1	AN ACT
2	To enact Part VII of Chapter 15 of Title 37 of the Louisiana Revised Statutes of 1950, to be
3	comprised of R.S. 37:1360.81 through 1360.95, and R.S. 37:2353(C)(7), relative to
4	behavioral analysts; to provide for the Board Certified Behavioral Analyst Practice
5	Act; to provide for additional authority to the Louisiana State Board of Examiners
6	for Psychologists; and to provide for related matters.
7	Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana:
8	Section 1. Part VII of Chapter 15 of Title 37 of the Louisiana Revised Statutes of
9	1950, comprised of R.S. 37:1360.81 through 1360.95, and R.S. 37:2353(C)(7) are hereby
10	enacted to read as follows:
11	Part VII. BEHAVIORAL ANALYSTS
12	<u>§1360.81. Short title</u>
13	This Part may be cited as the "Board Certified Behavioral Analyst
14	Practice Act''.
15	<u>§1360.82. Definitions</u>
16	As used in this Part the following words, terms, and phrases have the
17	meaning ascribed to them in this Section, unless the context clearly indicates a

2	(1)"Applied behavior analysis" means the design, implementation, and
3	evaluation of environmental modifications, using behavioral stimuli and
4	consequences, to produce socially significant improvements in and
5	understanding of human behavior based on the principles of behavior identified
6	through the experimental analysis of behavior. It includes the empirical
7	identification of functional relations between behavior and environments. It
8	uses direct observation and measurement of behavior and environment.
9	Interventions based on scientific research are used and includes contextual
10	factors, establishing operations, antecedent stimuli, positive reinforcers, and
11	other consequences, based on identified functional relationships with the
12	environment, in order to produce practical behavior change.
13	(2) "Board" means Louisiana State Board of Examiners of Psychologists.
14	(3)"Certification board" means the Behavior Analyst Certification
15	Board and/or its equivalent recommended by the Licensed Behavior Analyst
16	Committee and approved by the board.
17	(4)"Certified" means a practitioner who has met the certification criteria
18	of and has received a certificate from the certification board.
19	(5)''Licensed behavior analyst'' or ''LBA'' means an individual who by
20	education and experience meets the requirements for licensing by the board and
21	is duly licensed to independently practice applied behavior analysis.
22	(6)"Licensed Behavior Analyst Committee" or "LBAC" means a
23	committee, established by the board for purposes as defined in this Part.
24	(7)"Recognized educational institution" means a degree-granting college
25	or university that is accredited by a regional board or association of institutions
26	of higher education approved by the Council on Post-Secondary Education of
27	the United States Department of Education. The program shall also include an
28	approved course sequence of the behavior analyst certification board or its
29	successor and/or equivalent approved by the Licensed Behavior Analyst

2	(8)"Supervised experience" means services rendered as a part of the
3	certification requirements of a behavior analyst or board certified associate
4	behavior analyst under the supervision of a licensed behavior analyst or
5	psychologist as approved by the Licensed Behavior Analyst Committee.
6	§1360.83. Powers and duties of the board
7	The board shall have and exercise with respect to licensed behavior
8	analysts, all powers and duties granted to it by R.S. 37:2351 et seq. In addition,
9	the board shall have the authority to:
10	(1) Establish and publish standards of applied behavior analysis practice
11	in accordance with those developed and accepted by the profession represented
12	by such organizations as the Behavior Analysis Certification Board, Association
13	for Behavior Analysis International and/or others deemed appropriate by the
14	Licensed Behavior Analyst Committee and approved by the board.
15	(2) Approve, deny, revoke, suspend, renew and reinstate licensure of
16	duly qualified applicants based on the recommendation of the Licensed
17	Behavior Analyst Committee and approved by the board.
18	(3) Adopt, revise, and enforce orders, rules, and regulations for licensure
19	and renewal as recommended by the Licensed Behavior Analyst Committee to
20	ensure the competency of applicants, the protection of the public, and proper
21	administration of this Part in accordance with the Administrative Procedure
22	Act. Any rules regarding the practice of applied behavior analysis shall be
23	consistent with the standards established by the Behavior Analyst Certification
24	Board or other certifying boards as recommended by the Licensed Behavior
25	Analyst Committee and approved by the board.
26	(4) Conduct hearings on charges calling for the denial, suspension,
27	revocation, or refusal to renew a license with a designee from the Licensed
28	Behavior Analyst Committee present. Such designee shall be appointed as
29	needed by the chair of the board.

