The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the One Hundred and Ninety-Second General Court (2021-2022)

An Act to establish an Office of Youth Development.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Whereas, analysis of current social and health status indicators indicate that 2 an unacceptable number of urban youth are becoming involved in the criminal justice system, 3 experiencing high rates of homicide and suicide, engaged in violence and antisocial behaviors, 4 becoming abusers of drugs, alcohol, tobacco and marijuana, experiencing a high rate of 5 pregnancies and sexually transmitted diseases, and leaving school without marketable skills. 6 There is clear and present danger that the current socio-economic status of this generation of 7 urban youth will have a negative impact on the general well-being of the entire society of the 8 Commonwealth; and

9 Whereas, public schools have historically been a place where the above stated
10 phenomenon developed, and in spite of the many changes implemented and proposed, do not

present the model nor infrastructure needed to provide an appropriate model to improve the situation with urban youth; and Whereas, the current negative social, economic and health status indicators for urban youth may be defined as predictors for negative future social and economic outcomes; and

Whereas, violent behaviors, both as victim and perpetrators, trauma, substance abuse,
homelessness, teen pregnancy and infant mortality, sexually transmitted diseases, delinquent
behaviors, and suicide are clearly identified as public health concerns,

18 Therefore, Notwithstanding any act to the contrary, this act provides that there shall be 19 established within the Executive Office of Health and Human Services, a state-wide office of 20 youth development within the Department of Public Health which shall organize and implement 21 pilot programs in Boston, Springfield, New Bedford, Fall River, Lawrence, Lowell, Holyoke, 22 and Worcester to demonstrate a coordinated-comprehensive youth development services delivery 23 system to improve and promote good citizenship among youth, between the ages of seven and 24 eighteen. All programs and activities shall be coordinated with the Executive Office of Health 25 and Human Services organizations in each city, so as to optimize the allocation of resources.

- 26 SECTION 2. Programs and activities shall be provided outside of school hours, year-27 round, including weekends for individuals who are enrolled in school, with programs and 28 activities for individuals not enrolled in school available on a daily basis.
- SECTION 3. Programs and activities shall be designed based on youth development
 research findings, with an emphasis directed toward the development and enhancement of social
 decorum, anti-violent and anti-gang behaviors, positive social behaviors, local and statewide
 labor pools, improving education results, job opportunities and career and employment options,

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33 citizenship and positive future outlook, community-building, the performing and creative arts, 34 and avoiding teenage pregnancies. With some components modeled after the pre-World War II 35 Work Project Administration (WPA) and Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) the system shall 36 provide practical skill building beyond the theoretical approach used in public schools. 37 SECTION 4. Programs and activities shall be implemented through contracts with 38 federally qualified, Community Health Centers. Policy-makers and staff of contracting 39 organizations shall reflect the participant population of the program. 40 SECTION 5. The programs and activities shall include but not be limited to the 41 following: (1) a research component to address issues pertaining to replication of successful strategies identified; (2) a community coordination function to assure that service deliverv is 42 43 coordinated in order to limit any unwanted duplication and/or overlapping; (3) to document and 44 analyze resources and services targeted for the participant population; (4) identification of the 45 services needed to advance the goals of the program; (5) develop and/or partner with a 46 community youth worker certification program, in order to utilize "best practices" in the field of 47 youth development, this component will further enhance skill development and standards for 48 youth development as a discipline; (6) an enhanced management information system support 49 procedure to develop a common intake and referral system to increase the use of preventive 50 services, share resource information, avoid duplication and to allow participants to engage in, 51 hands-on applications and learn state-of-the-art computer use; (7) court diversion; (8) coordinate 52 grants to various community agencies; (9) coordinate with already established organizations and

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agencies; and (10) develop needed services as required for the success of the program.

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54 SECTION 6. There is hereby established and set up on the books of the commonwealth a 55 separate fund to be known as the Office of Youth Development Fund. There shall be credited to 56 said fund an amount sufficient to sustain such an initiative in the immediate fiscal year 57 commonwealth's budget, and thereafter for a period of five (5) years. The City of Boston shall be 58 among the first communities within the Commonwealth which the office shall be established.
