1.2 1.3 1.4	relating to capital investment; authorizing the issuance of redevelopment appropriation bonds for areas damaged by civil unrest; appropriating money; proposing coding for new law in Minnesota Statutes, chapter 16A.
1.5	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:
1.6	Section 1. LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS; PURPOSE.
1.7	(a) The legislature recognizes the civil unrest that occurred in Minnesota in May and
1.8	June of 2020. While the immediate cause of the unrest was the apparent murder of George
1.9	Floyd by an officer of the Minneapolis Police Department, it was compounded by other
1.10	long-standing structural systems of inequality and racism within the city, state, and nation.
1.11	The legislature further recognizes that some acts of protest and civil disobedience, occurring
1.12	among a small minority of participants, led to severe damage or destruction to small
1.13	businesses and other private property in Minneapolis and St. Paul.
1.14	(b) The financing provided by Minnesota Statutes, section 16A.9661, is for the public
1.15	purpose of redeveloping the areas damaged by the civil unrest. The public purpose of
1.16	redevelopment is to help support enterprise development and wealth creation for persons
1.17	adversely affected by long-standing structural racial discrimination and poverty and prevent
1.18	displacement of low-income residents, homes, and small businesses owned by people of
1.19	color and indigenous people.
1.20	Sec. 2. [16A.9661] REDEVELOPMENT APPROPRIATION BONDS.
1.21	Subdivision 1. <b>Definitions.</b> (a) The definitions in this subdivision apply to this section.

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2.1	(b) "Appropriation bond" or "bond" means a bond, note, or other similar instrument of
2.2	the state payable during a biennium from one or more of the following sources:
2.3	(1) money appropriated by law from the general fund in any biennium for debt service
2.4	due with respect to obligations described in subdivision 2, paragraph (a);
2.5	(2) proceeds of the sale of obligations described in subdivision 2, paragraph (a);
2.6	(3) payments received for that purpose under agreements and ancillary arrangements
2.7	described in subdivision 2, paragraph (d); and
2.8	(4) investment earnings on amounts in clauses (1) to (3).
2.9	(c) "City" means Minneapolis or St. Paul, or an agency of Minneapolis or St. Paul.
2.10	(d) "Debt service" means the amount payable in any biennium of principal, premium,
2.11	if any, and interest on appropriation bonds, and the fees, charges, and expenses related to
2.12	the bonds.
2.13	(e) "Eligible area" means an area in Minneapolis or St. Paul adversely affected by civil
2.14	unrest during the peacetime emergency declared in Emergency Executive Order 20-64.
2.15	(f) "Redevelopment" may include the acquisition of real property; site preparation;
2.16	predesign, design, engineering, repair, or renovation of facilities damaged during the civil
2.17	unrest and construction of buildings, infrastructure, and related site amenities; landscaping;
2.18	street-scaping; land-banking for future development or redevelopment; or financing any of
2.19	these activities taken on by a private party pursuant to an agreement with the city.
2.20	Redevelopment does not include project costs eligible for compensation or assistance
2.21	available through insurance policies or from other organizations or government agencies.
2.22	Subd. 2. Authorization to issue appropriation bonds. (a) Subject to the limitations of
2.23	this subdivision, the commissioner may sell and issue appropriation bonds of the state under
2.24	this section for public purposes as provided by law, including for the purposes of capitalizing
2.25	an account in the city of Minneapolis' community property development fund and an account
2.26	in the St. Paul housing and redevelopment authority's funds to pay for redevelopment in
2.27	the eligible areas. Appropriation bonds may be sold and issued in amounts that, in the
2.28	opinion of the commissioner, are necessary to provide sufficient money to the commissioner
2.29	of administration under subdivision 7, not to exceed \$ net of costs of issuance, for the
2.30	purposes as provided under this subdivision; to pay debt service including capitalized
2.31	interest, costs of issuance, and costs of credit enhancement; or to make payments under
2.32	other agreements entered into under paragraph (d).

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(b) Proceeds of the appropriation bonds must be credited to a special appropriation 3.1 redevelopment bond proceeds fund in the state treasury. All income from investment of the 3.2 bond proceeds is appropriated to the commissioner for the payment of principal and interest 3.3 on the appropriation bonds. 3.4 (c) Appropriation bonds may be issued in one or more issues or series on the terms and 3.5 conditions the commissioner determines to be in the best interests of the state, but the term 3.6 on any series of appropriation bonds may not exceed 21 years. The appropriation bonds of 3.7 each issue and series thereof shall be dated and bear interest from the date of issuance, and 3.8 may be includable in or excludable from the gross income of the owners for federal income 3.9 3.10 tax purposes. 3.11 (d) At the time of, or in anticipation of, issuing the appropriation bonds, and at any time thereafter so long as the appropriation bonds are outstanding, the commissioner may enter 3.12 into agreements and ancillary arrangements relating to the appropriation bonds, including 3.13 but not limited to trust indentures, grant agreements, lease or use agreements, operating 3.14 agreements, management agreements, liquidity facilities, remarketing or dealer agreements, 3.15 letter of credit agreements, insurance policies, guaranty agreements, reimbursement 3.16 agreements, indexing agreements, or interest exchange agreements. Any payments made 3.17 or received according to the agreement or ancillary arrangement shall be made from or 3.18 deposited as provided in the agreement or ancillary arrangement. The determination of the 3.19 commissioner, included in an interest exchange agreement, that the agreement relates to an 3.20 appropriation bond, shall be conclusive. 3.21 (e) The commissioner may enter into written agreements or contracts relating to the 3.22 continuing disclosure of information necessary to comply with or facilitate the issuance of 3.23 appropriation bonds in accordance with federal securities laws, rules, and regulations, 3.24 including Securities and Exchange Commission rules and regulations in Code of Federal 3.25 Regulations, title 17, section 240.15c 2-12. An agreement may be in the form of covenants 3.26 with purchasers and holders of appropriation bonds set forth in the order or resolution 3.27 authorizing the issuance of the appropriation bonds, or a separate document authorized by 3.28 3.29 the order or resolution. (f) The appropriation bonds are not subject to chapter 16C. 3.30 Subd. 3. Form; procedure. (a) Appropriation bonds may be issued in the form of bonds, 3.31 notes, or other similar instruments in the manner provided in section 16A.672. In the event 3.32 that any provision of section 16A.672 conflicts with this section, this section shall control. 3.33

