A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **General Assembly – Mandated Reports by State Agencies**

3 FOR the purpose of repealing certain provisions of law that require certain State agencies
4 to submit certain reports to the General Assembly that are deemed obsolete,
5 duplicative, impractical, inefficient, or otherwise unnecessary; altering certain
6 provisions of law that require certain State agencies to submit certain reports to the
7 General Assembly; combining certain reporting requirements for certain programs
8 with another more extensive annual report required to be submitted by a certain
9 department; providing that, in the year immediately preceding the beginning of a
10 term of the General Assembly, the Department of Legislative Services, in
11 consultation with other State agencies, shall review the laws of the State and make
12 recommendations to the presiding officers of the General Assembly for the
13 introduction of legislation to repeal or modify laws of the State that require the
14 agencies to submit certain reports at certain times and on certain matters to the
15 General Assembly or Governor; and generally relating to reports to the General
16 Assembly by certain State agencies.

16 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,
17 That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

18 **Article – Agriculture**

20 (b) (2) [(i)] The Department may distribute money under the Maryland Crop
21 Insurance Premium Cost Share Program from funds provided in the budget.

22 [(ii)] The Secretary shall submit an annual report to the Governor
23 and, in accordance with § 2–1246 of the State Government Article, the General Assembly
24 on or before August 1 of each year that provides an estimate of the amount of funds needed
25 to pay 8% of the net book premium for qualifying federal crop insurance products expected
26 to be purchased by farmers in the State in the following crop year.]

1 (d) (1) Administrative expenditures under this section may be made only in
2 accordance with the State budget.

3 (2) The Governor's Office of Crime Control and Prevention shall administer
4 the fund in accordance with this section and all other applicable law.

5 (3) Disbursements from the fund shall supplement and may not substitute
6 for money designated in the State budget for neighborhood crime prevention programs and
7 drug and alcohol abuse education, prevention, treatment, and law enforcement programs.

8 (4) If the terms of a grant allow, a recipient may expend grant money
9 beyond the fiscal year in which the grant is received.

10 **(5) THE GOVERNOR'S OFFICE OF CRIME CONTROL AND**
11 **PREVENTION SHALL INCLUDE INFORMATION ON DISBURSEMENTS FROM THE FUND**
12 **DURING THE PRIOR FISCAL YEAR IN THE ANNUAL REPORT SUBMITTED TO THE**
13 **GENERAL ASSEMBLY UNDER § 11-1006 OF THE CRIMINAL PROCEDURE ARTICLE.**

14 (e) (1) This subsection does not apply to a program that has received funds
15 from the Hotspot Communities Initiative administered by the Governor's Office of Crime
16 Control and Prevention.

17 (2) To the extent possible, the Governor's Office of Crime Control and
18 Prevention shall allocate at least 10% of the grants provided from the fund to programs
19 that provide services in two or more counties of the State.

23 (b) The Department shall compile data in accordance with this section on the
24 economic development programs administered by the Department.

25 (c) On or before December 31, 2013, and each year thereafter, the Department
26 shall submit a report on the economic development programs that were administered by
27 the Department during the previous fiscal year to the Governor and, in accordance with §
28 2–1246 of the State Government Article, the General Assembly.

1 (d) (1) The report required under this section shall include the following data,
2 if applicable, on the economic development programs administered by the Department:

3 (i) the number of jobs created;

4 (ii) the number of jobs retained;

5 (iii) the estimated amount of State revenue generated; [and]

6 **(IV) THE STATUS OF ANY SPECIAL FUND; AND**

7 **[(iv)] (V)** any additional information required by the Department
8 through regulations.

9 (2) The report required under this section shall include data in the
10 aggregate and disaggregated by:

11 (i) each economic development program; and

12 (ii) each recipient of assistance from an economic development
13 program.

14 **(3) THE REPORT REQUIRED UNDER THIS SECTION SHALL INCLUDE**
15 **ANY ADDITIONAL INFORMATION REQUIRED UNDER THE LAW AUTHORIZING THE**
16 **ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM.**

17 (e) If a recipient of assistance from an economic development program is not
18 meeting the requirements of the economic development program, the Department shall
19 implement a process to assist the recipient in meeting the program requirements.

