CHAPTER

1 AN ACT concerning

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Natural Resources Police Force - Number of Officers

3 FOR the purpose of stating the intent of the General Assembly that the Natural 4 Resources Police Force employ a certain number of Natural Resources police 5 officers by a certain date; authorizing under certain circumstances, beginning in 6 a certain fiscal year and continuing each subsequent year, the Natural 7 Resources Police Force to increase the number of cadets and recruits enrolling 8 in the Maryland Natural Resources Police Academy until the size of the force is 9 sufficient to meet a certain mission of the Department; requiring the Natural Resources Police Force to provide certain reports to the General Assembly on or 10 11 before certain dates; and generally relating to the Natural Resources Police 12 Force.

WHEREAS, Chapter 367 of the Acts of 2010 demonstrated the intent of the General Assembly to strengthen enforcement of the State's conservation laws consistent with the public trust doctrine, which affirms government's responsibility to

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administer, protect, manage, and conserve fish and wildlife for the benefit of the public; and

WHEREAS, The lingering economic recession has resulted in a historic reduction in financial support from the General Fund to the Natural Resources Police Force, resulting in fewer Natural Resources police officers in the field and on the waterways and more frequent violation of the State's conservation laws; and

WHEREAS, Since 1990, there has been a 50% decrease in the number of Natural Resources police officers in the State; and

WHEREAS, The intent of this Act is to increase the number of Natural Resource police officers employed by the Natural Resources Police Force to at least 435 officers within the next 10 years, with due regard to the dictates of fiscal practicality, to safeguard the State's legacy of protecting natural resources for the benefit of future generations; now, therefore,

SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

Article - Natural Resources

17 **1–201.2.**

- (A) IT IS THE INTENT OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY THAT THE NATURAL RESOURCES POLICE FORCE EMPLOY AT LEAST 435 NATURAL RESOURCES POLICE OFFICERS BY FISCAL YEAR 2022.
- 21 (B) (1) TO THE EXTENT THAT FUNDS ARE AVAILABLE AS BUDGET
 22 CONDITIONS IMPROVE IN THE STATE, BEGINNING IN FISCAL YEAR 2014 AND
 23 CONTINUING IN EACH SUBSEQUENT YEAR, THE NATURAL RESOURCES POLICE
 24 FORCE MAY INCREASE THE NUMBER OF CADETS AND RECRUITS ENROLLING IN
 25 THE MARYLAND NATURAL RESOURCES POLICE ACADEMY UNTIL THE SIZE OF
 26 THE FORCE IS SUFFICIENT TO MEET THE MISSION OF THE DEPARTMENT.
- 27 (2) ON OR BEFORE JUNE 30, 2013, AND EACH JUNE 30
 28 THEREAFTER UNTIL JUNE 30, 2022, THE NATURAL RESOURCES POLICE FORCE
 29 SHALL REPORT TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY, IN ACCORDANCE WITH § 2–1246
 30 OF THE STATE GOVERNMENT ARTICLE, ON THE PROGRESS THE POLICE FORCE
 31 HAS MADE IN ACHIEVING THE GOAL OF EMPLOYING NATURAL RESOURCES
 32 POLICE OFFICERS ESTABLISHED UNDER THIS SECTION.
- 33 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect 34 July 1, 2012.
