ENVIRONMENT/LITTERING: Requests the House Committee on Natural Resources and Environment to study the effects of recycling, enforcement, and education on litter reduction

A STUDY REQUEST

2	To the House Committee on Natural Resources and Environment to study the effects of
3	recycling, enforcement, and education on reducing litter, and to report its findings
4	to the House of Representatives prior to the convening of the 2011 Regular Session
5	of the Legislature.
6	WHEREAS, litter is a major problem in this state that negatively effects our
7	environment, our communities, and, both directly and indirectly, our economy; and
8	WHEREAS, litter impacts the environment through habitat destruction in marine and
9	aquatic ecosystems and to pet and wildlife injury and death due to litter entanglement,
10	toxicity, and ingestion; and
11	WHEREAS, litter is a breeding ground for vermin and disease-causing bacteria; and
12	WHEREAS, litter impacts the public safety in ways ranging from roadside fires
13	caused by discarded cigarettes to neighborhoods that are heavily littered experience more
14	vandalism and other crime; and
15	WHEREAS, according to a recent study commissioned by Keep Louisiana Beautiful,
16	the direct economic impact of paying to have litter collected and disposed costs local and
17	state government forty million dollars per year; and
18	WHEREAS, this forty-million-dollar-per-year price tag is in addition to other direct
19	costs incurred for enforcing litter laws and developing programs and advertisements
20	encouraging and educating Louisiana citizens on the dangers of litter and the indirect

1 economic impacts including real estate devaluation, loss of new industry and business, and

2 loss of tourism and ecotourism; and

3 WHEREAS, in an effort to combat litter and to return material into commerce that 4 would otherwise occupy landfill space as solid waste, several states have enacted bottle 5

deposit programs to create an incentive for consumers to return beverage containers which

make up a large portion of litter; and

WHEREAS, bottle deposit programs provide entrepreneurial opportunities for small businesses including the establishment of recycle collection centers and the sale, lease, and maintenance of reverse vending machines; and

WHEREAS, in the committee debate of House Bill No. 760 by Representative Lambert which proposed to enact such a bottle deposit program, members expressed interest in examining the totality of the litter problem and other approaches to addressing the issue.

THEREFORE, the House of Representatives of the Legislature of Louisiana requests the House Committee on Natural Resources and Environment to study the effects of recycling, enforcement, and education on reducing litter, and to report its findings to the House of Representatives prior to the convening of the 2011 Regular Session of the Legislature.