1	<u>§1360.84. License required</u>
2	No one shall hold himself out as a licensed behavior analyst unless
3	licensed in accordance with the provisions of this Part.
4	§1360.85. Qualifications of applicants
5	A. Notwithstanding any other provision of the Part or other law to the
6	contrary, any applied behavior analyst shall be issued an applied behavior
7	analyst license by the board upon satisfaction of all of the following criteria:
8	(1) Submit to the board a completed application form approved by the
9	Licensed Behavior Analyst Committee.
10	(2) Pay all necessary licensure fees.
11	(3) Hold a master's degree or doctoral degree from a regionally
12	accredited college or university with approved course sequence of the Behavior
13	Analyst Certification Board or it successor and/or equivalent reviewed by the
14	Licensed Behavior Analyst Committee and approved by the board.
15	(4) The successful completion of an approved or supervised experience
16	in the practice of applied behavior analysis as an approved experiential
17	sequence of the Behavior Analyst Certification Board or its successor and/or
18	equivalent reviewed by the Licensed Behavior Analyst Committee and approved
19	by the board.
20	(5) The successful completion of a nationally recognized examination
21	related to the principles and practice of the profession of applied behavior
22	analysis administered by the Behavior Analyst Certification Board or its
23	successor and/or equivalent reviewed by the Licensed Behavior Analyst
24	Committee and approved by the board.
25	(6) The successful completion of a jurisprudence examination covering
26	the laws and rules governing the practice of behavior analysis in Louisiana
27	reviewed by the Licensed Behavior Analyst Committee and approved by the
28	board. Once the jurisprudence examination is successfully completed,
29	candidates may pay the licensure fee and be granted a licensed to practice

1	applied behavior analysis in Louisiana.
2	(7) Maintains active status and fulfills all requirements for renewal and
3	recertification with the Behavior Analysis Certification Board as a board
4	certified behavior analyst and/or other certifying board as reviewed by the
5	Licensed Behavior Analyst Committee and approved by the board.
6	(8) Conducts his professional activities in accordance with accepted
7	standards, including the Guidelines for Responsible Conduct for Behavior
8	Analysts and Professional Disciplinary Standards of the Behavior Analyst
9	Certification Board or other national professional organizations as reviewed
10	by the Licensed Behavior Analyst Committee and approved by the board.
11	(9) Has not been subject to disciplinary suspension or revocation by the
12	Behavior Analyst Certification Board, for violation of the professional
13	disciplinary and ethical standards.
14	B. Applied behavior analyst applicants who have suspended licenses by
15	the board may reapply after three years.
16	C. Until August 1, 2013, an applicant who has graduated with a doctoral
17	or master's degree from a regionally accredited university and who holds the
18	board certified behavior analyst certificate from the Behavior Analyst
19	Certification Board will be eligible to be granted status as a licensed behavior
20	analyst. Thereafter, applications must meet the requirements noted above in
21	this Section.
22	§1360.86. Issuance and renewal of license
23	A. The board shall issue a license to any person who meets the
24	qualifications provided in this Part and the rules and regulations of the board,
25	and who pays the applicable fees fixed by the board.
26	B. A license issued under provisions of this Part shall be subject to
27	annual renewal and shall expire and become null and void unless renewed in the
28	manner prescribed by the board and recommended by the Licensed Behavior
29	Analyst Committee.

