A resolution

1.2	calling on Congress to appoint a special prosecutor to investigate Russian interference
1.3	in the 2016 United States presidential election and the extent to which members of the
1.4	current executive branch were aware of such interference.
1.5	WHEREAS, United States law enforcement and intelligence agencies, including the Federal
1.6	Bureau of Investigation (FBI), the Central Intelligence Agency, and the National Security Agency,
1.7	have concluded with high confidence that Russia interfered in the American presidential election
1.8	that was held in November 2016; and
1.9	WHEREAS, evidence collected by United States intelligence agencies suggests that this
1.10	interference was ordered by the highest levels of the Russian government, with the direct knowledge
1.11	and approval of Russian President Vladimir Putin; and
1.12	WHEREAS, United States law enforcement and intelligence agencies have determined that
1.13	this interference was intended to aid Donald Trump and harm his opponent, Hillary Clinton; and
1.14	WHEREAS, according to United States intelligence agencies and Russian diplomats, multiple
1.15	high-ranking members of the Donald Trump presidential campaign had regular contact with senior
1.16	Russian intelligence officials throughout the presidential campaign; and
1.17	WHEREAS, multiple Trump campaign and administration officials, including National
1.18	Security Adviser Michael Flynn, Campaign Manager Paul Manafort, and Foreign Policy Adviser
1.19	Carter Page, resigned their posts after scandals related to their connections with Russia; and
1.20	WHEREAS, in light of evidence discovered during the transition period, President Obama's
1.21	administration felt it necessary to take unprecedented measures to disseminate and protect sensitive
1.22	information pertaining to Russian interference in the American election to ensure it was not destroyed
1.23	or concealed by the incoming Trump administration; and

WHEREAS, then Senator and Attorney General nominee, Jeff Sessions, stated under oath

and a compelling interest in the legitimacy of the results of those elections; NOW, THEREFORE,

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BE IT RESOLVED by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota that it urges the appointment of a special prosecutor in order to conduct a full, independent, and public investigation of any and all connections between the Trump administration, the Trump campaign organization, and the Trump business empire and the Russian government, as well as Russian government-owned enterprises and related interests.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, given the extremely sensitive nature of this investigation and its implication for the integrity of American democracy, a bipartisan commission, led by a special prosecutor, is needed to investigate the full extent of Russia's influence on the Trump White House and Russian interference in the 2016 United States presidential election, as well as the extent to which members of the Trump White House and the Trump campaign organization were aware of Russian interference and influence.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of State of the State of Minnesota is directed to prepare copies of this memorial and transmit them to the President and the Secretary of the United States Senate, the Speaker and the Clerk of the United States House of Representatives, the chair of the Senate Committee on Judiciary, the chair of the House Committee on Judiciary, and Minnesota's Senators and Representatives in Congress.