15 **TOURISM DEVELOPMENT THAT, IF ADOPTED, COULD IMPROVE MARYLAND'S**

15 **REPORTED BY THE ADMINISTRATION TO THE UNITED STATES COAST GUARD, THE**
16 **INFORMATION REPORTED UNDER THIS PARAGRAPH:**

17 1. **SHALL PROVIDE AN ESTIMATE OF THE COST OF**
18 **ADDRESSING THE VULNERABILITY CONCERNS;**

19 2. **SHALL STATE THE AMOUNT OF ANY GRANTS OR**
20 **OTHER FEDERAL FUNDS RECEIVED OR REQUESTED BY THE ADMINISTRATION TO**
21 **ADDRESS THE VULNERABILITY CONCERNS AND SHALL INCLUDE INFORMATION ON**
22 **THE STATUS OF ANY PENDING REQUESTS FOR FEDERAL FUNDS; AND**

23 3. **MAY NOT INCLUDE THE SPECIFIC DETAILS OF ANY**
24 **VULNERABILITY CONCERNS, THE DISCLOSURE OF WHICH COULD COMPROMISE, IN**
25 **ANY WAY, TRANSPORTATION SECURITY.**

26 **DRAFTER’S NOTE:**

27 This section is revised to include the Report on Port Vulnerability and Funding
28 Concerns required under § 6–210 of the Transportation Article with the report required of
29 the Maryland Department of Transportation under this section. Consequently, § 6–210 of
30 the Transportation Article is repealed.

31 **[6–210.**

32 (a) Subject to subsection (b) of this section, on or before December 1 of each year,
33 the Administration, in accordance with § 2–1246 of the State Government Article, shall
34 provide an annual report to the General Assembly based on the vulnerability assessment

1 information concerning public terminals submitted by the Administration to the United
2 States Coast Guard under the federal Maritime Transportation Security Act of 2002.

3 (b) With respect to any vulnerability concerns reported by the Administration to
4 the United States Coast Guard, the report to the General Assembly required under this
5 section:

6 (1) Shall provide an estimate of the costs of addressing the vulnerability
7 concerns;

8 (2) Shall state the amount of any grants or other federal funds received or
9 requested by the Administration to address the vulnerability concerns and shall include
10 information on the status of any pending requests for federal funds; and

11 (3) May not include the specific details of any vulnerability concerns the
12 disclosure of which could compromise, in any way, transportation security.]

13 DRAFTER'S NOTE:

14 This section is repealed as redundant; all of the information for the Report on Port
15 Vulnerability Funding Concerns required under this section is included in the annual
16 Maryland Port Commission report required under § 6–201.2 of the Transportation Article.
17 Nonetheless, § 6–201.2 of the Transportation Article is revised to explicitly require the
18 Department of Transportation to include information concerning port vulnerability in the
19 report it submits to the General Assembly under that section.

20 8–309.

21 (e) (1) Notwithstanding any other provision of this section, the Administration
22 may convey land from an abandoned or completed transportation project by exchanging the
23 land for privately or publicly owned land of substantially equal value when the land to be
24 acquired by the exchange is needed for a current State highway purpose that has been
25 identified within the current consolidated transportation program as approved by the
26 General Assembly, or has otherwise received prior legislative approval for planning.

27 (2) In the case of an abandoned or completed project, the person from whom
28 the land was acquired, or the successor in interest of that person, shall have the first right
29 of refusal to reacquire the land, except that the offer and acceptance shall be as follows:

30 (i) The Administration shall notify the person from whom the land
31 was acquired, or the successor in interest of that person, in writing, by certified mail, return
32 receipt requested of the proposed exchange and the value of the property;

33 (ii) Within 90 days from the date of the notice, the person from whom
34 the land was acquired, or the successor in interest of that person, shall notify the
35 Administration in writing of its intent to exercise its right to reacquire the land; and

1 (iii) Within 90 days from the date of notifying the Administration of
2 its intent to reacquire the land, the person from whom the land was acquired, or the
3 successor in interest of that person, must tender payment of an amount equal to the lesser
4 of:

5 1. The appraised value of the land; or

6 2. The consideration that the Administration or Commission
7 originally paid for the land, plus simple interest at the fair market rate calculated from the
8 time of acquisition to the time of disposition and administrative costs.

9 (3) The person from whom the land was acquired, or the successor in
10 interest of that person, is deemed to have waived its right of first refusal if the person or
11 the successor in interest fails to follow the procedures set forth in paragraph (2) of this
12 subsection.

