Minnesota Statutes 2018, section 144.1501, subdivision 2, is amended to read: 1.8 Subd. 2. Creation of account. (a) A health professional education loan forgiveness 1.9 program account is established. The commissioner of health shall use money from the 1.10 account to establish a loan forgiveness program: 1.11 (1) for medical residents and mental health professionals agreeing to practice in designated 1.12 rural areas or underserved urban communities or specializing in the area of pediatric 1.13 1.14 psychiatry; (2) for midlevel practitioners agreeing to practice in designated rural areas or to teach 1.15 at least 12 credit hours, or 720 hours per year in the nursing field in a postsecondary program 1.16 at the undergraduate level or the equivalent at the graduate level; 1.17 (3) for nurses who agree to practice in a Minnesota nursing home; an intermediate care 1.18 facility for persons with developmental disability; a hospital if the hospital owns and operates 1.19 a Minnesota nursing home and a minimum of 50 percent of the hours worked by the nurse 1.20

is in the nursing home; a housing with services establishment as defined in section 144D.01,

subdivision 4; or for a home care provider as defined in section 144A.43, subdivision 4; or

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agree to teach at least 12 credit hours, or 720 hours per year in the nursing field in a postsecondary program at the undergraduate level or the equivalent at the graduate level;

- (4) for other health care technicians agreeing to teach at least 12 credit hours, or 720 hours per year in their designated field in a postsecondary program at the undergraduate level or the equivalent at the graduate level. The commissioner, in consultation with the Healthcare Education-Industry Partnership, shall determine the health care fields where the need is the greatest, including, but not limited to, respiratory therapy, clinical laboratory technology, radiologic technology, and surgical technology;
- (5) for pharmacists, advanced dental therapists, dental therapists, and public health nurses who agree to practice in designated rural areas; and
- (6) for dentists <u>agreeing</u> who either (i) <u>agree</u> to deliver at least 25 percent of the dentist's yearly patient encounters to state public program enrollees or patients receiving sliding fee schedule discounts through a formal sliding fee schedule meeting the standards established by the United States Department of Health and Human Services under Code of Federal Regulations, title 42, section 51, chapter 303, or (ii) agree to practice in designated rural areas.
- (b) Appropriations made to the account do not cancel and are available until expended, except that at the end of each biennium, any remaining balance in the account that is not committed by contract and not needed to fulfill existing commitments shall cancel to the fund.

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- 2.23 Subdivision 1. **Definitions.** (a) The definitions in this subdivision apply to this section.
- (b) "Commissioner" means the commissioner of health.
- 2.25 (c) "Eligible general practice dental residency program" means a program that:
- 2.26 (1) is located in Minnesota outside the seven-county metropolitan area;
- (2) is accredited by the Commission on Dental Accreditation;
- 2.28 (3) provides instruction in all areas of general dentistry, including diagnosis, treatment planning, and dental care; and
- 2.30 (4) includes a focus on educating and training dentists to serve patients outside the seven-county metropolitan area.

(d) "Seven-county metropolitan area" has the meaning given in section 473.121,

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3.2 subdivision 4. Subd. 2. Program administration. The commissioner shall award grants to eligible 3.3 general practice dental residency programs to support current and new general practice 3.4 dental residency positions outside the seven-county metropolitan area. Funds shall be 3.5 allocated first to proposed new general practice dental residency positions outside the 3.6 seven-county metropolitan area. Remaining funds shall be allocated proportionally based 3.7 on the number of existing residents in eligible general practice dental residency programs 3.8 that apply for a grant under this section. 3.9 3.10 Subd. 3. Uses of grant funds. (a) A general practice dental residency program shall use grant funds awarded under this section only to cover the costs of: 3.11 (1) establishing, maintaining, or expanding training for general practice dental residents 3.12 outside the seven-county metropolitan area; 3.13 3.14 (2) recruiting, training, and retaining residents and faculty; (3) travel and lodging for residents; and 3.15 (4) faculty, resident, and preceptor salaries. 3.16 (b) Grant funds awarded under this section shall not be used to supplant any other 3.17 government or private funds available for these purposes. 3.18 Subd. 4. Application. Eligible general practice dental residency programs seeking a 3.19 grant under this section must apply to the commissioner according to timelines and in a 3.20 manner established by the commissioner. The application must include objectives, a work 3.21 plan and budget, a description of the new and existing residency positions that will be 3.22 supported using grant funds, and additional information required by the commissioner. The 3.23 commissioner shall determine whether applications are complete and responsive and may 3.24 require an applicant to revise its application or provide additional information before 3.25 awarding a grant. 3.26 3.27 Subd. 5. **Program oversight.** The commissioner shall require general practice dental residency programs receiving a grant under this section to provide the commissioner with 3.28 3.29 information necessary to administer and evaluate the grant program. In evaluating the grant program, the commissioner must examine how grant funds were used to establish new 3.30 residency positions or enhance current residency positions, including through facility 3.31 improvements, and must collect data on shortages of dentists and dental services outside 3.32 the seven-county metropolitan area. 3.33