1	C. License renewal shall require documentation of completion of the
2	continuing education required by this Part.
3	<u>§1360.87. Reinstatement of license</u>
4	A. Any license suspended, revoked, or otherwise restricted by the board
5	may be reinstated by the board based upon recommendations by the Licensed
6	Behavior Analyst Committee.
7	B. A license that has expired without renewal for a
8	period of one year from the date of expiration may be
9	reinstated by the board upon recommendation from the
10	Licensed Behavior Analyst Committee provided the
11	applicant is otherwise eligible under the provisions of
12	this Part, pays the applicable fees, satisfies the
13	continuing education requirement, and such other
14	requirements as may be established by the board based on
15	recommendation by the Licensed Behavior Analyst
16	Committee.
17	<u>§1360.88. Licensed Behavior Analyst Committee</u>
18	A. The Licensed Behavior Analyst Committee shall be established by the
19	<u>board for the purpose of reviewing and recommending action on application for</u>
20	licensure and relicensure, recommending educational and training
21	requirements, establishing a professional code of conduct, recommending
22	changes in related statutes and rules, as well as other activities as may be
23	requested by the board or activities provided in this Part.
24	B. The Licensed Behavior Analyst Committee shall consist of two
25	certified and licensed behavior analysts and one licensed psychologist approved
26	by the executive board of the Louisiana Association for Behavior Analysis.
27	(1) The two certified behavior analysts, who shall become licensed once
28	this Part becomes effective, shall be appointed by the Louisiana Association for
29	Behavior Analysis.
30	(2) The licensed psychologist shall be appointed by the Louisiana State

2	(3) The chair of the board shall serve as an ex officio, non-voting member
3	of the committee; however, the chair may vote in cases of a tie vote.
4	<u>C. Members of the committee shall serve at the pleasure of the board. A</u>
5	vacancy in an unexpired term shall be filled in the manner of the original
6	appointment.
7	D. The committee may meet as needed but shall meet at least quarterly.
8	A majority of the members of the committee shall constitute a quorum for the
9	transaction of all business.
10	E. Members of the committee shall serve without compensation but shall
11	be reimbursed for reasonable travel expenses incurred in attendance at
12	meetings and other official business on behalf of the committee or the board.
13	§1360.89. Continuing education
14	A. A licensed behavior analyst shall annually complete a minimum of
15	twelve hours of continuing education relevant to the practice of behavior
16	analyst.
17	B. To qualify under the requirements within this Part, all continuing
18	education classes shall be approved by the Licensed Behavior Analyst
19	<u>Committee.</u>
20	<u>§1360.90. Fees</u>
21	The board under its authority established within R.S. 37:2351 et seq.,
22	shall fix fees in accordance with the Administrative Procedure Act for the
23	purpose of administering the provisions of this Part.
24	<u>§1360.91. Causes for refusal to issue, suspension, or revocation of license</u>
25	A. Upon the recommendation of the Licensed Behavior Analyst
26	Committee, the board may refuse to issue any license required under this
27	Chapter for any cause or any combination of causes stated in this Section. The
28	Licensed Behavior Analyst Committee shall give written notice of the reasons
29	for the refusal.

1	B. Upon the recommendation of the Licensed Behavior Analyst
2	Committee, the board may suspend or revoke any license or impose
3	probationary or other restrictions on any license under this Part for the
4	following causes:
5	(1) Conviction of a felony or nolo contendere plea or conviction of any
6	crime or offense of or relating to the practice of applied behavioral analysis.
7	(2) Knowingly make or present, or cause to be made or presented, any
8	false, fraudulent, or forged statement, writing, certificate, diploma, or other
9	thing, in connection with an application for a license or permit.
10	(3) Refusing to appear before the Licensed Behavior Analyst Committee
11	after having been duly ordered to do so in writing by a duly authorized agent
12	of the board as a result of the Licensed Behavior Analyst Committee
13	recommendation.
14	(4) Habitual or recurring abuse of drugs, including alcohol, which affects
15	the central nervous system, and which is capable of inducing physiological or
16	psychological dependence.
17	(5) Refusing to submit to the examinations and inquiry of an examining
18	committee of physicians appointed or designated by the board to inquire into
19	an applicant or licensee's physical and mental fitness and ability to practice
20	applied behavior analysis with reasonable skill and safety to patients.
21	(6) Impersonating another licensed practitioner or any person holding
22	a certificate of registration of authority, permit, or license or allowing any
23	person to use his or her certificate or authority, permit, license or diploma from
24	any school.
25	(7) Incompetence, including but not limited to a person who has been
26	unable to practice applied behavior analysis to acceptable and prevailing
27	standards of care by reason of mental or physical illness or other condition,
28	including but not limited to physical deterioration that adversely affects
29	<u>cognitive, motor, or perceptive skills.</u>

