In the Year Two Thousand Eleven

An Act to enhance the clean environment and protect water resources \Box .

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 SECTION 1. Section 321 of chapter 94 of the General Laws, as appearing in the 2004 Official
- 2 Edition is hereby amended by striking out the definitions for "beverage" and "beverage
- 3 container," and inserting in place thereof the following definitions:—
- 4 "Beverage" soda water or similar carbonated soft drinks; non-carbonated beverages including
- 5 mineral water, flavored and unflavored water, spring water, and other water beverages, tea,
- 6 sports drinks, isotonic drinks; beer and other malt beverages; wine and wine-based drinks;
- 7 spirits and spirit-based drinks; hard cider; and all other non alcoholic carbonated and
- 8 noncarbonated drinks in liquid form intended for human consumption except milk and

- 9 beverages that are primarily derived from daily products, infant formula, and FDA approved10 medicines.
- 11 "Beverage container," any sealable bottle, can, jar or carton which is primarily composed of
- 12 glass, metal, plastic, or any combination of those materials and is produced for the purpose of
- 13 containing a beverage, which, at the time of sale, contains four liters or less of a beverage. This
- 14 definition shall not include containers made of paper based biodegradable material and aseptic
- 15 multi-material packaging.
- 16 SECTION 2. Section 323F of Chapter 94 of the General Laws, as so appearing, is hereby
- 17 amended by the striking out "Repealed, 2003, 26 Sec 296," and inserting in place thereof the
- 18 following:—
- 19 (a) There shall be established on the books of the commonwealth a separate fund to be known as
- 20 the Clean Environment Fund. Amounts to be deposited in said Fund shall be used, subject to
- 21 appropriation, solely for programs and projects supporting the proper management of solid
- 22 waste, water resources, parkland, urban forestry, air quality and climate protection.
- 23 (b) Not less that 25 percent of amounts deposited in the Fund shall be used for a "Sustainable
- 24 Communities" grant program to cities and towns for advancing waste reduction, water quality,
- 25 water conservation, and improved air quality.
- 26 (c) Not less than 25 percent of the Funds shall be further deposited into the Water Pollution
- 27 Abatement Trust Grandfathered Drinking Water Fund established by Chapter 78 of the Acts of
- 28 1998 to enhance water quality efforts in the 24 designated water districts.

- 29 (d) Not more than 25 percent of amounts deposited in the Fund shall be used for climate
- 30 protection planning and implementation of projects and programs to reduce the impact of global
- 31 warming.
- 32 (e) Not less than 25 percent of amounts deposited in the Fund shall be used for grants to cities
- 33 and towns for community based park cleanup projects and urban forestry initiatives.
