1.5	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:
1.6	Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 124D.2211, is amended to read:
1.7	124D.2211 AFTER-SCHOOL COMMUNITY LEARNING PROGRAMS.
1.8	Subdivision 1. Establishment. A competitive statewide after-school community learning
1.9	grant program is established to provide grants to community or nonprofit organizations,
1.10	political subdivisions, for-profit or nonprofit child care centers, or school-based programs
1.11	that serve youth after school or during nonschool hours organizations that offer academic
1.12	and enrichment activities for elementary and secondary school students during nonschool
1.13	hours. Grants must be used to offer a broad array of enrichment activities that promote
1.14	positive after-school activities, including art, music, community engagement, literacy,
1.15	science, technology, engineering, math, health, and recreation programs. The commissioner
1.16	shall must develop criteria for after-school community learning programs. The commissioner
1.17	may award grants under this section to community or nonprofit organizations, Minnesota
1.18	Tribal governments, political subdivisions, public libraries, for-profit or nonprofit child care
1.19	centers, or school-based programs that serve youth after school or during nonschool hours.

1.21	after-school community learning programs are to increase:
1.22	(1) school connectedness of participants;