1	(8) Voluntary or involuntary commitment or interdiction by due process
2	<u>of law.</u>
3	(9) Failing to self-report in writing to the Licensed Behavior Analyst
4	Committee any personal action which constitutes a violation of the Part within
5	thirty days of the occurrence.
6	(10) Soliciting patients or self-promoting through advertising or
7	communication, public or private, which is fraudulent, false, deceptive, or
8	misleading.
9	(11) Making or submitting false, deceptive, or unfounded claims, reports,
10	or opinions to any patient, insurance company or indemnity association,
11	company, individual, or government authority for the purpose of obtaining
12	anything of economic value.
13	(12) Soliciting, accepting, or receiving anything of economic value in
14	return for and based on referral of patients to another person, firm, or
15	corporation.
16	(13) Engaging in dishonorable, unethical or unprofessional conduct of
17	a character likely to deceive, defraud, or harm the public or any member
18	thereof.
19	(14) Continuing or recurring practice which fails to satisfy the prevailing
20	and usually accepted standards of the practice of applied behavior analysis.
21	(15) Gross, willful, and continued overcharging for professional services.
22	(16) Abandoning a patient by failure to make reasonable efforts to plan
23	for facilitating care in the event that behavior analytic services are interrupted
24	by factors such as the behavior analyst's illness, impending death,
25	unavailability, or relocation or by the patient's relocation or financial
26	limitations.
27	(17) Knowingly performing any act which, in any way, assists an
28	<u>unqualified person to practice applied behavior analysis, or having professional</u>
29	connection with or lending one's name to an illegal practitioner.

1	(18) Violating ethical codes of conduct as promulgated by the American
2	Psychological Association or the Guidelines for Responsible Conduct for
3	Behavior Analysts or violating any code of ethics adopted in the rules and
4	regulations of the board as developed by the Licensed Behavior Analyst
5	Committee, or other immoral, unprofessional, or dishonorable conduct as
6	defined in the rules and regulations of the board.
7	(19) Practicing applied behavior analysis in such a manner as to
8	endanger the welfare of patients, including but not limited to:
9	(a) Harassment, intimidation, or abuse, sexual or otherwise, of a patient.
10	(b) Engaging in any sexual contact with a patient.
11	(c) Gross malpractice, repeated malpractice, or gross negligence in the
12	practice of applied behavior analysis.
13	(20) Using of untruthful, deceptive, or improbable statements concerning
14	the licensee's qualifications or the effects or results of proposed treatment,
15	including functioning outside one's professional competence established by
16	education, training, and experience.
17	(21) Exercising undue influence in such a manner as to exploit the
18	patient for financial or other personal advantage to the practitioner or a third
19	<u>party.</u>
20	(22) Refusal of a licensing authority of another state to issue or renew a
21	license, permit, or certificate to practice applied behavior analysis in that state
22	or the revocation or suspension, or other restriction imposed on a license,
23	permit, or certificate issued by such licensing authority which prevents or
24	restricts practice in that state, or the surrender of a license, permit or certificate
25	issued by another state when criminal or administrative charges are pending or
26	threatened against the holder of such license, permit, or certificate.
27	(23) Any suspension or revocation of certification by the certification
28	board would vacate licensure in this state.
29	C. The board may, as a probationary condition, or as a condition of the

1	reinstatement of any license or certificate suspended or revoked hereunder,
2	<u>require the license or certificate holder to pay all costs of the board proceedings,</u>
3	including investigator, stenographer, and attorney fees, and to pay a fine not to
4	exceed five thousand dollars.
5	D. The board's final decision in an adjudication proceeding conducted
6	pursuant to this Section other than by consent or, agreement or other informal
7	disposition, shall constitute a public record, and the board may disclose and
8	provide such final decision to any person, firm, or corporation or to the public
9	generally. The board's disposition of an adjudication proceeding by consent
10	order shall not constitute a public record, but the board shall have authority
11	and discretion to disclose such disposition.
12	E. No judicial order staying or enjoining the effectiveness or enforcement
13	of a final decision or order in a adjudication proceeding, whether issued
14	pursuant to R.S. 49:964(C) or otherwise, shall be effective, beyond the earlier
15	<u>if either:</u>
16	(1) One hundred twenty days from the date on which the board's
17	decision or order was rendered.
18	(2) The date on which a court of competent jurisdiction enters judgment
19	in a proceeding for judicial review of the board's decision or order issued
20	pursuant to R.S. 49:964.
21	F. Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, no judicial order
22	staying, enjoining, or continuing and adjudication proceeding before, or a
23	preliminary, procedural, or intermediate decision, ruling, order, or action of,
24	<u>the board shall be effective, whether pursuant to R.S. 49:964 or otherwise, prior</u>
25	to the exhausting of all administrative remedies and issuance of a final decision
26	by the board.
27	G. No order staying or enjoining a final decision or order of the board
28	shall be issued unless the district court finds that the applicant or petitioner has
29	established that the issuance of the stay does neither of the following:

