1.5	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:
1.6	Section 1. [148G.01] DEFINITIONS.
1.7	Subdivision 1. Scope. The terms defined in this section apply to this chapter.
1.8	Subd. 2. Advisory council. "Advisory council" means the Music Therapy Advisory
1.9	Council established in section 148G.05.
1.10	Subd. 3. Board-certified music therapist. "Board-certified music therapist" means a
1.11	person who has completed the education and clinical training requirements established by
1.12	the American Music Therapy Association and holds current board certification from the
1.13	Certification Board for Music Therapists.
1.14	Subd. 4. Commissioner. "Commissioner" means the commissioner of health or a
1.15	designee.
1.16	Subd. 5. Music-based interventions. "Music-based interventions" means the use of
1.17	evidence-based approaches and techniques including, but not limited to, music improvisation,
1.18	receptive music listening, song writing, lyric discussion, music and imagery, singing, music
1.19	performance, learning through music, music combined with other arts, music-assisted
1.20	relaxation, music-based patient education, electronic music intervention, and movement to
1.21	music that are implemented in the context of the practice of music therapy.

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2.1	Subd. 6. Music therapist. "Music therapist" means a person who meets the qualifications				
2.2	in section 148G.15 and is licensed by the commissioner.				
2.3	Subd. 7. Music therapy. "Music therapy" means the clinical and evidence-based use of				
2.4	music-based interventions to accomplish individualized goals for persons of all ages and				
2.5	ability levels within a therapeutic relationship with a board-certified music therapist.

2.7	Subdivision 1. Membership. The commissioner shall appoint five members to the Music				
2.8	Therapy Advisory Council consisting of the following:				
2.9	(1) one member who is a licensed health care professional who is not a music therapist;				
2.10	(2) one member who is a consumer; and				
2.11	(3) three members who practice as music therapists in this state.

2.14	Subd. 3. Duties. The advisory council shall:

[148G.10] UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE; PROTECTED TITLES; EXEMPT 3.3 PERSONS. 3.4 Subdivision 1. Unlicensed practice prohibited. Effective July 1, 2019, no person shall 3.5 engage in the practice of music therapy unless the person is licensed as a music therapist 3.6 in accordance with this chapter. 3.7 Subd. 2. Protected titles and restrictions on use. (a) Use of the term "licensed music 3.8 therapist" or "music therapist" or similar titles or terms to indicate or imply that the person 3.9 is licensed by the state as a music therapist is prohibited unless that person is licensed under 3.10 3.11 this chapter. 4.7	Sec. 4. [148G.15] LICENSURE APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS;
4.8	QUALIFICATIONS.
4.9	Subdivision 1. Application. An applicant for licensure must apply in writing on a form
4.10	prescribed by the commissioner and submit the fee required in section 148G.45.
4.11	Subd. 2. Qualifications. An applicant for licensure must:
4.12	(1) be 18 years of age or older;
4.13	(2) successfully pass a background check that includes a review of the applicant's music
4.14	therapy licensure history in other jurisdictions, including a review of any alleged misconduct
4.15	or neglect in the practice of music therapy on the part of the applicant;
4.16	(3) provide proof of passing the examination for board certification offered by the
4.17	Certification Board for Music Therapists or any successor organization; and
4.18	(4) provide proof that the applicant is currently a board-certified music therapist.
4.19	Subd. 3. Action on application for licensure. (a) The commissioner shall approve,
4.20	approve with conditions, or deny licensure. The commissioner shall act on an application
4.21	according to paragraphs (b) to (d).
4.22	(b) The commissioner shall determine if the applicant meets the requirements for
4.23	licensure. The commissioner, or the advisory council at the commissioner's request, may
4.24	investigate information provided by the applicant to determine whether the information is
4.25	accurate and complete.
4.26	(c) The commissioner shall notify the applicant of action taken on the application and,
4.27	if licensure is denied or approved with conditions, the grounds for the commissioner's
4.28	determination.
4.29	(d) An applicant denied licensure or granted licensure with conditions may make a
4.30	written request to the commissioner, within 30 days of the date of the commissioner's
4.31	determination, for reconsideration of the commissioner's determination. Individuals
4.32	requesting reconsideration may submit information which the applicant wants considered

