By Representative Murphy of Weymouth, a petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 710) of James M. Murphy for legislation to establish a special commission (including members of the General Court) to investigate ways to increase voter participation in primary elections. Election Laws.

**In the One Hundred and Ninety-Third General Court
(2023-2024)**

An Act increasing voter participation in primary elections.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1: A special commission is hereby established pursuant to section 2A of
2 chapter 4 for the purpose of making an investigation and study relative to increasing voter
3 participation in primary elections. Said commission shall specifically investigate the
4 implementation of a “Top Two Primary system” as well as party convention rules relative to
5 party nominations of candidates, primary election dates, and the elimination of the current party
6 primary election system. The commission shall consist of 2 members of the senate, 1 of whom
7 shall be appointed by the Senate President, 1 of whom shall be appointed by the minority leader,
8 1 of whom shall act as co-chairperson; 2 members of the house of representatives, 1 of whom
9 shall be appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives, 1 of whom shall be appointed
10 by the minority leader 1, 1 of whom shall act as co-chairperson; the secretary of the
11 commonwealth or their designee; the president of the Massachusetts Town Clerks’ Association
12 or their designee; the president of the Massachusetts City Clerks’ Association or their designee;

13 the executive director of Common Cause Massachusetts or their designee; and 1 person from
14 each of the political parties as defined in section 1 of chapter 50 of the General Laws eligible to
15 conduct primary elections at the next following biennial state election.

16 Said commission shall report to the general court the results of its investigation and study
17 and its recommendations, if any, together with drafts of legislation necessary to carry its
18 recommendations into effect, by filing the same with the clerk of the senate and the clerk of the
19 House of Representatives six months after the enactment of this legislation.