1	(1) Threaten harm to other interested parties, including individuals for
2	whom the applicant or petitioner may render applied behavior analysis services.
3	(2) Constitute a threat to the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of
4	this state.
5	H. No stay of a final decision or order of the board shall be granted ex
6	parte. The court shall schedule a hearing request for a stay order within ten
7	days from filing of the request. The court's decision to either grant or deny the
8	stay order shall be rendered within five days at the conclusion of the hearing.
9	§1360.92. Persons and practices not affected
10	The provisions of this Part shall not be construed as prohibiting or
11	restricting the practice of any of the following:
12	A. An "ABA direct contact therapist" acting only under the extended
13	authority and direction of a licensed behavior analyst or appropriately trained
14	psychologist to provide behavior analysis services.
15	B. A licensed professional who is not a behavior analyst, so long as the
16	licensed professional does not represent that he is a behavior analyst or
17	qualified to provide applied behavior analysis, and so long as the services of the
18	licensed professional are specified within the scope of the practice of the
19	licensing law governing the licensed professional and the services performed are
20	commensurate with the licensed professional's formal university training and
21	supervised experience.
22	C. The practice of applied behavior analysis expressly excludes
23	psychological testing, neuropsychology, psychotherapy, cognitive therapy,
24	psychoanalysis, hypnotherapy, diagnosis of mental or emotional disorders, and
25	long-term counseling as treatment modalities.
26	<u>§1360.93. Injunctive proceedings</u>
27	A. The board may investigate any evidence or allegation which appears
28	to show that any person is or may be in violation of any provision of this Part.
29	B. The board may apply for an injunction in any court of competent

1	jurisdiction to enjoin any person from committing any act which is in violation
2	of this Part.
3	C. If it is established that the defendant has been or is committing an act
4	which is in violation of this Part, the court shall enter a decree perpetually
5	enjoining the defendant from further committing the act or acts.
6	D. In case of violation of any injunction issued under the provisions of
7	this Section, the court may summarily try and punish the offender for contempt
8	<u>of court.</u>
9	E. Such injunctive proceedings shall be in addition to, and not in lieu of,
10	all penalties and other remedies as provided in this Part.
11	<u>§1360.94. Penalties</u>
12	A. It shall be a misdemeanor for any individual:
13	(1) Not licensed under this Part to represent himself as a licensed
14	<u>behavior analyst.</u>
15	(2) Not licensed under this Part to engage in the practice of behavior
16	analysis.
17	(3) To represent himself as a medical psychologists during the time that
18	his license as a behavior analyst shall be suspended or revoked or lapse.
19	(4) To otherwise violate this Part.
20	B. Such misdemeanor shall be punishable upon conviction by
21	imprisonment for not more than six months, or by a fine of not less than one
22	hundred dollars nor more than five hundred dollars, or both. Each violation is
23	deemed a separate offense.
24	C. Such misdemeanor shall be prosecuted by the district attorney of the
25	judicial district in which the offense was committed.
26	<u>§1360.95. Access to files</u>
27	The Licensed Behavior Analyst Committee shall make available to the
28	board all files relating to behavior analysts practicing within the state.

7	Section 2. This Act shall become effective upon signature by the governor or, if not
8	signed by the governor, upon expiration of the time for bills to become law without signature
9	by the governor, as provided by Article III, Section 18 of the Constitution of Louisiana. If
10	vetoed by the governor and subsequently approved by the legislature, this Act shall become
11	effective on the day following such approval.

