An Act To Eliminate the Cap on Weekly Benefits in Workers' Compensation Cases

- 1 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
- 2 Sec. 1. 39-A MRSA §211, as amended by PL 2011, c. 647, §3, is repealed.

Sec. 2. 39-A MRSA §212, sub-§1, as amended by PL 2011, c. 647, §4, is further
 amended to read:

5 **1. Total incapacity; date of injury prior to January 1, 2013.** If the injured 6 employee's date of injury is prior to January 1, 2013, while the incapacity for work 7 resulting from the injury is total, the employer shall pay the injured employee a weekly 8 compensation equal to 80% of the employee's after-tax average weekly wage, but not 9 more than the maximum benefit under section 211. Compensation must be paid for the 10 duration of the incapacity.

Any employee who is able to perform full-time remunerative work in the ordinary competitive labor market in the State, regardless of the availability of such work in and around that employee's community, is not eligible for compensation under this section, but may be eligible for compensation under section 213.

15 Sec. 3. 39-A MRSA §212, sub-§1-A, as enacted by PL 2011, c. 647, §5, is
 amended to read:

**17 1-A. Total incapacity; date of injury on or after January 1, 2013.** If the injured 18 employee's date of injury is on or after January 1, 2013, while the incapacity for work 19 resulting from the injury is total, the employer shall pay the injured employee a weekly 20 compensation equal to 2/3 of the employee's gross average weekly wages, earnings or 21 salary, but not more than the maximum benefit under section 211. Compensation must be 22 paid for the duration of the incapacity.

- Any employee who is able to perform full-time remunerative work in the ordinary competitive labor market in the State, regardless of the availability of such work in and around that employee's community, is not eligible for compensation under this section, but may be eligible for compensation under section 213.
- Sec. 4. 39-A MRSA §212, sub-§3, as amended by PL 2011, c. 647, §6, is further
   amended to read:

3. Specific loss benefits. In cases included in the following schedule, the incapacity
is considered to continue for the period specified, and the compensation due is calculated
based on the date of injury subject to the maximum benefit set in section 211.
Compensation under this subsection is available only for the actual loss of the following:

- A. Thumb, 65 weeks;
- B. First finger, 38 weeks;
- 35 C. Second finger, 33 weeks;
- 36 D. Third finger, 22 weeks;
- E. Fourth finger, 16 weeks;

1 2 3 4 5 6	F. The loss of the first phalange of the thumb, or of any finger, is considered to be equal to the loss of $1/2$ of that thumb or finger, and compensation is $1/2$ of the amounts specified in paragraphs A to E. The loss of more than one phalange is considered as the loss of the entire finger or thumb. The amount received for more than one finger may not exceed the amount provided in this schedule for the loss of a hand;
7	G. Great toe, 33 weeks;
8 9 10 11	H. A toe other than the great toe, 11 weeks. The loss of the first phalange of any toe is considered to be equal to the loss of $1/2$ of that toe, and compensation is $1/2$ of the amounts specified in paragraphs F and G. The loss of more than one phalange is considered the loss of the entire toe;
12 13	I. Hand, 215 weeks. An amputation between the elbow and wrist that is 6 or more inches below the elbow is considered a hand;
14 15	J. Arm, 269 weeks. An amputation above the point specified in paragraph I is considered an arm;
16 17	K. Foot, 162 weeks. An amputation between the knee and the foot 7 or more inches below the tibial table, or plateau, is considered a foot;
18 19	L. Leg, 215 weeks. An amputation above the point specified in paragraph K is considered a leg; and

24 25	<b>1. Benefit and duration.</b> While the incapacity for work is partial, the employer shall pay the injured employee a weekly compensation as follows.
26 27 28 29 30 31 32 33 34 35 36 37 38 39 40 41 42	A. If the injured employee's date of injury is prior to January 1, 2013, the weekly compensation is equal to 80% of the difference between the injured employee's after- tax average weekly wage before the personal injury and the after-tax average weekly wage that the injured employee is able to earn after the injury <del>, but not more than the maximum benefit under section 211</del> . Compensation must be paid for the duration of the disability if the employee's permanent impairment, determined according to subsection 1-A and the impairment guidelines adopted by the board pursuant to section 153, subsection 8, resulting from the personal injury is in excess of 15% to the body. In all other cases an employee is not eligible to receive compensation under this paragraph after the employee has received a total of 260 weeks of compensation under section 212, subsection 1, this paragraph or both. The board may in the exercise of its discretion extend the duration of benefit entitlement beyond 260 weeks in cases involving extreme financial hardship due to inability to return to gainful employment. This authority may be delegated by the board, on a case-by-case basis, to an administrative law judge or a panel of 3 administrative law judges. Decisions made under this paragraph must be made expeditiously. A decision under this paragraph made by an administrative law judge or a panel of 3 administrative law

1 judges may not be appealed to the board under section 320, but may be appealed 2 pursuant to section 322.

