 4 Parish, and other courts; to provide for an effective date; and to provide for related 5 matters. 6 Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana: 7 Section 1. A. The sum of Two Hundred Thirteen Million Seven Hundred Forty-Five 8 Thousand Eight Hundred Sixty-Nine (\$213,745,869) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be 9 necessary, is hereby appropriated to defray the expenses of the judiciary, including the 10 Supreme Court, Courts of Appeal, the District Courts, the Criminal District Court of Orleans 11 Parish, and of the other courts. 12 B. The total amount herein appropriated is hereby allocated to provide as follows: 13 03-8170 SUPREME COURT 14 15 16 17 18 19 20 21 22 23 **Program Description:** The Supreme Court has general supervisory jurisdiction over all lower courts. It may establish procedural and administrative rules not in conflict with law and may assign a sitting or retired judge to any court. The Supreme Court has sole authority to provide by rule for appointments of attorneys as temporary or ad hoc judges. It considers applications for writs to review individual cases, and has criminal and other appellate jurisdiction. The Supreme Court has exclusive original jurisdiction of disciplinary proceedings against lawyers, recommendations of the Judiciary Commission of Louisiana for the discipline of judges, and fact questions affecting its appellate jurisdiction. It has inherent authority to regulate the legal profession and to promulgate and update the Code of Judicial Conduct. The Judicial Administrator's Office also manages the ad hoc judgeship system, monitors cases under advisement, provides support for initiatives to ensure access to the courts for limited English proficiency individuals; provides outreach services to state and local courts, applies for and administers grants to improve judicial administration; and staffs the Committee on Judicial Ethics. The Judicial Administrator's office administers several programs, including the Supreme Court Drug Court / Specialty Court Office, the Louisiana Protective Order Registry, and CASA and FINS through the Division of Children and Families. The Judicial Administrator's office also provides staff support for the Louisiana Judicial College, and performs numerous legal services for the Supreme Court and the Judiciary. 27 B. Program Description: There are forty-one district courts in Louisiana that have general jurisdiction over all matters within their territorial limits, except in those judicial districts (the 1st, the 19th, and the 24th Judicial Districts) where family and juvenile courts have exclusive jurisdiction over certain types of cases and except in Orleans Parish where there are separate courts exercising civil, criminal, and juvenile jurisdictions. In certain cases, the forty-one general jurisdiction courts have concurrent jurisdiction with justices of the peace and parish courts. The district courts generally have appellate jurisdiction of criminal cases tried by city, parish, municipal, traffic, and mayors' courts, except in certain cases. The district courts also have appellate jurisdiction over justices of the peace in parishes where no parish courts exist. The Civil District Court of Orleans Parish has jurisdiction of all civil cases in that parish. The Criminal District Court of Orleans Parish has jurisdiction over all criminal cases in that parish. It also has general supervisory jurisdiction over the municipal and traffic court in Orleans Parish. The Family Court of East Baton Rouge Parish has exclusive jurisdiction of many domestic cases in that parish. The four juvenile courts located in Caddo, East Baton Rouge, Jefferson, and Orleans parishes have exclusive jurisdiction of juvenile cases in their respective parishes.

38	Section 2.A. The Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, or his duly authorized and						
39	appointed agent, shall warrant the state treasurer for the allocations herein provided, or for						
40	so much thereof as may be necessary. The aforesaid warrant shall be paid out of the State						
41	General Fund, and the state treasurer shall pay said warrant by preference over all other						

1 warrants, except warrants for the salaries of constitutional officers of the state and warrants

2 for expenses of the legislature, which shall be concurrent with the warrant provided by this