13 (4) In the case of a completed project or an abandoned project for which the
14 right of first refusal was waived, the procedure for the exchange shall be as follows:

15 (i) If the exchange is not one proposed by a county or municipality,
16 the Administration shall:

17 1. Notify by registered mail any affected county or
18 municipality of the offer for an exchange of a parcel;

19 2. Allow 60 days after notification for any affected county or
20 municipality to make a request to acquire the parcel or part of the parcel located within the
21 borders of the county or municipality and for the Administration to consider any such
22 request; and

23 3. If any affected county or municipality makes an offer to
24 acquire the parcel, or part thereof within that jurisdiction's borders, that is equal to or
25 greater than, or includes land of an equal or greater value than, the appraised value of the
26 parcel or applicable portion thereof, the Administration shall accept that offer;

27 (ii) Before making an exchange under this subsection, the exchange
28 must be approved by the Board of Public Works; and

29 (iii) If the Administrator and the Board of Public Works approved the
30 terms and conditions of the exchange and all deeds, the Administrator may execute and
31 accept deeds effecting the conveyances necessary to complete the exchange.

32 (5) Before the exchange:

33 (i) The Administration shall appraise all parcels of land to be
34 exchanged; and

1 (ii) If the Administration believes that any parcel of land in the
2 exchange has a value of more than \$25,000, the parcels of land also shall be appraised by
3 at least one independent, qualified real estate appraiser.

4 (6) In the event that the properties to be exchanged are determined to be
5 of unequal value, the Administrator may agree to accept or pay an amount necessary to
6 substantially equalize the value of land conveyed by the State.

7 (7) The owner of land exchanged under this subsection is not entitled to
8 first right of refusal if the exchanged land is later offered for sale by the State.

9 (8) (I) IF THE ADMINISTRATION OBTAINS OR DISPOSES OF
10 PARCELS OF LAND UNDER THIS SUBSECTION, IT SHALL ISSUE A REPORT THAT:

11 1. LISTS THE PARCELS OF LAND EXCHANGED;

12 2. STATES THE VALUE OF EACH PARCEL OF LAND
13 EXCHANGED; AND

14 3. DESCRIBES EACH PARCEL OF LAND EXCHANGED.

15 (II) THE ADMINISTRATION SHALL, IN ACCORDANCE WITH §
16 2-1246 OF THE STATE GOVERNMENT ARTICLE, SUBMIT THE REPORT TO THE HOUSE
17 ENVIRONMENT AND TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE, THE HOUSE APPROPRIATIONS
18 COMMITTEE, AND THE SENATE BUDGET AND TAXATION COMMITTEE.

19 DRAFTER'S NOTE:

20 Section 2 of Chapter 597 of the Acts of 1995, which required the State Highway
21 Administration (SHA) to submit a report every 6 months to certain committees of the
22 General Assembly regarding certain land exchanges, is repealed as obsolete and
23 unnecessary because of the very limited activity in this area over the years. However, since
24 such land exchanges could occur in the future, the reporting requirement is retained and
25 modified under this section to require a report when a SHA land exchange would fulfill the
26 intent of the original enactment of the General Assembly; hence, an "as needed" reporting
27 requirement is added under subsection (e)(8) of this section.

28 8-613.

29 (a) [(1) In calendar year 1978, the Administration shall prepare for each county
30 a 6-year construction and reconstruction program for primary and secondary highways,
31 the secondary program to include bicycle trails and sidewalks.

32 (2) The Administration shall submit this program to the General Assembly
33 for its review by January 15, 1979.

1 (3) Subject to § 2–1246 of the State Government Article, the program shall
2 be updated annually and submitted to the General Assembly for its review by January 15
3 of each year.

4 (4) The program shall:

5 (i) Advise on priorities among the projects approved for
6 construction, following completion of the project planning phase; and

7 (ii) As to each item included in it, contain a proposed schedule of
8 property acquisition, detailed engineering, and construction.

9 **(b)]** Before the annual submission **TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY** of the highway
10 construction and reconstruction program **[to the General Assembly]** **FOR EACH COUNTY**
11 **FOR PRIMARY AND SECONDARY HIGHWAYS, THE SECONDARY PROGRAM TO INCLUDE**
12 **BICYCLE TRAILS AND SIDEWALKS**, the Administration shall consult with the local
13 governing body, municipalities, and local legislative delegation of each county concerning
14 construction priorities.

15 **[(c)] (B)** If the Administration is unable for any reason to perform in accordance
16 with the schedule set forth in the annual primary highway program, it shall, if so requested
17 by resolution of either house of the General Assembly, explain in writing to the next session
18 of the General Assembly any change in the scheduling of a particular project included in
19 the preceding year's program.

