The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the One Hundred and Ninety-Second General Court (2021-2022)

An Act to enhance driver impairment prevention.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Section 24 of chapter 90 of the General Laws, as appearing in the 2014 Official Edition,

is hereby amended by inserting, in subparagraph 4, after the words "and comply with all

conditions of said residential alcohol treatment program." the following language:-

4 "Such person, while in the residential program, or upon intake at the counseling out-

patient program, shall undergo an assessment that uses a standardized evidence-based instrument

performed by a Bureau of Substance Addiction Services licensed provider or other licensed or

certified substance use disorder professional to determine whether he or she has a substance use

disorder diagnosis and would likely benefit from a United States Food and Drug Administration

approved medication-assisted treatment that is indicated for the treatment of alcohol/and or other

substance use disorder. If a medication is indicated for such person, such person shall be seen by,

or referred to, a provider authorized to prescribe an FDA-approved medication, used in

conjunction with an individualized treatment plan, and provided for as long as clinically