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5.1	in the reconsideration. After reconsideration of the commissioner's determination, the				
5.2	commissioner shall determine whether the original determination should be affirmed or				
5.3	modified. An applicant is allowed no more than one request in any two-year period for				
5.4	reconsideration of the commissioner's determination to deny licensure or approve licensure

5.6	Subd. 4. Reciprocity. The commissioner shall issue a license to an applicant for a music				
5.7	therapy license when an applicant has completed and submitted an application in a form				
5.8	and manner prescribed by the commissioner, accompanied by applicable fees, and evidence				
5.9	satisfactory to the commissioner that the applicant is licensed and in good standing as a				
5.10	music therapist in another jurisdiction where the qualifications required are equal to or				
5.11	greater than those required in this chapter at the date of application.				
5.12	Sec. 5. [148G.20] TRANSITION PERIOD; WAIVER OF EXAMINATION.				
5.13	(a) The commissioner shall waive the examination requirement in section 148G.15,				
5.14	subdivision 2, clause (3), for an applicant who is board-certified as a music therapist and is				
5.15	in good standing with the Certification Board for Music Therapists as of July 1, 2019.				
5.16	(b) Until January 1, 2022, the commissioner shall waive the examination requirement				
5.17	in section 148G.15, subdivision 2, clause (3), for an applicant who is designated as a				
5.18	registered music therapist, certified music therapist, or advanced certified music therapist				
5.19	and is in good standing with the National Music Therapy Registry.				
5.20	Sec. 6. [148G.25] RENEWAL OF LICENSE; INACTIVE STATUS.				
5.21	Subdivision 1. Renewal requirements. To be eligible for license renewal, a licensee				
5.22	<u>must:</u>				
5.23	(1) submit a completed and signed application for license renewal on a form provided				
5.24	by the commissioner;				
5.25	(2) submit the renewal fee required under section 148G.45;				
5.26	(3) provide proof of the licensee's status as a board-certified music therapist;				
5.27	(4) submit proof of completion of a minimum of 100 hours of continuing education in				
5.28	a program approved by the Certification Board of Music Therapists or its successor				
5.29	organization; and				
5.30	(5) submit additional information as requested by the commissioner to clarify information

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6.1	Subd. 2. Renewal deadline. (a) Licenses must be renewed every five years.
6.2	(b) Each license must state an expiration date.
6.3	(c) A completed application for license renewal must be received by the commissioner
6.4	or postmarked at least 14 days prior to the license expiration date.
6.5	(d) A completed application for license renewal not received within the time required
6.6	under paragraph (c), but received on or before the expiration date, must be accompanied
6.7	by a late fee in addition to the renewal fee in section 148G.45.
6.8	Subd. 3. Licensure renewal notice. At least 60 calendar days before the expiration date
6.9	in subdivision 2, the commissioner must mail a renewal notice to the licensee's last known
6.10	address on file with the commissioner. The notice must include an application for licensure
6.11	renewal and notice of fees required for renewal. The licensee's failure to receive the notice
6.12	does not relieve the licensee of the obligation to meet the renewal deadline and other
6.13	requirements for licensure renewal.
6.14	Subd. 4. Failure to renew. (a) A licensee who fails to renew a license shall forfeit the
6.15	license. Licenses that have been forfeited may be restored within one year of the expiration
6.16	date upon completion of the requirements in subdivision 1, and payment of the late fee in
6.17	section 148G.45.
6.18	(b) A person who requests restoration of a license more than one year after the license
6.19	expiration date shall be required to reapply for licensure as a new applicant and must comply
6.20	with the requirements for new licensees at the time of application.
6.21	Subd. 5. Inactive status. (a) A licensee with an active license who is in good standing
6.22	and has no disciplinary or other adverse action pending may make a written request to have
6.23	the license placed on inactive status. The licensee shall be required to pay the inactive status
6.24	fee in section 148G.45.
6.25	(b) A licensee whose license has been placed on inactive status for two years or less
6.26	may reactivate the license by submitting the information required in subdivision 1.
6.27	(c) A licensee whose license has been placed on inactive status for more than two years
6.28	must reapply for licensure as a new applicant and must comply with the requirements for
6.29	new licensees at the time of application.
6.30	Sec. 7. [148G.30] CHANGE OF NAME, ADDRESS, OR EMPLOYMENT.
6.31	A licensee who changes a name, address, or employment must inform the commissioner,
6.32	in writing, of the change in name, address, employment, business address, or business

