 1. Definitions. As used in this section, unless the context otherwise indicate following terms have the following meanings. A. "Composting facility" means a solid waste processing facility where or materials are processed using a method of accelerated biological decompositi organic material under controlled aerobic or anaerobic conditions. B. "Food waste" means food material produced from human or animal production, preparation and consumption activities and that consists of, but limited to, fruits, vegetables and other vegetative material, grains and fish and a products and by-products. "Food waste" does not include hazardous waste, biomy waste, sewage or septage. C. "Grocery store" means a store primarily engaged in the retail sale of canned dry goods, fresh fruits and vegetables, fresh meats, fish and poultry. D. Prohibition. Beginning January 1, 2024, a grocery store may not dispose facilitate the disposal of food waste or surplus food acquired for retail sale by or gene at the grocery store at a waste-to-energy facility or landfill.
