(c) "Homeless" or "homelessness" means lacking a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime 1.11 residence. 1.12 (d) "Resident" means a person residing in a shelter, including all members of a family 1.13 unit. 1.14 (e) "Shelter" means an indoor sleeping and sanitary dwelling, whether in a fixed or 1.15 rotating location, intended for individuals and families experiencing homelessness, provided 1.16 by a unit of government, a nonprofit organization, or a place of worship. Shelter includes 1.17 rooms in hotels or motels paid for by a unit of government or nonprofit organization and 1.18 daytime accommodations for individuals or families for whom shelter is provided only 1.19 overnight. 1.20

6.10	(d) The task force shall develop recommendations for the establishment of a statewide	
6.11	shelter call line to ensure that all residents are receiving adequate service in a shelter. The	
6.12	task force shall evaluate the appropriate state agency, nonprofit organization, or other entity	
6.13	to house and operate the call line and the funding necessary to establish and maintain the	
6.14	ongoing operation of the call line.	
6.15	(e) The task force may examine any other related issues consistent with this section.	
6.16	Subd. 6. Administrative support. The Minnesota Housing Finance Agency must provide	
6.17	administrative support and meeting space for the task force.	
6.18	Subd. 7. Report. (a) No later than February 1, 2022, the task force shall submit an initial	
6.19	report to the chairs and ranking minority members of the house of representatives and senate	
6.20	committees and divisions with jurisdiction over housing and preventing homelessness on	
6.21	the findings and recommendations for:	
6.22	(1) legislation establishing:	
6.23	(i) a bill of rights for, and uniform standards of treatment of, individuals and families
