- SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,
   That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

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1 (i) a firefighter, an emergency medical technician, a correctional 2 officer, a police officer, or a deputy sheriff employed full time by a public safety agency in 3 the county or municipal corporation where the individual resides; or

4 (ii) a volunteer firefighter OR A VOLUNTEER EMERGENCY 5 MEDICAL TECHNICIAN for a public safety agency in the county or municipal corporation 6 where the individual resides.

7 (b) The governing body of a county or municipal corporation may grant, by law, a 8 property tax credit under this section against the county or municipal corporation property 9 tax imposed on a dwelling located in the county or municipal corporation that is owned by 10 a public safety officer if the public safety officer is otherwise eligible for the credit 11 authorized under § 9–105 of this title.

- 12 (c) In any taxable year, the credit under this section may not exceed the lesser of:
- 13 (1) \$2,500 per dwelling; or
- 14 (2) the amount of property tax imposed on the dwelling.
- 15 (d) The governing body of a county or a municipal corporation may establish, by16 law:
- 17 (1) subject to subsection (c) of this section, the amount of the credit under 18 this section;
- 19 (2) the duration of the credit;
- 20 (3) additional eligibility requirements for public safety officers to qualify 21 for the credit;
- (4) procedures for the application and uniform processing of requests forthe credit; and
- 24 (5) any other provisions necessary to carry out this section.
- SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect June
   1, 2019, and shall be applicable to all taxable years beginning after June 30, 2019.

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
