\$600,000 the second year is from the trust
fund to the commissioner of natural resources
for an agreement with the St. Louis and Lake
Counties Regional Railroad Authority for
environmental assessment, permitting,
right-of-way easements or other acquisition
as needed, engineering, and construction of
an approximately three-mile-long bituminous
surface section of the Mesabi Trail between
Ely and the intersection of Highway 169 and
County Road 88. This appropriation is
available until June 30, 2022, by which time
the project must be completed and final
products delivered.
(c) Harmony State Trail Extension Land Acquisition
\$235,000 the second year is from the trust
fund to the commissioner of natural resources
for an agreement with the city of Harmony to
acquire fee title of about 16 parcels to allow
for the approximate six-mile extension of the
legislatively authorized state trail from
Harmony south to the Iowa state border with
a spur to Niagara Cave. The land must be
transferred to the state after it has been
purchased.
(d) Mississippi Blufflands State Trail - Red Wing Barn Bluff to Colvill Park Segment
\$550,000 the second year is from the trust
fund to the commissioner of natural resources
for an agreement with the city of Red Wing
to be used with other funds to construct an
approximate three-quarter-mile-long
hard-surfaced segment of the Mississippi

4.4	\$700,000 the second year is from the trust
4.5	fund to the commissioner of natural resources
4.6	for an agreement with the city of Baxter, in
4.7	cooperation with Brainerd Public Schools and
4.8	the Camp Ripley Sentinel Landscape Program,
4.9	to acquire about 200 acres of forested land on
4.10	the upper Mississippi River adjacent to

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\$2,000,000 the second year is from the trust 5.1 fund to the commissioner of natural resources 5.2 5.3 to provide technical stewardship assistance to private landowners, restore and enhance about 5.4 270 acres of native prairie protected by 5.5 easements in the native prairie bank, and 5.6 acquire easements for the native prairie bank 5.7 in accordance with Minnesota Statutes, section 5.8 84.96, on about 275 acres, including preparing 5.9 initial baseline property assessments. Up to 5.10 \$120,000 of this appropriation may be 5.11 deposited in the natural resources conservation 5.12 easement stewardship account, created in 5.13 Minnesota Statutes, section 84.69, proportional 5.14 to the number of easement acres acquired. A 5.15 list of proposed easement acquisitions and 5.16 restoration sites for the native prairie bank are 5.17 required in the work plan. This appropriation 5.18 is available until June 30, 2021, by which time 5.19 the project must be completed and final 5.20 products delivered. 5.21 (j) Minnesota State Trail Development 5.22 \$2,500,000 the second year is from the trust 5.23 fund to the commissioner of natural resources 5.24 to expand high-priority recreational 5.25 opportunities on Minnesota's state trails by 5.26 developing new trail segments and 5.27 rehabilitating, improving, and enhancing 5.28 existing state trails. High-priority trail 5.29 segments to develop and enhance include but 5.30 are not limited to the Gateway, Gitchi Gami, 5.31 5.32 Paul Bunyan, and Heartland State Trails. A proposed list of trail projects on legislatively 5.33 authorized state trails is required in the work 5.34 plan. This appropriation is available until June 5.35

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completed and final products delivered. 6.2 (k) Minnesota State Parks and State Trails 6.3 \$2,500,000 the second year is from the trust 6.4 fund to the commissioner of natural resources 6.5 to acquire about 163 acres of high-priority in 6.6 holdings from willing sellers within the 6.7 legislatively authorized boundaries of state 6.8 parks and trails in order to protect Minnesota's 6.9 natural heritage, enhance outdoor recreational 6.10 opportunities, and improve the efficiency of 6.11 public land management. Priorities include 6.12 but are not limited to Tettegouche, Sibley, and 6.13 Minneopa State Parks and the Goodhue 6.14 Pioneer State Trail. A list of proposed 6.15 acquisitions is required in the work plan. This 6.16 appropriation is available until June 30, 2021, 6.17 by which time the project must be completed 6.18 and final products delivered. 6.19 (1) Scientific and Natural Areas Program 6.20 \$3,250,000 the second year is from the trust 6.21 fund to the commissioner of natural resources 6.22 6.23 for the scientific and natural areas program. Of this amount, \$1,500,000 is for habitat 6.24 restoration activities, \$500,000 is for scientific 6.25 and natural areas public engagement and 6.26 outreach, and \$1,250,000 is to acquire strategic 6.27 high-quality lands that meet criteria for 6.28 scientific and natural areas under Minnesota 6.29 Statutes, section 86A.05, from willing sellers. 6.30 A list of proposed acquisitions and restorations 6.31 is required in the work plan. This 6.32 appropriation is available until June 30, 2021, 6.33 by which time the project must be completed 6.34 6.35 and final products delivered.
