7	Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana:
8	Section 1. R.S. 17:401 is hereby repealed.

DIGEST

<u>Present law</u> requires the State Board of Elementary and Secondary Education, the Board of Regents, and the higher education management boards to devise and adopt a program to be implemented in all public high schools to provide academic assistance, at no increased cost to the state, to students who plan to attend college after high school graduation but have demonstrated that they are unprepared to successfully undertake college work. Requires that the program include a method for identifying students in need of such assistance and methods for evaluating and reporting on program results to the state superintendent of education. Requires that academic assistance provided through the program be made available during the summer preceding the student's graduation or during the course of the regular school year. Further provides that such program be implemented by not later than the beginning of the Spring semester of the 1994-1995 school year.
