By Mr. Kaufman of Lexington, a petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 377) of Jay R. Kaufman and others relative to the method of casting and tabulating votes and further regulating election practices. Election Laws.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

**In the One Hundred and Ninetieth General Court
(2017-2018)**

An Act to promote better voting practices.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Section 1 of chapter 50 of the General Laws is hereby amended, by
2 inserting after the definition of “Primary” the following definition:—

3 “Ranked Choice Voting”, a method of casting and tabulating votes that simulates the
4 ballot counts that would occur if all voters participated in a series of runoff elections with one
5 candidate eliminated after each round of counting. In elections using the Ranked Choice Voting
6 method, voters may rank the candidates in order of preference. In all such elections, the count
7 shall proceed in the following manner:

8 (1) The initial round of counting shall be a count of the first choices marked on each
9 ballot. If any candidate receives a majority of the first choices, that candidate shall be deemed
10 and declared elected.

11 (2) If no candidate receives a majority of first choices, there shall be a second round of
12 counting. The last-place candidate shall be eliminated, and all the continuing ballots shall be
13 recounted. "Continuing ballot" means a ballot that is not an exhausted ballot.

14 (3) Each continuing ballot shall be counted as one vote for that ballot's highest ranked
15 advancing candidate. "Advancing candidate" means a candidate who has not been eliminated.

16 (4) If no candidate receives a majority at the second round of counting, there shall be a
17 third round of counting. The last-place candidate shall be eliminated, and all the continuing
18 ballots shall be recounted. Each continuing ballot shall be counted as one vote for that ballot's
19 highest ranked advancing candidate.

20 (5) The process of eliminating the last-place candidates and recounting all the continuing
21 ballots shall continue until one candidate receives a majority of the votes in a round. The
22 candidate who receives a majority of the votes in a round shall be deemed and declared to be
23 elected.

24 (6) When a ballot becomes an exhausted ballot it shall not be counted in that round or any
25 subsequent round. "Exhausted ballot" means a ballot on which there are no choices marked other
26 than choices for eliminated candidates.

27 (7) If there are not sufficient second and lower choices for any candidate to receive a
28 majority, the candidate with the highest number of votes shall be deemed and declared to be
29 elected.

30 (8) No candidate who has been eliminated can be elected, no matter how many second
31 and lower ranked choices might otherwise have become votes for that candidate in a later round.

32 SECTION 2. Section 2 of said chapter 50 is hereby amended by striking out the third
33 sentence and inserting in place thereof the following:—

34 This section shall not apply to nominations and elections by the Ranked Choice Voting
35 method.

36 SECTION 3. Section 78 of chapter 54 of the General Laws is hereby amended by striking
37 out the third sentence.

38 SECTION 4. Chapter 54 is hereby further amended by inserting after section 78A the
39 following section 78B:—

40 (a) Ranked Choice Voting, as defined in section 1 of chapter 50, shall be the method used
41 for all elections by ballot, including all general elections and primary elections and caucuses, to
42 the following offices when three or more candidates have qualified to have their names printed
43 on the ballot for those offices: governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, secretary of the
44 commonwealth, state treasurer, state auditor, and representative and senator in the general court.

45 (b) In elections using the Ranked Choice Voting method, voters may rank the candidates
46 in order of preference.

47 (c) Ballots shall allow the voter to mark the voter's first choice in the same manner as
48 that for offices not elected by Ranked Choice Voting.

49 (d) Sample ballots illustrating voting procedures shall be posted in or near the voting
50 booth, and shall be included in the instruction packet for absentee ballots. Directions to voters
51 shall conform substantially to the following:

52 “Vote for your first-choice candidate by marking the number ‘1’ next to that candidate’s
53 name. In addition to your first choice candidate, you may rank additional candidates in order of
54 preference. Ranking additional candidates will not affect your first-choice candidate. Indicate
55 your second choice by marking the number ‘2’ by that candidate’s name, your third choice by
56 marking the number ‘3,’ and so on for as many candidates as you wish. Do not mark the same
57 number beside more than one candidate. Do not skip numbers.”

58 (e) The secretary of the commonwealth shall adopt and promulgate regulations consistent
59 with this section, which regulations shall ensure that ballots shall be simple and easy to
60 understand. As soon as practicable, the secretary of the commonwealth shall ensure that all
61 voting equipment in the commonwealth is capable of effecting Ranked Choice Voting. In
62 addition, the secretary of the commonwealth shall conduct a voter education campaign to
63 familiarize voters with Ranked Choice Voting.
