SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 26

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LEGIS POWERS/FUNCTIONS. Recognizes May 2011 as Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis Awareness Month and memorializes Congress to enact legislation to provide additional funding for research in order to find a treatment and a cure for amyotrophic lateral sclerosis.

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

2	To recognize May 2011 as Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis Awareness Month and to
3	memorialize the Congress of the United States to enact legislation to provide
4	additional funding for research in order to find a treatment and a cure for
5	amyotrophic lateral sclerosis.
6	WHEREAS, amyotrophic lateral sclerosis or ALS is better known as Lou Gehrig's
7	disease; and
8	WHEREAS, ALS is a fatal neurodegenerative disease characterized by degeneration
9	of cell bodies of the lower motor neurons in the gray matter of the anterior horns of the
10	spinal cord; and
11	WHEREAS, the initial symptom of ALS is weakness of the skeletal muscles,
12	especially those of the extremities; and
13	WHEREAS, as ALS progresses the patient experiences difficulty in swallowing,
14	talking, and breathing; and
15	WHEREAS, ALS eventually causes muscles to atrophy and the patient becomes a
16	functional quadriplegic; and
17	WHEREAS, ALS does not affect a patient's mental capacity, so that the patient
18	remains alert and aware of his or her loss of motor functions and the inevitable outcome of

continued deterioration and death; and

WHEREAS, on average, patients diagnosed with ALS only survive two to five years
from the time of diagnosis; and

WHEREAS, ALS has no known cause, means of prevention, or cure; and

WHEREAS, research indicates that military veterans are at a 60% or greater risk of developing ALS than those who have not served in the military; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Veterans Affairs implemented regulations to establish a presumption of service connection for ALS thereby presuming that the development of ALS was incurred or aggravated by a veteran's service in the military; and

WHEREAS, a national ALS patient registry, administered by the Centers for Disease Control, is currently identifying cases of ALS in the United States and may become the single largest ALS research project ever created; and

WHEREAS, Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis Awareness Month increases the public's awareness of ALS patients' circumstances and acknowledges the terrible impact this disease has not only on the patient but on his or her family and the community and recognizes the research being done to eradicate this horrible disease.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislature of Louisiana hereby recognizes May 2011 as Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis Awareness Month.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Congress of the United States is hereby memorialized to enact legislation to provide additional funding for research in order to find a treatment and a cure for amyotrophic lateral sclerosis.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this Resolution shall be transmitted to the secretary of the United States Senate and the clerk of the United States House of Representatives and to each member of the Louisiana delegation to the United States Congress.