- 3 Act.
- B. The funds drawn as provided herein shall be deposited in the name of the judiciary
- 5 in an approved bank that has been selected by the Supreme Court and is located in the state.
- 6 C. Any funds herein allocated to the judiciary, any portion of the funds previously
- 7 appropriated to the judiciary, other revenue of the judiciary or its agencies, and interest
- 8 earnings are hereby appropriated and may be used to defray the expenses of the judiciary;
- 9 however, all funds remaining unexpended or unencumbered shall be returnable to the State
- General Fund on or before September 1, 2025.
- D. For Fiscal Year 2024-2025, any surpluses occurring in the appropriations made in
- 12 this Act may be transferred from one agency or line-item to another during the fiscal year
- in accordance with the rules of the Judicial Budgetary Control Board, or as approved by the
- 14 Supreme Court.
- 15 E. The adjustment to be made in the salaries of judicial employees and the number of
- authorized positions of the judiciary shall be as decided by the judicial agency affected,
- subject to the approval of the Judicial Budgetary Control Board, or as approved by the
- 18 Supreme Court.
- F. The program descriptions contained in this Act are not part of the law and are not
- 20 enacted into law by virtue of their inclusion in this Act.
- G. The inclusion in this Act of staff salaries and benefits for lower court or other judicial
- branch agency employees shall not be deemed to create or impose any obligation upon the
- 23 State of Louisiana Judicial Branch, the Supreme Court of Louisiana, the Judicial Budgetary
- 24 Control Board, or the Supreme Court Judicial Administrator's Office relative to the
- administration of pay, retirement, or other benefits to any such employees. Accordingly, the
- 26 State of Louisiana Judicial Branch, the Supreme Court of Louisiana, the Judicial Budgetary
- 27 Control Board, and the Supreme Court Judicial Administrator's Office are not to be
- considered the "employer" or "employing agency" of lower court or other judicial agency
- employees whose staff salaries and other benefits are included in this Act.

1 Section 3. The appropriations, and the allocations of such appropriations, from the State 2 General Fund (Direct) contained in Section 1 of this Act shall be reduced by a total amount 3 of Thirteen Million Six Hundred Sixty-Six Thousand Two Hundred Eighty-Five 4 (\$13,666,285) Dollars, pursuant to a plan adopted by the Judicial Budgetary Control Board 5 or as approved by the Louisiana Supreme Court. 6 Section 4. The appropriations, and the allocations of such appropriations, from the State 7 General Fund (Direct) contained in Section 1 of this Act, for the salaries of four (4) 8 commissioners including related benefits, office and travel expenses of commissioners, 9 salaries of four (4) minute clerks for the commissioners, and salaries of four (4) court 10 reporters for the commissioners of the Criminal Court, Parish of Orleans, shall be reduced 11 by a total amount of Seven Hundred Forty-Three Thousand Fifty-Seven (\$743,057) Dollars. 12 Section 5. The appropriations, and the allocations of such appropriations, from the State General Fund (Direct) contained in Section 1 of this Act shall be increased by a total amount 13 14 of Two Million Seven Hundred Seventy-One Thousand Seven Hundred Forty-Five 15 (\$2,771,745) Dollars to be distributed as follows: Seven Hundred Fifty-Eight Thousand One 16 Hundred Forty-Two (\$758,142) Dollars for the funding of additional positions with Families 17 in Need of Services and the Louisiana Protective Order Registry; Seven Hundred Thirty-18 Four Thousand Five Hundred Fifty-Three (\$734,553) Dollars for the expansion of Families 19 in Need of Services; Six Hundred Fifty Thousand (\$650,000) Dollars for Louisiana Drug and 20 Specialty Courts; and Six Hundred Twenty-Nine Thousand Fifty (\$629,050) Dollars for 21 Court Appointed Special Advocates. 22 Section 6. The appropriations, and the allocations of such appropriations, from the State 23 General Fund (Direct) contained in Section 1 of this Act shall be increased by a total amount 24 of Five Million Seven Hundred Thousand (\$5,700,000) Dollars for the operation of drug 25 courts. 26 Section 7. No funds appropriated in this Act, including any fund balances of the 27 judiciary, shall be used to fund salary increases for judges until the work point study by the 28 National Center for State Courts is completed in accordance with House Resolution 3 of the 29 2024 Regular Session.

1 Section 8. This Act shall become effective on July 1, 2024; if vetoed by the governor

- 2 and subsequently approved by the legislature, this Act shall become effective on July 1,
- 3 2024, or on the day following such approval by the legislature, whichever is later.