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4.1	(b) Every appropriation bond shall include a conspicuous statement of the limitation
4.2	established in subdivision 6.
4.3	(c) Appropriation bonds may be sold at either public or private sale upon such terms as
4.4	the commissioner shall determine are not inconsistent with this section and may be sold at
4.5	any price or percentage of par value. Any bid received may be rejected.
4.6	(d) Appropriation bonds must bear interest at a fixed or variable rate.
4.7	(e) Notwithstanding any other law, appropriation bonds issued under this section shall
4.8	be fully negotiable.
4.9	Subd. 4. Refunding bonds. The commissioner may issue appropriation bonds for the
4.10	purpose of refunding any appropriation bonds issued under subdivision 2 then outstanding,
4.11	including the payment of any redemption premiums on the bonds, any interest accrued or
4.12	to accrue to the redemption date, and costs related to the issuance and sale of the refunding
4.13	bonds. The proceeds of any refunding bonds may, at the discretion of the commissioner,
4.14	be applied to the purchase or payment at maturity of the appropriation bonds to be refunded,
4.15	to the redemption of the outstanding appropriation bonds on any redemption date, or to pay
4.16	interest on the refunding bonds and may, pending application, be placed in escrow to be
4.17	applied to the purchase, payment, retirement, or redemption. Any escrowed proceeds,
4.18	pending such use, may be invested and reinvested in obligations that are authorized
4.19	investments under section 11A.24. The income earned or realized on the investment may
4.20	also be applied to the payment of the appropriation bonds to be refunded or interest or
4.21	premiums on the refunded appropriation bonds, or to pay interest on the refunding bonds.
4.22	After the terms of the escrow have been fully satisfied, any balance of the proceeds and any
4.23	investment income may be returned to the general fund or, if applicable, the special
4.24	appropriation redevelopment bond proceeds fund for use in any lawful manner. All refunding
4.25	bonds issued under this subdivision must be prepared, executed, delivered, and secured by
4.26	appropriations in the same manner as the appropriation bonds to be refunded.
4.27	Subd. 5. Appropriation bonds as legal investments. Any of the following entities may
4.28	legally invest any sinking funds, money, or other funds belonging to them or under their
4.29	control in any appropriation bonds issued under this section:
4.30	(1) the state, the investment board, public officers, municipal corporations, political
4.31	subdivisions, and public bodies;
4.32	(2) banks and bankers, savings and loan associations, credit unions, trust companies,
4.33	savings banks and institutions, investment companies, insurance companies, insurance
4.34	associations, and other persons carrying on a banking or insurance business; and

5.2	Subd. 6. No full faith and cre	dit; state not required	to make appropria	tions. The
5.3	appropriation bonds are not public	e debt of the state, and the	ne full faith, credit, a	and taxing

5.5	payment that the state agrees to m	ake under this section. A	Appropriation bonds	s shall not be
5.6	obligations paid directly, in whole	or in part, from a tax of	f statewide applicati	on on any
5.7	class of property, income, transact	tion, or privilege. Appro	priation bonds shall	be payable

5.15	Subd. 7. Appropriation of pro	oceeds. The proceeds of	appropriation bonds	issued under
5.16	subdivision 2, paragraph (a), and in	nterest credited to the spe	cial appropriation re	development
5.17	bond proceeds fund are appropriat	ted as follows:		
5.18	(1) to the commissioner of emp	ployment and economic	development for a g	rant of \$

5.27	is appropriated each fiscal year fro	m the general fund to the	commissioner, subj	ect to repeal,

5.32	Subd. 9. Waiver of immunity	. The waiver of immunit	ty by the state provi	ded for by
5.33	section 3.751, subdivision 1, shall	be applicable to the appro-	opriation bonds and	any ancillary
5.34	contracts to which the commission	ner is a party.		

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6.1	Subd. 10. Grant agreements. In addition to any other terms in a grant agreement between
6.2	the commissioner of employment and economic development, a grant of special appropriation
6.3	redevelopment bonds proceeds must:
6.4	(1) require the city to segregate the grant funds in a separate account;
6.5	(2) pay to the state for deposit into the bond payments account established for such
6.6	purpose in the special appropriation redevelopment bond proceeds fund the proceeds of the
6.7	sale of any property financed with a grant under this section, in an amount up to the amount
6.8	of the grant; and
6.9	(3) report to the commissioner of employment and economic development each on the
6.10	expenditures made from the accounts funded with a grant made under this section in the
6.11	form that the commissioner prescribes and include any documentation of and supporting
6.12	information regarding the expenditures that the commissioner requires.
6.13	Subd. 11. Audit. The commissioner of employment and economic development must
6.14	review the report of expenditures made by the cities.
6.15	<b>EFFECTIVE DATE.</b> This section is effective the day following final enactment.