20 **[(d)] (C)** If there is any change in the scheduling of a particular project in the
21 secondary highway program for which funds have been appropriated in the preceding year,
22 the Administration, on written request of a majority of the local legislative delegation from
23 the county for which the project is programmed, shall explain that change in writing to the
24 members of the General Assembly from that county.

25 **[(e)** The Administration's budget for Fiscal Year 1981 and for each fiscal year
26 following, as submitted to the General Assembly, shall include funds for projects scheduled
27 for the first year of the highway construction and reconstruction program established under
28 this section.]

29 DRAFTER'S NOTE:

30 The annual report to the General Assembly required under this section is repealed
31 as duplicative since all of the information required to be included in the annual report
32 concerning construction and reconstruction program for primary and secondary highways
33 is included in the annually revised Consolidated Transportation Program prepared by the
34 Maryland Department of Transportation.

1 [(f) (1) The President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Delegates
2 shall appoint a special committee composed of 3 Senators and 3 Delegates who shall
3 regularly consult with the Secretary of Transportation and the Secretary of the
4 Environment on the administration of the emissions control program and any contract in
5 accordance with the terms of these provisions.

6 (2) The special committee shall regularly report to the Legislative Policy
7 Committee of the Maryland General Assembly on the administration of the emissions
8 control program and any contract awarded in accordance with the provisions of this
9 section.]

10 DRAFTER'S NOTE:

11 Subsection (f) of this section is repealed as obsolete. The Special Committee on the
12 administration of the emissions control program is defunct. A review of currently available
13 Maryland Executive Branch and Legislative Branch Web sites shows no evidence that the
14 Special Committee functions or even exists. A review of the list of defunct Executive Branch
15 commissions, committees, task forces, and advisory boards also shows no evidence that the
16 Special Committee existed at some prior time (although there does not appear to be a direct
17 Web link to defunct legislative committees). A search of the General Assembly Web site
18 using the key phrases also results in no obvious mention of the Special Committee.

19 **Chapter 674 of the Acts of 1983, as amended by Chapter 533 of the Acts of 1984**
20 **and Chapters 646 and 741 of the Acts of 1987**

21 [SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That, subject to Section 2-1312 of
22 the State Government Article, The Department shall prepare and submit to the General
23 Assembly, on or before February 1 of each year, a full report of the operation of the
24 Motorcycle Safety Program for the preceding fiscal year. The General Assembly shall use
25 these reports to evaluate the Motorcycle Safety Program every three years beginning July
26 1, 1988, to determine the cost effectiveness of the Motorcycle Safety Program in Maryland
27 and the validity of continuing financial support of this program by the State. If the General
28 Assembly's evaluation indicates that the Motorcycle Safety Program is not cost effective
29 and continued financial support is not warranted, the General Assembly shall pass
30 legislation to repeal this Act.]

31 DRAFTER'S NOTE:

32 Section 2 of Chapter 674 of 1983, as amended by Chapter 533 of 1984 and Chapters
33 646 and 741 of 1987, is repealed as obsolete and redundant. The Motorcycle Safety Program
34 annual report was mandated by Chapters 646 and 741 of 1987 in conjunction with a \$5
35 surcharge on motorcycle registrations to fund the program. Chapter 107 of the Acts of 1993
36 repealed the separate funding source for the program and established funding for the
37 program through the Motor Vehicle Administration budget. Chapter 107 thus obviated the
38 need for the annual report on the cost effectiveness of the program.

39 **Chapter 791 of the Acts of 1984**

1 [SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the Department of Natural
2 Resources shall submit a report to the General Assembly by September 30 of each year,
3 describing its activities for the construction and operation of hatchery facilities.]

4 DRAFTER'S NOTE:

5 Section 2 of Chapter 791 of the Acts of 1984 is repealed as obsolete. Chapter 791
6 allowed a portion of proceeds from waterfowl stamps to be used for the operation of duck
7 hatchery facilities, and required the annual report describing the Department of Natural
8 Resources' (DNR) duck hatchery activities. Subsequently DNR implemented initial efforts
9 to construct a duck hatchery, but a disease annihilated the starter flock of ducks and the
10 hatchery was never built. NR, § 10–308.1, the statute amended by Chapter 791 to finance
11 duck hatcheries, has since been amended to remove all mention of duck hatcheries.
12 However, the obsolete, uncodified reporting requirement under Chapter 791 remains in
13 effect.

14 **Chapter 640 of the Acts of 1991**

15 [SECTION 4. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the Department of
16 Environment shall provide the General Assembly with an annual report, in accordance §
17 2–1312 of the State Government Article, on the cumulative environmental impact of the
18 incineration or burning of tires.]