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- 7.1 <u>telephone number within 30 days of the change. A change in name must be accompanied</u>
- 7.2 by a copy of a marriage certificate or court order. All notices or other correspondence mailed
- 7.3 to or served on the licensee by the commissioner at the licensee's address on file with the
- 7.4 <u>commissioner shall be considered as having been received by the licensee.</u>

7.5 Sec. 8. [148G.35] PRACTICE OF MUSIC THERAPY.

7.6 (a) The practice of music therapy includes the clinical and evidence-based use of

- 7.7 music-based interventions to accomplish individualized goals for persons of all ages and
- 7.8 ability levels within a therapeutic relationship by a licensed music therapist. A licensed
- 7.9 <u>music therapist shall develop music therapy treatment plans specific to the needs and</u>
- 7.10 strengths of the client who may be seen individually or in groups. Music therapy treatment
- 7.11 plans must be individualized for each client. The goals, objectives, and potential strategies

7.12 of the music therapy services must be appropriate for the client and setting. The practice of

- 7.13 music therapy does not include the diagnosis of any physical, mental, or communication
- 7.14 disorder.
- (b) A licensed music therapist may accept referrals for music therapy services from
 medical, developmental, mental health, or education professionals; family members; clients;
 caregivers; or others involved and authorized to provide services to the client. Before
 providing music therapy services to a client for an identified clinical or developmental need,
 the licensee shall collaborate, as applicable, with the client's primary care provider or
 providers to review the client's diagnosis, treatment needs, and treatment plan. During the
 provision of music therapy services to a client, the licensee shall collaborate, as applicable,
- 7.22 with the client's treatment team. The licensed music therapist may be a member of an
- 7.23 interdisciplinary team of health, education, and other professionals working collaboratively
- 7.24 to address the needs of the client.
- 7.25 (c) A licensed music therapist shall conduct a music therapy assessment of a client to
- 7.26 determine if treatment is indicated. If treatment is indicated, the licensee shall collect
- 7.27 systematic, comprehensive, and accurate information to determine the appropriateness and
- 7.28 type of music therapy services to provide for the client. A licensed music therapist shall
- 7.29 <u>utilize appropriate knowledge and skills when providing music therapy services, including</u>
- 7.30 the use of research, reasoning, and problem solving skills to determine appropriate actions
- 7.31 <u>in the context of each specific clinical setting</u>.
- (d) A licensed music therapist shall develop an individualized music therapy treatment
 plan for the client that is based upon the results of the music therapy assessment. The music
 therapy treatment plan shall include individualized goals and objectives that focus on the

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assessed needs and strengths of the client and shall specify music therapy approaches and 8.1 interventions to be used to address these goals and objectives. The individualized music 8.2 8.3 therapy treatment plan must be consistent with any other developmental, rehabilitative, habilitative, medical, mental health, preventive, wellness care, or educational services being 8.4 provided to the client. 8.5 (e) A licensed music therapist shall evaluate on an ongoing basis the client's response 8.6 to music therapy and to the music therapy treatment plan, document the client's progress, 8.7 and make modifications to the plan, as appropriate. A licensed music therapist shall determine 8.8 when the provision of music therapy services is no longer needed in collaboration with the 8.9 client, the client's health care provider, family members of the client, and other appropriate 8.10 individuals upon whom the client relies for support. 8.11 (f) A licensed music therapist shall collaborate with and educate the client and the client's 8.12 family, caregiver, and any other appropriate individual regarding the needs of the client that 8.13 are being addressed in music therapy and the manner in which the music therapy treatment 8.14 addresses those needs. A licensed music therapist shall minimize any barriers to ensure that 8.15 the client receives music therapy services in the least restrictive environment. 8.16 Sec. 9. [148G.40] DISCIPLINARY ACTION. 8.17 Subdivision 1. Grounds for denial of license or discipline. 9.20	(b) The procedures may include procedures for sharing complaint information with
