COLLEGES/UNIVERSITIES. Repeals provisions regarding parking violations on campus declared unconstitutional. (gov sig)

1	AN ACT
2	To repeal R.S. 17:1803, relative to parking violations on public college and university
3	campuses; to eliminate provisions of law governing certain fines that have been ruled
4	unconstitutional; to provide for an effective date; and to provide for related matters.
5	Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana:
6	Section 1. R.S. 17:1803 is hereby repealed.
7	Section 2. This Act shall become effective upon signature by the governor or, if not
8	signed by the governor, upon expiration of the time for bills to become law without signature
9	by the governor, as provided by Article III, Section 18 of the Constitution of Louisiana. If
10	vetoed by the governor and subsequently approved by the legislature, this Act shall become
11	effective on the day following such approval.

<u>Present law</u> provides that the fine which may be imposed for violation of any parking regulation established by the governing authority of any state-supported college or university, including Louisiana State University and Agricultural and Mechanical College, where the violation occurred upon the streets and roadways of such college or university,

shall not exceed \$1.

<u>Present law</u> was held unconstitutional in *Student Government Association of Louisiana State University and Agricultural and Mechanical College, Main Campus, Baton Rouge v. Board of Supervisors of Louisiana State University and Agricultural and Mechanical College*, 264 So.2d 916 (La. 1972).

Proposed law repeals present law.

Effective upon signature of the governor or lapse of time for gubernatorial action.