19 DRAFTER'S NOTE:

20 Section 4 of Chapter 640 of the Acts of 1991 is repealed as obsolete; the era of burning
21 tires essentially has passed.

22 **Chapter 111 of the Acts of 1994, as amended by Chapter 471 of the Acts of 1997**

23 [SECTION 5. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That on or before December 1 of
24 each year, the Maryland Tourism Development Board, together with the Secretary of
25 Business and Economic Development, shall submit to the Legislative Policy Committee of
26 the General Assembly a report addressing the following:

27 (1) The specific use of the tourism advertising funds provided by this Act;

28 (2) Data quantifying the success of Maryland's increased tourism
29 marketing efforts;

30 (3) Tourism marketing strategies used by other states in Maryland's
31 primary market and their impact on Maryland's market share;

32 (4) Efforts by the Board to generate additional revenues for the Maryland
33 Tourism Development Board Fund; and

1 (5) Other short- and long-term strategies for tourism development that, if
2 adopted, could help improve Maryland's competitive position with its neighboring states.]

3 DRAFTER'S NOTE:

4 Section 5 of Chapter 111 of the Acts of 1994, as amended by Chapter 471 of the Acts
5 of 1997, is repealed and its reporting requirement is then transferred and combined with
6 the report by the Department of Business and Economic Development to the Governor and
7 the General Assembly required under § 4-216(d) of the Economic Development Article, for
8 transparency and clarity.

9 **Chapter 112 of the Acts of 1994, as amended by Chapter 471 of the Acts of 1997**

10 [SECTION 5. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That on or before December 1 of
11 each year, the Maryland Tourism Development Board, together with the Secretary of
12 Business and Economic Development, shall submit to the Legislative Policy Committee of
13 the General Assembly a report addressing the following:

14 (1) The specific use of the tourism advertising funds provided by this Act;

15 (2) Data quantifying the success of Maryland's increased tourism
16 marketing efforts;

17 (3) Tourism marketing strategies used by other states in Maryland's
18 primary market and their impact on Maryland's market share;

19 (4) Efforts by the Board to generate additional revenues for the Maryland
20 Tourism Development Board Fund; and

21 (5) Other short- and long-term strategies for tourism development that, if
22 adopted, could help improve Maryland's competitive position with its neighboring states.]

23 DRAFTER'S NOTE:

24 Section 5 of Chapter 112 of the Acts of 1994, as amended by Chapter 471 of the Acts
25 of 1997, is repealed and its reporting requirement is then transferred and combined with
26 the report by the Department of Business and Economic Development to the Governor and
27 the General Assembly required under § 4-216(d) of the Economic Development Article, for
28 transparency and clarity.

29 **Chapter 414 of the Acts of 1994**

30 [SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the Department of
31 Agriculture, the Office of the Comptroller, and the Department of the Environment shall
32 study and report to the Environmental Matters Committee and the Economic and
33 Environmental Affairs Committee no later than August 1, 1994, and thereafter on request,
34 on the implementation of coordinated inspection programs for gasoline service stations and

1 for any other consumer and environmental inspections performed by these and other units
2 of State government.]

3 DRAFTER'S NOTE:

4 Section 2 of Chapter 414 of the Acts of 1994 is repealed as duplicative; the
5 Department of Agriculture includes information concerning weights and measures
6 activities in its annual report to the General Assembly.

7 **Chapter 584 of the Acts of 1995**

8 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That it is the intent of the General
9 Assembly that the Department of Natural Resources submit to the General Assembly, on
10 January 1 of each year, a report detailing the amount of open space owned in each county
11 by the State [and by local jurisdictions].

12 DRAFTER'S NOTE:

13 The reporting requirement in Section 2 of Chapter 584 of the Acts of 1995 is obsolete
14 and impractical. The Department of Natural Resources does not know how much open
15 space is owned by local jurisdictions on an annual basis, and has not been including this
16 information in the reports. The reporting requirement is revised accordingly.

17 **Chapter 597 of the Acts of 1995**

18 [SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the Maryland Department
19 of Transportation shall, in accordance with § 2-1312 of the State Government Article,
20 submit a report to the House Commerce and Government Matters Committee, the House
21 Appropriations Committee, and the Senate Budget and Taxation Committee every 6
22 months, beginning December 1, 1995, that lists the parcels that have been obtained and
23 disposed of through the process established under § 8-309(e) of the Transportation Article
24 as enacted by this Act. The report shall identify the value of and include a description of
25 each parcel that has been exchanged between the State Highway Administration and any
26 other public or private entities.]

