1.12	policies and practices that are alternatives to removing a pupil from class or dismissing a
1.13	pupil from school, including positive behavioral interventions and supports and alternative
1.14	education services, that require school officials to intervene in, redirect, and support a pupil's
1.15	behavior before removing a pupil from class or beginning dismissal proceedings.

Subd. 2. Grounds for removal from class. The policy must establish the various grounds 8.1 for which a student pupil may be removed from a class in the district for a period of time 8.2 under the procedures specified in the policy. The policy must include a procedure for 8.3 notifying and meeting with a student's pupil's parent or guardian to discuss the problem that 8.4 is causing the student pupil to be removed from class after the student pupil has been removed 8.5 from class more than ten five times in one school year. The grounds in the policy must 8.6 include at least the following provisions as well as other grounds determined appropriate 8.7 8.8 by the board: (a) (1) willful conduct that significantly disrupts the rights of others to an education, 8.9 including conduct that interferes with a teacher's ability to teach or communicate effectively 8.10 with students pupils in a class or with the ability of other students pupils to learn; 8.11 (b) (2) willful conduct that endangers surrounding persons, including school district 8.12 employees, the student pupil, or other students pupils, or the property of the school; and 8.13 (c) (3) willful violation of any rule of conduct specified in the discipline policy adopted 8.14 by the board. 8.15 Subd. 3. Policy components. The policy must include at least the following components: 8.16 (a) rules governing student pupil conduct and procedures for informing students pupils 8.17 of the rules; 8.18 (b) the grounds for removal of a student pupil from a class; 8.19 (c) the authority of the classroom teacher to remove students pupils from the classroom 8.20 pursuant to procedures and rules established in the district's policy; 8.21 (d) the procedures for removal of a student pupil from a class by a teacher, school 8.22 administrator, or other school district employee; 8.23 (e) the period of time for which a student pupil may be removed from a class, which 8.24 may not exceed five class periods for a violation of a rule of conduct; 8.25 (f) provisions relating to the responsibility for and custody of a student pupil removed 8.26 from a class; 8.27 (g) the procedures for return of a student pupil to the specified class from which the 8.28 student pupil has been removed; 8.29 (h) the procedures for notifying a student pupil and the student's pupil's parents or 8.30 guardian of violations of the rules of conduct and of resulting disciplinary actions; 8.31
