Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

#### 1 YOUTH SOLUTIONS ACT OF 2011

- 2 The purpose of this Act is to promote and support activities and programs that will increase the
- 3 education, skills and employment of Massachusetts's youth and their successful integration into
- 4 the Massachusetts economy.
- 5 Whereas employers choose Massachusetts and stay in Massachusetts because of the quality of its
- 6 workforce, and whereas Massachusetts also leads the nation in innovation, technology
- 7 utilization, and attracting capital, all reflecting a quality workforce, the workforce is a critical
- 8 asset of Massachusetts' economic well-being. However, recent trends in teen unemployment,

- 9 high school dropouts, employer skill demands, demographic shifts within the United States, and
- 10 immigration into Massachusetts, point to a need to protect our most competitive asset, the
- 11 education and skills of our emerging workforce.
- 12 Whereas the youth workforce development system in Massachusetts consists of a number of
- 13 programs across various state agencies, there is a need for better coordination and alignment. We
- 14 must address the needs of young people out of the labor market and out-of-work, those who have
- 15 either dropped out of school or are at risk for dropping out; the achievement gap within the
- 16 public school system; and the development of educational pathways for young people to obtain a
- 17 post secondary education which is increasingly needed for successful entry into the labor market.
- 18 There is no alternative if Massachusetts is to fulfill the promise to all our youth and enable them
- 19 to succeed in our economy.