27 DRAFTER'S NOTE:

28 Section 2 of Chapter 597 of the Acts of 1995 is repealed as obsolete and unnecessary.
29 Since the enactment of Chapter 597 in 1995, when this reporting requirement was enacted,
30 fewer than 6 State Highway Administration (SHA) exchanges have occurred, the last of
31 which occurred more than 10 years ago. As such, periodic reporting is unnecessary and
32 wasteful of resources. But as there could be future land exchanges under § 8-309 of the
33 Transportation Article, codification of the requirement to submit a report when triggered
34 by an SHA land exchange would fulfill the intent of the General Assembly; hence, an "as
35 needed" reporting requirement is added under § 8-309(e)(8) of the Transportation Article,
36 for transparency.

Chapter 96 of the Acts of 1996

[SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the Office of Administrative Hearings shall report, in accordance with § 2–1312 of the State Government Article, the following information to the Senate Judicial Proceedings Committee and the House Commerce and Government Matters Committee before October 1 of each year:

(1) The number of hearings that were conducted by telephone or video conferencing during the preceding fiscal year;

(2) The types of cases in which hearings were conducted by telephone or video conferencing;

(3) The number of cases in which a party objected to the holding of a hearing by telephone or video conferencing, the grounds for those objections, and the disposition of each objection;

(4) The outcome of each case in which a hearing was conducted by telephone or video conferencing, including the outcome on appeal, if applicable; and

(5) The outcome of cases in the same category which were not heard by telephone or video conferencing, including the outcome on appeal, if applicable.]

DRAFTER'S NOTE:

Section 2 of Chapter 96 of the Acts of 1996 is repealed as obsolete; “video conferencing” by the Office of Administrative Hearings (and other entities) is no longer “novel” technology that warrants monitoring to make sure it works as intended.

Chapter 294 of the Acts of 1997

[SECTION 5. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That, in accordance with § 2–1312 of the State Government Article, the Insurance Commissioner shall report annually to the Senate Finance Committee and the House Economic Matters Committee regarding the effect of this Act on rates in the individual health insurance market, and any proposed changes to existing law. The Commissioner’s report shall be made by December 1 of each year, beginning in 1999.]

DRAFTER'S NOTE:

Section 5 of Chapter 294 of the Acts of 1997 is repealed as obsolete.

Under Chapter 294 of the Acts 1997, the Maryland Insurance Administration is required to report annually to the Senate Finance Committee and the House Economic Matters Committee on the effects of the Maryland Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act on rates in the individual health insurance market and any proposed

1 changes to existing law. This report was to examine how the guarantee issue requirement
2 in State law impacted the rates in the individual market. The report ceased to have
3 meaning once the Maryland Health Insurance Plan (MHIP) was established, and Chapter
4 60 of the Acts of 2004 established MHIP as the alternative to the standard coverage for
5 eligible individuals under the federal Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act.
6 As Chapter 60 repealed the guarantee issue requirement, the law no longer had an impact
7 on rates.

8 Additionally, the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (ACA) now
9 requires that all carriers in the individual market guarantee issue all nongrandfathered
10 health benefit plans to any applying individual. The ACA also includes new rating rules
11 that have been incorporated into Maryland law. For all these reasons, the reporting
12 requirement under this section is repealed as obsolete.

13 **Chapter 692 of the Acts of 1999**

14 [SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That, the Mayor of the City of
15 Baltimore shall report to the General Assembly, in accordance with § 2–1246 of the State
16 Government Article, on or before December 1, 2000, and on or before December 1 of each
17 year thereafter, on the number of homeowners and the number of tenants displaced from
18 occupied dwellings under this Act and the cost and success of relocating persons displaced
19 in alternative, more suitable housing.]

20 **DRAFTER'S NOTE:**

21 Section 2 of Chapter 692 of the Acts of 1999 is repealed as obsolete; apparently, no
22 report has been submitted by Baltimore City in 15 years.

23 **Chapter 77 of the Acts of 2001**

24 [SECTION 4. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the Department of Health
25 and Mental Hygiene shall report to the House Environmental Matters Committee, the
26 House Ways and Means Committee, the Senate Finance Committee, and the Senate Budget
27 and Taxation Committee of the General Assembly, in accordance with § 2–1246 of the State
28 Government Article, when the amount of money in the HealthChoice Performance
29 Incentive Fund reaches \$2.5 million.]