3 B. If the injured employee's date of injury is on or after January 1, 2013, the weekly compensation is equal to 2/3 of the difference, due to the injury, between the 4 employee's average gross weekly wages, earnings or salary before the injury and the 5 average gross weekly wages, earnings or salary that the employee is able to earn after 6 the injury, but not more than the maximum benefit under section 211. An employee 7 is not eligible to receive compensation under this paragraph after the employee has 8 received a total of 520 weeks of compensation under section 212, subsection 1-A, this 9 paragraph or both. The board may in the exercise of its discretion extend the duration 10 of benefit entitlement beyond 520 weeks in cases involving extreme financial 11 12 hardship due to inability to return to gainful employment. This authority may be delegated by the board, on a case-by-case basis, to an administrative law judge or a 13 panel of 3 administrative law judges. The board, administrative law judge or panel 14 15 shall make a decision under this paragraph expeditiously. A decision under this paragraph made by an administrative law judge or a panel of 3 administrative law 16 judges may not be appealed to the board under section 320, but may be appealed 17 pursuant to section 321-A. 18

- 19 Orders extending benefits beyond 520 weeks are not subject to review more often 20 than every 2 years from the date of the board order or request allowing an extension.
- 21 Sec. 6. 39-A MRSA §213, sub-§1-B, as enacted by PL 2011, c. 647, §8, is 22 amended to read:
- 23 1-B. Long-term partial incapacity; date of injury on or after January 1, 2013. After the exhaustion of benefits under subsection 1, paragraph B if the whole person 24 permanent impairment resulting from the injury is in excess of 18% and if the employee 25 26 is working and the employee's earnings, as measured by average weekly earnings over the most recent 26-week period documented by payroll records or tax returns, is 65% or less 27 of the preinjury average weekly wage, the employer shall pay weekly compensation equal 28 29 to 2/3 of the difference between the employee's average weekly wage at the time of the injury and the employee's postinjury wage, but not more than the maximum benefit under 30 section 211. In order for the employee to qualify for benefits under this subsection, the 31 employee's actual earnings must be commensurate with the employee's earning capacity, 32 which includes consideration of the employee's physical and psychological work capacity 33 as determined by an independent examiner under section 312. In addition, in order for 34 the employee to qualify for benefits under this subsection, the employee must have 35 earnings from employment for a period of not less than 12 months within a 24-month 36 37 period prior to the expiration of the 520-week durational limit under subsection 1, paragraph B. Compensation under this subsection must be paid at a fixed rate. 38
- While the employee is claiming or receiving extended partial incapacity benefits under this subsection, the employee shall complete and provide quarterly employment status reports and provide copies of current tax returns as early as practicable after the return is filed.
- The employee's entitlement to extended partial incapacity benefits under this subsection is determined based upon the facts that exist at the time of expiration of 520 weeks of

benefits under subsection 1, paragraph B. If the employee is not entitled to extended 1 2 partial incapacity benefits upon the expiration of 520 weeks of benefits under subsection 1, paragraph B, the employee's entitlement to partial incapacity benefits expires. If the 3 employee is entitled to extended partial incapacity benefits under this subsection, once 4 the employee's earnings, as measured by average weekly earnings over the most recent 5 26-week period, are equal to or greater than the preinjury average weekly wage, the 6 employee's entitlement to extended partial incapacity benefits under this subsection 7 8 terminates permanently.

- B. If an injured employee's date of injury is prior to January 1, 2013 and the 11 12 employee is employed at any job and the average weekly wage of the employee is less than that which the employee received before the date of injury, the employee is 13 entitled to receive weekly benefits under this Act equal to 80% of the difference 14 between the injured employee's after-tax weekly wage before the date of injury and 15 the after-tax weekly wage that the injured employee is able to earn after the date of 16 injury, but not more than the maximum weekly rate of compensation, as determined 17 18 under section 211.
- Sec. 8. 39-A MRSA §214, sub-§1, ¶B-1, as enacted by PL 2011, c. 647, §11, is
   amended to read:
- 21 B-1. If an injured employee's date of injury is on or after January 1, 2013 and the employee is employed at any job and the average weekly wage of the employee is 22 less than that which the employee received before the date of injury, the employee is 23 entitled to receive weekly benefits under this Act equal to 2/3 of the difference, due 24 25 to the injury, between the employee's average gross weekly wages, earnings or salary before the injury and the average gross weekly wages, earnings or salary that the 26 employee is able to earn after the injury, but not more than the maximum weekly rate 27 of compensation, as determined under section 211. 28
- Sec. 9. 39-A MRSA §215, sub-§1, as amended by PL 2011, c. 647, §12, is
   further amended to read:

1. Death of employee; date of injury prior to January 1, 2013. If an injured 31 employee's date of injury is prior to January 1, 2013 and if death results from the injury of 32 the employee, the employer shall pay or cause to be paid to the dependents of the 33 employee who were wholly dependent upon the employee's earnings for support at the 34 time of the injury a weekly payment equal to 80% of the employee's after-tax average 35 weekly wage, but not more than the maximum benefit under section 211, for a period of 36 500 weeks from the date of death. If the employee leaves dependents only partially 37 dependent upon the employee's earnings for support at the time of injury, the employer 38 shall pay weekly compensation equal to the same proportion of the weekly payments for 39 40 the benefit of persons wholly dependent, as 80% of the amount contributed by the employee to such partial dependents bears to the annual earnings of the deceased at the 41 time of injury. If, at the expiration of the 500-week period, any wholly or partially 42

dependent person is less than 18 years of age, the employer shall continue to pay or cause

3 If a dependent spouse dies or becomes a dependent of another person, the payments must 4 cease upon the payment to the spouse of the balance of the compensation to which the spouse would otherwise have been entitled but in no event to exceed the sum of \$500.00. 5 The remaining weeks of compensation, if any, are payable to those persons either wholly 6 or partially dependent upon the employee for support at the employee's death. When, at 7 the expiration of the 500-week period, any wholly or partially dependent person is less 8 than 18 years of age, the employer shall continue to pay or cause to be paid the weekly 9 compensation, until that person reaches the age of 18. The payment of compensation to 10 any dependent child after the expiration of the 500-week period ceases when the child 11 reaches the age of 18 years, if at the age of 18 years the child is neither physically nor 12 mentally incapacitated from earning, or when the child reaches the age of 16 years and 13 thereafter is self-supporting for 6 months. If the child ceases to be self-supporting 14 thereafter, the dependency must be reinstated. As long as any of the 500 weeks of 15 compensation remain, that compensation is payable to the person either wholly or 16 partially dependent upon the deceased employee for support at the time of the employee's 17 death, with the exception of a dependent spouse who becomes a dependent of another. If 18 19 a wholly dependent or partially dependent child who reaches 18 years of age is either physically or mentally incapacitated so as to be unable to earn a living as determined by 20 the board, the payments must continue until such time as the child either dies or is no 21 longer physically or mentally incapacitated from earning. 22

23 Sec. 10. 39-A MRSA §215, sub-§1-A, as enacted by PL 2011, c. 647, §13, is
 24 amended to read:

25 1-A. Death of employee; date of injury on or after January 1, 2013. If an injured employee's date of injury is on or after January 1, 2013 and if death results from the 26 injury of the employee, the employer shall pay or cause to be paid to the dependents of 27 the employee who were wholly dependent upon the employee's earnings for support at 28 29 the time of the injury a weekly payment equal to 2/3 of the employee's gross average weekly wages, earnings or salary, but not more than the maximum benefit under section 30  $\frac{211}{10}$  for a period of 500 weeks from the date of death. If the employee leaves dependents 31 only partially dependent upon the employee's earnings for support at the time of injury, 32 the employer shall pay weekly compensation equal to the same proportion of the weekly 33 payments for the benefit of persons wholly dependent, as 2/3 of the amount contributed 34 by the employee to such partial dependents bears to the annual earnings of the deceased 35 at the time of injury. If, at the expiration of the 500-week period, any wholly or partially 36 dependent person is less than 18 years of age, the employer shall continue to pay or cause 37 to be paid the weekly compensation until that person reaches the age of 18. 38

If a dependent spouse dies or becomes a dependent of another person, the payments must cease upon the payment to the spouse of the balance of the compensation to which the spouse would otherwise have been entitled but in no event to exceed the sum of \$500.00. The remaining weeks of compensation, if any, are payable to those persons either wholly or partially dependent upon the employee for support at the employee's death. When, at the expiration of the 500-week period, any wholly or partially dependent person is less than 18 years of age, the employer shall continue to pay or cause to be paid the weekly

compensation, until that person reaches the age of 18. The payment of compensation to 1 any dependent child after the expiration of the 500-week period ceases when the child 2 reaches the age of 18 years, if at the age of 18 years the child is neither physically nor 3 mentally incapacitated from earning, or when the child reaches the age of 16 years and 4 thereafter is self-supporting for 6 months. If the child ceases to be self-supporting 5 thereafter, the dependency must be reinstated. As long as any of the 500 weeks of 6 compensation remain, that compensation is payable to the person either wholly or 7 partially dependent upon the deceased employee for support at the time of the employee's 8 9 death, with the exception of a dependent spouse who becomes a dependent of another. If a wholly dependent or partially dependent child who reaches 18 years of age is either 10 physically or mentally incapacitated so as to be unable to earn a living as determined by 11 the board, the payments must continue until such time as the child either dies or is no 12 longer physically or mentally incapacitated from earning. 13

## SUMMARY

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15 Current law caps the weekly benefit payable under the laws governing workers' 16 compensation to a maximum amount set in statute or a percentage of the state average 17 weekly wage, whichever is higher. This bill eliminates the cap on the weekly benefits.
