13 14	SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

17 18	(a) (1) In this section[, "eligible] THE FOLLOWING WORDS HAVE THE MEANINGS INDICATED.
19 20 21	(2) "ELIGIBLE long—term care premiums" means eligible long—term care premiums within the meaning of § 213(d)(10) of the Internal Revenue Code for a long—term care insurance contract covering an individual who is a Maryland resident



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- 1 (3) "TAXPAYER" MEANS A TAXPAYER WITH MARYLAND ADJUSTED GROSS INCOME OF LESS THAN \$250,000 IN THE TAXABLE YEAR FOR WHICH A CREDIT IS CLAIMED UNDER THIS SECTION.
 - (b) [An individual] SUBJECT TO THE LIMITATIONS OF THIS SECTION, A TAXPAYER may claim a credit against the State income tax in an amount equal to 100% of the eligible long-term care premiums paid by the [individual] TAXPAYER during the taxable year for long-term care insurance covering the [individual] TAXPAYER or the [individual's] TAXPAYER'S spouse, parent, stepparent, child, or stepchild.
- 9 (c) The credit allowed under this section:
- 10 (1) [may not exceed \$500 for] WITH RESPECT TO each insured 11 INDIVIDUAL covered by long-term care insurance for which the [individual] TAXPAYER 12 pays the premiums, MAY NOT EXCEED THE LESSER OF:
- 13 (I) 20% OF THE ELIGIBLE LONG—TERM CARE PREMIUMS PAID 14 DURING THE TAXABLE YEAR; OR
- 15 (II) **\$2,000**;
- 16 (2) may not be claimed by more than one taxpayer with respect to the same 17 insured individual: and
- 18 (3) may not be claimed with respect to an insured individual if [:
- 19 (i)] the insured individual was covered by long-term care insurance 20 **PURCHASED** at any time [before July 1, 2000; or
- 21 (ii) the credit has been claimed with respect to that insured 22 individual by any taxpayer for any prior taxable year AFTER DECEMBER 31, 2004.
- 23 (d) (1) The total amount of the credit allowed under this section for any taxable 24 year may not exceed the State income tax for that taxable year, calculated before 25 application of the credits under this section and §§ 10–701 and 10–701.1 of this subtitle, 26 but after application of the other credits allowable under this subtitle.
- 27 (2) The unused amount of the credit for any taxable year may not be carried over to any other taxable year.
- 29 (e) The credit allowed under this section does not affect the treatment under this 30 title of any deduction or exclusion allowed for federal income tax purposes for the eligible long-term care premiums paid by the individual.

- 1 (f) On or before December 1, 2005 and each December 1 thereafter, the 2 Comptroller shall report to the Governor and, subject to § 2–1257 of the State Government 3 Article, to the General Assembly, regarding the credit allowed under this section, including:
- 4 (1) the number of individuals who have claimed the credit, the amount 5 allowed as credits, and the additional number of individuals covered by long—term care 6 insurance as a result of the credit; and
- 7 (2) the savings under the State's Medical Assistance Program as a result 8 of additional individuals being covered by long—term care insurance as a result of the credit.
- 9 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect July 1, 2022, and shall be applicable to all taxable years beginning after December 31, 2021.
