2 Primary and Secondary Education – Breakfast and Lunch Programs – Universal 3 Expansion

- 4 FOR the purpose of altering the standards of the State Free Feeding Program, beginning 5 in a certain fiscal year, to require that if a school participates in a certain federal 6 nutritional program, then each student in the school must be offered a meal at no 7 cost to the student; providing for the reimbursement rate at which the State shall 8 pay county boards and participating nonpublic schools for the free meals offered to 9 students; prohibiting a county board or nonpublic school from charging a student any portion of the cost of a certain breakfast or lunch; and generally relating to the 10 expansion of breakfast and lunch meals to all students in participating schools. 11

- IT IS THE INTENT OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY THAT THE STATE, EACH
- 30 COUNTY BOARD, AND PARTICIPATING NONPUBLIC SCHOOLS MAXIMIZE THE USE OF
- 31 ALL AVAILABLE FEDERAL FUNDS IN CARRYING OUT THE REQUIREMENTS OF THE
- 32 STATE FREE FEEDING PROGRAM.
- 33 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the Laws of Maryland read

- 3 (a) (1) The State Board shall require each county board to provide in each 4 elementary school a free breakfast, unless the school is exempted under § 7–702 of this 5 subtitle.
- 6 (2) (i) A nonpublic elementary school may provide a free breakfast 7 program in accordance with this subtitle.
- 8 (ii) If a nonpublic elementary school provides a free breakfast 9 program, the participating nonpublic elementary school shall be eligible for the State 10 reimbursement of the student share of the costs for those breakfasts under § 7–703 of this 11 article.
- 12 (b) The free breakfast required to be provided under this section shall meet the standards of the United States Department of Agriculture.

- 15 **[**(a)**]** The State Superintendent shall exempt any elementary school from the 16 requirements of this subtitle if:
- 17 (1) (i) The school has made a breakfast program available for at least 3 to consecutive months; and
- 19 (ii) The participation is less than 25% of the number of students 20 eligible for free and reduced price eligible meals in each month; **OR**
- 21 (2) (i) The county board approves an alternative nutrition program that 22 the school has instituted;
- 23 (ii) The school regularly conducts an assessment of the alternative 24 program that provides evidence of success in achieving program objectives; and
- 25 (iii) The school submits an annual report of the assessment to the 26 county board and the State[;
- 27 (3) (i) The school requests an exemption for reasons of a compelling 28 nature to the county board; and
- 29 (ii) After review and approval, the county board submits the request 30 for exemption to the State Superintendent; or
- 31 (4) The school has less than 15% of its enrollment approved for free and reduced price eligible meals].

- [(b) The exemption in subsection (a)(4) of this section shall continue from year to year without the need for reapplication, until there is a 10% increase in the number of students approved for free and reduced price eligible meals.]
- 4 SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That Section 2 of this Act shall take 5 effect July 1, 2024.
- 6 SECTION 4. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That, except as provided in Section 3 of this Act, this Act shall take effect July 1, 2023.