DIGEST

Proposed law provides for the Board Certified Behavioral Analyst Practice Act.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides for the licensure of behavioral analysts and places the practice of behavioral analytics under the Louisiana State Board of Examiners of Psychologists.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides the Louisiana State Board of Examiners of Psychologists the powers and duties to license and regulate the profession of behavioral analysts. The Louisiana State Board of Examiners of Psychologists will have all powers and duties granted to it under R.S. 37:2351 et seq., and shall have, in addition, the authority to:

- (1) Establish and publish standards of applied behavior analysis practice in accordance with those developed and accepted by the profession represented by such organizations as the Behavior Analysis Certification Board, Association for Behavior Analysis International and/or others deemed appropriate by the Licensed Behavior Analyst Committee ("committee") and approved by the board.
- (2) Approve, deny, revoke, suspend, renew and reinstate licensure of duly qualified applicants based on the recommendation of the committee and approved by the board.
- (3) Adopt, revise, and enforce orders, rules, and regulations for licensure and renewal as recommended by the committee to ensure the competency of applicants, the protection of the public, and proper administration of this Part in accordance with the Administrative Procedure Act.
- (4) Conduct hearings on charges calling for the denial, suspension, revocation, or refusal to renew a license with a designee from the committee present. Such designee shall be appointed as needed by the chair of the board.

Proposed law provides for the issuance and renewal of licenses for behavioral analysts.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides for the reinstatement of licenses for behavioral analysts.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides for the Licensed Behavior Analyst Committee. Provides the committee shall be established by the board for the purpose of reviewing and recommending action on application for licensure and relicensure, recommending educational and training requirements, establishing a professional code of conduct, recommending changes in related statutes and rules, as well as other activities as may be requested by the board or activities provided in <u>proposed law</u>. <u>Proposed law</u> provides the committee shall consist of two certified and licensed behavior analysts and one licensed

(1) The two certified behavior analysts, who shall become licensed once <u>proposed</u> <u>law</u> becomes effective, shall be appointed by the Louisiana Association for Behavior Analysis.

- (2) The licensed psychologist shall be appointed by the Louisiana State Board of Examiners of Psychologists.
- (3) The chair of the board shall serve as an ex officio, non-voting member of the committee; however, the chair may vote in cases of a tie vote.Members of the committee shall serve at the pleasure of the board. A vacancy in an unexpired term shall be filled in a manner of the original appointment.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides the committee may meet as needed but shall meet at least quarterly, and a majority of the members of the committee shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of all business. Further provides the members of the committee shall serve without compensation but shall be reimbursed for reasonable travel expenses incurred in attendance at meetings and other official business on behalf of the committee or the board.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides licensed behavioral analysts shall annually complete a minimum of twelve hours of committee-approved continuing education classes.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides the board the authority to fix certain fees through the Administrative Procedure Act.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides for the causes for refusal to issue, the suspension of, or the revocation of a license by the board based on the recommendation of the committee.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides the provisions of this Part shall not be construed as prohibiting or restricting the practice of any of the following:

- (1) An "ABA direct contact therapist" acting only under the extended authority and direction of a licensed behavior analyst or appropriately trained psychologist to provide behavior analysis services.
- (2) A licensed professional who is not a behavior analyst, so long as the licensed professional does not represent that he is a behavior analyst or qualified to provide applied behavior analysis, and so long as the services of the licensed professional are specified within the scope of the practice of the licensing law governing the licensed professional and the services performed are commensurate with the licensed professional's formal university training and supervised experience.
- (3) The practice of applied behavior analysis expressly excludes psychological testing, neuropsychology, psychotherapy, cognitive therapy, psychoanalysis, hypnotherapy, diagnosis of mental or emotional disorders, and long-term counseling as treatment modalities.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides the board the authority to seek injunctive relief through the courts.

Proposed law provides penalties for any individual:

- (1) Not licensed under <u>proposed law</u> to represent himself as a licensed behavior analyst.
- (2) Not licensed under <u>proposed law</u> to engage in the practice of behavior analysis.
- (3) To represent himself as a medical psychologists during the time that his license as a behavior analyst shall be suspended or revoked or lapse.
- (4) To otherwise violate <u>proposed law</u>.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides such misdemeanor shall be punishable upon conviction by imprisonment for not more than six months, or by a fine of not less than \$100 nor more than \$500, or both. Each violation is deemed a separate offense. <u>Proposed law</u> provides such

misdemeanor shall be prosecuted by the district attorney of the judicial district in which the offense was committed.

<u>Proposed law</u> requires the committee to make available to the board all files relating to behavior analysts practicing within the state.

Effective upon signature of the governor or lapse of time for gubernatorial action.