30 **DRAFTER'S NOTE:**

31 Section 4 of Chapter 77 of the Acts of 2001 is repealed as obsolete. The report
32 required under this section emanates from the early days of HealthChoice Performance
33 Incentive Fund; however, the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene has never
34 submitted a report under this section.

35 **Chapter 103 of the Acts of 2001, as amended by Chapter 46 of the Acts of 2006**

1 [SECTION 12. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the Department of
2 Agriculture shall report to the General Assembly on or before October 1 of each year, in
3 accordance with § 2–1246 of the State Government Article, on the implementation and
4 effects of the Southern Maryland Regional Strategy–Action Plan for Agriculture, including
5 the use of general obligation bonds authorized by this Act.]

6 DRAFTER’S NOTE:

7 Section 12 of Chapter 103 of the Acts of 2001, as amended by Chapter 46 of the Acts
8 of 2006, is repealed as an erroneous and misleading requirement: the Department of
9 Agriculture does not implement the Southern Maryland Regional Strategy–Action Plan for
10 Agriculture. Rather, the Southern Maryland Agricultural Development Corporation
11 implements this action plan and each year prepares a report for the Department of Budget
12 and Management.

13 **Chapter 685 of the Acts of 2001, as amended by Chapter 443 of the Acts of 2003**

14 [SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That, on or before December 31 of
15 each year, the State Board of Education shall report to the Governor and, subject to §
16 2–1246 of the State Government Article, to the General Assembly on the implementation
17 of this Act.]

18 DRAFTER’S NOTE:

19 Section 2 of Chapter 685 of the Acts of 2001, as amended by Chapter 433 of the Acts
20 of 2003, is repealed as obsolete; the underlying statute pertaining to the juvenile justice
21 alternative education pilot program that was the basis for the report and set forth in §
22 7–305.1 of the Education Article was repealed by Chapter 304 of the Acts of 2006.

23 **Chapter 453 of the Acts of 2002, as amended by Chapter 203 of the Acts of 2003**

24 [SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That:

25 (1) Beginning in fiscal year 2007 and each fiscal year thereafter, each county and
26 Baltimore City shall use the savings resulting from this [Circuit Courts – Rental of Space
27 for Clerks of Court] Act solely to increase local expenditures for the circuit courts or related
28 public safety purposes;

29 (2) In fiscal years 2007 through 2014, each county and Baltimore City shall report
30 to the Department of Budget and Management on or before November 1 on circuit court or
31 related public safety expenditures to which the savings resulting from this Act have been
32 applied. The Department of Budget and Management shall report these expenditures to
33 the Chief Judge of the Court of Appeals and, subject to § 2–1246 of the State Government
34 Article, to the General Assembly; and

1 (3) Circuit court or related public safety expenditures required under this section
2 shall be used to supplement and may not supplant existing local expenditures for the same
3 purpose.]

4 DRAFTER'S NOTE:

5 Section 3 of Chapter 453 of the Acts of 2002, as amended by Chapter 203 of the Acts
6 of 2003, is repealed as obsolete. The reporting requirement pertaining to savings from the
7 Act to fund expenditures for rental of space for clerks of the court for the counties and
8 Baltimore City ended in fiscal 2014.

9 **Chapter 84 of the Acts of 2004, as amended by Chapter 283 of the Acts of 2008**

10 [SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That on or before September 30,
11 2005, and annually thereafter, the Maryland Department of Transportation shall report to
12 the Governor and, in accordance with § 2-1246 of the State Government Article, to the
13 General Assembly regarding the implementation of this Act by the Department during the
14 immediately preceding fiscal year, including the impact of this Act on small business and
15 minority business enterprises.]

16 DRAFTER'S NOTE:

17 Section 3 of Chapter 84 of the Acts of 2004, as amended by Chapter 283 of the Acts
18 of 2008, is repealed as redundant since all of the information called for under Section 3 is
19 included in other reports on small business and minority business enterprises submitted to
20 the General Assembly.

21 **Chapter 206 of the Acts of 2004**

22 [SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the Department of Business
23 and Economic Development shall report, on or before September 1 of each year, in
24 accordance with § 2-1246 of the State Government Article to the Legislative Policy
25 Committee on the results of the implementation of the provisions of this Act.]

