Minnesota Statutes 2018, section 13.6905, is amended by adding a subdivision to read: 1.11 1.12 Subd. 36. Direct wine shipments. Data obtained and shared by the commissioner of public safety relating to direct shipments of wine are governed by sections 340A.550 and 1.13 1.14 340A.555. **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective the day following final enactment. 1.15 Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2018, section 295.75, subdivision 4, is amended to read: 1.16 Subd. 4. Tax collection required. A liquor retailer with nexus in Minnesota or a direct 1.17 ship winery as defined in section 340A.550, who is not subject to tax under subdivision 2, 1.18 is required to collect the tax imposed under subdivision 3 from the purchaser of the liquor 1.19 and give the purchaser a receipt for the tax paid. - (c) It is not the intent of this section to impair the distribution of wine through distributors or importing distributors, but only to permit shipments of wine for personal use.
- (d) Except for a violation of section 295.75 or chapters 297A and 297G, no criminal penalty may be imposed on a person for a violation of this section or section 340A.550 or 340A.560 other than a violation described in paragraph (e) or (f). Whenever it appears to the commissioner that any person has engaged in any act or practice constituting a violation of this section, or section 340A.550 or 340A.560 and the violation is not within two years of any previous violation of this section, the commissioner shall issue and cause to be served upon the person an order requiring the person to cease and desist from violating this section. The order must give reasonable notice of the rights of the person to request a hearing and must state the reason for the entry of the order. Unless otherwise agreed between the parties, a hearing shall be held not later than seven 20 days after the request for the hearing is received by the commissioner after which and within 20 days after the receipt of the administrative law judge's report and subsequent exceptions and argument, the commissioner shall issue an order vacating the cease and desist order, modifying it, or making it permanent as the facts require. If no hearing is requested within 30 days of the service of the order, the order becomes final and remains in effect until modified or vacated by the commissioner. All hearings shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions of chapter 14. If the person to whom a cease and desist order is issued fails to appear at the hearing after being duly notified, the person shall be deemed in default, and the proceeding may be determined against the person upon consideration of the cease and desist order, the allegations of which may be deemed to be true.
- (e) Any person who violates this section or section 340A.550 or 340A.560 within two years of a violation for which a cease and desist order was issued under paragraph (d), is guilty of a misdemeanor.

[340A.550] DIRECT SHIPMENTS OF WINE; LICENSING, TAXATION, 5.1 AND RESTRICTIONS. 5.2 Subdivision 1. **Definitions.** (a) "Direct ship purchaser" means a person who purchases 5.3 wine for personal use and not for resale from a winery located in a state other than Minnesota 5.4 5.5 for delivery to a Minnesota address. (b) "Direct ship winery" means a winery licensed in a state other than Minnesota that 5.6 manufactures and makes a retail sale of wine and ships the wine to a direct ship purchaser 5.7 as authorized under section 340A.417. 5.8 Subd. 2. License requirements. (a) A direct ship winery must apply to the commissioner 5.9 for a direct ship license. The commissioner must not issue a license under this section unless 5.10 the applicant: 5.11 5.12 (1) is a licensed winery in a state other than Minnesota and provides a copy of its current license in any state in which it is licensed to manufacture wine; 5.13 (2) provides a shipping address list, including all addresses from which it intends to ship 5.14 5.15 wine; (3) agrees to comply with the requirements of subdivision 4; and 5.16 (4) consents to the jurisdiction of the Departments of Public Safety and Revenue, the 5.17 courts of this state, and any statute, law, or rule in this state related to the administration or 5.18 enforcement of this section, including any provision authorizing the commissioners of public 5.19 safety and revenue to audit a direct ship winery for compliance with this and any related 5.20 section. 5.21 (b) A direct ship winery obtaining a license under this section must annually renew its 5.22 license by January 1 of each year and must inform the commissioner at the time of renewal 5.23 of any changes to the information previously provided in paragraph (a). 5.24 (c) The application fee for a license is \$50. The fee for a license renewal is \$50. The 5.25 commissioner must deposit all fees received under this subdivision in the alcohol enforcement 5.26 account in the special revenue fund established under section 299A.706. 5.27 Subd. 3. SHIPMENTS OF WINE.

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Subdivision 1. Monthly report required. Each common carrier that contracts with a winery under section 340A.417 for delivery of wine into this state must file with the commissioner a monthly report of known wine shipments made by the carrier. The report must be made in a form and manner as prescribed by the commissioner and must contain:

- (1) the name of the common carrier making the report;
- (2) the period of time covered by the report; 6.28
- (3) the name and business address of the party requesting shipment; 6.29
- (4) the name and address of each recipient; 6.30

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(5) the weight of the package delivered to each recipient; 7.1 (6) a unique tracking number; and 7.2 (7) the date of delivery. 7.3 Subd. 2. Record availability and retention. Upon written request by the commissioner, 7.4 any records supporting the report in subdivision 1 must be made available to the 7.5 commissioner within 30 days of the request. Any records containing information relating 7.6 to a required report must be retained and preserved for a period of two years, unless 7.7 destruction of the records prior to the end of the two-year period is authorized in writing 7.8 by the commissioner. All retained records must be open and available for inspection by the 7.9 commissioner upon written request. The commissioner must make the required reports 7.10 available to any law enforcement agency or regulatory body of any local government in 7.11 7.12 this state in which the common carrier making the report resides or does business. Subd. 3. **Penalty.** If a common carrier willfully violates the requirement to report a 7.13 delivery as required under this section or violates any rule related to the administration and 7.14 enforcement of this section, the commissioner must notify the common carrier in writing 7.15 of the violation. The commissioner may impose a fine in an amount not to exceed \$500 for 7.16 each subsequent violation. 7.17 Subd. 4. Exemptions. This section does not apply to common carriers regulated as 7.18 provided by United States Code, title 49, section 10101, et. seq., or to rail 7.19 trailer-on-flatcar/container-on-flatcar (TOFC/COFC) service, as provided by Code of Federal 7.20 Regulations, title 49, section 1090.1, or highway TOFC/COFC service provided by a rail 7.21 carrier, either itself or jointly with a motor carrier, as part of continuous intermodal freight 7.22 transportation, including, without limitation, any other TOFC/COFC transportation as 7.23 defined under federal law. 7.24 Subd. 5.
