In the Year Two Thousand Thirteen

An Act to assess the impact of the public welfare system on the health and well-being of children.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. The Department of Public Health, in conjunction with other child and
2 family-serving agencies, shall conduct an annual child assessment as part of a child surveillance
3 study on the impact of the public welfare system on the health and well-being of the children and
4 youth (birth through age 18) of the Commonwealth. Said child health assessment shall include
5 but not be limited to: the measure and assessment of nutritional status (through height and weight
6 measurements); birth outcomes status (especially birthweights); poverty status; school readiness
7 status and safety status (including injury prevalence rates and hospitalization rates) of children
8 and youth in the Commonwealth. Said annual child health assessment statement shall be
9 submitted to the House and Senate Committees on Ways and Means, the Joint Committee on
10 Children, Families and Persons with Disabilities, the Joint Committee on Health Care Financing,
11 and the Joint Committee on Education by April 1 of each year.