26 DRAFTER'S NOTE:

27 Section 3 of Chapter 206 of the Acts of 2004 is repealed as impractical. The report
28 required under this section pertains to the implementation of a measure concerning
29 financial assistance awarded under the Economic Development Opportunities Program
30 Fund and the Maryland Economic Development Assistance Authority and Fund and
31 compliance with certain minority business enterprise (MBE) procurement goals. However,
32 Chapter 206 does not provide the Department of Business and Economic Development
33 (DBED) with any means to enforce the requirements of Chapter 206 as State MBE
34 procurement law does not apply to procurement between private businesses. Consequently,
35 DBED has been unable to implement Chapter 206 and has no information to include in a
36 report.

Chapter 551 of the Acts of 2005

[SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the Department of Housing and Community Development shall report to the General Assembly on or before December 31 each year, in accordance with § 2–1246 of the State Government Article, on the implementation of this Act.]

DRAFTER’S NOTE:

Section 3 of Chapter 551 of the Acts of 2005 is repealed and its requirements codified under § 4–215(e) of the Housing and Community Development Article, for transparency.

Chapter 368 of the Acts of 2007

[SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That:

(1) Prior to awarding financial incentives to the Chief Investment Officer of the State Retirement Agency under Section 1 of this Act, the Board of Trustees of the State Retirement and Pension System shall submit for the review and comment of the Senate Budget and Taxation Committee, the House Appropriations Committee, and the Joint Committee on Pensions, in accordance with § 2–1246 of the State Government Article, a copy of the criteria established by the Board of Trustees for awarding financial incentives to the Chief Investment Officer as provided under § 21–118.1(d) of the State Personnel and Pensions Article, as enacted by Section 1 of this Act; and

(2) Within 45 days of receiving the criteria under paragraph (1) of this section, the committees shall submit written comments to the Board of Trustees regarding the criteria.]

DRAFTER’S NOTE:

Section 2 of Chapter 368 of the Acts of 2007 is repealed as obsolete; this reporting requirement by the State Retirement Agency was intended to be a one–time report.

Chapter 397 of the Acts of 2011

[SECTION 30. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the Board of Trustees for the State Retirement and Pension System shall provide an annual report to the Governor and the Joint Committee on Pensions, on or before December 15 of each year, on the funding progress of the several systems. The Secretary of the Department of Budget and Management shall report biennially, beginning on January 1, 2013, to the Governor and the General Assembly, in accordance with § 2–1246 of the State Government Article, on the financial health of the several systems. The Secretary’s report shall reflect the State system’s progress towards achieving the statutory funding goals, and shall include recommendations concerning modifications to the funding methods or benefits structure.]

1 DRAFTER'S NOTE:

2 Section 30 of Chapter 397 of the Acts of 2011 is repealed as superfluous since the
3 data requested of the Secretary of Budget and Management is available in annual
4 valuations prepared for the State Retirement and Pension System and which are readily
5 available to the public.

6 **Chapter 617 of the Acts of 2013**

7 [SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That Section 2 of this Act shall
8 take effect on the recognition by the federal government of same-sex marriage for purposes
9 of the federal income tax. Within 5 days after the federal government recognizes same-sex
10 marriage for purposes of the federal income tax, the Office of the Comptroller shall notify
11 the Department of Legislative Services. If Section 2 of this Act takes effect, Section 1 of this
12 Act shall be abrogated and of no further force and effect.]

13 DRAFTER'S NOTE:

14 Section 3 of Chapter 617 of the Acts of 2013 is repealed as obsolete; on August 29,
15 2013, the U.S. Department of the Treasury and the Internal Revenue Service announced
16 IR-2013-72, under which same-sex couples, legally married in jurisdictions that recognize
17 their marriages will be treated as married for federal tax purposes.

18 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That, notwithstanding Joint
19 Resolution 5 of 1985, the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene:

20 (1) is not required to report on or before July 1, 1986, and annually
21 thereafter by July 1 of each year on the development and implementation of a
22 comprehensive groundwater protections strategy and on the coordinated efforts by the
23 State agencies in groundwater protection and supply; and

24 (2) include in the annual report an analysis of any contamination or
25 substantial depletion of groundwater supplies and the potential for contamination or
26 depletion of groundwater supplies and the potential for contamination of groundwater in
27 the future.

28 DRAFTER'S NOTE:

29 The requirements under Joint Resolution 5 of 1985 are repealed as obsolete. The
30 report required by Joint Resolution 5 predates the enactment of federal requirements that
31 call for periodic reporting of detailed information about groundwater. Additionally, Joint
32 Resolution 5 predates the establishment of the Department of the Environment and
33 required the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene to submit the annual report.
34 Currently, the federal reports are readily available to the public on the Web site of the
35 Department of the Environment.

1 SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect June
2 1, 2015.
