1.8	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:
1.9	Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2018, section 245.4889, subdivision 1, is amended to read:
1.10	Subdivision 1. Establishment and authority. (a) The commissioner is authorized to
1.11	make grants from available appropriations to assist:
1.12	(1) counties;
1.13	(2) Indian tribes;
1.14	(3) children's collaboratives under section 124D.23 or 245.493; or
1.15	(4) mental health service providers.
1.16	(b) The following services are eligible for grants under this section:
1.17	(1) services to children with emotional disturbances as defined in section 245.4871,
1.18	subdivision 15, and their families;
1.19	(2) transition services under section 245.4875, subdivision 8, for young adults under
1.20	age 21 and their families;
1.21 1.22	(3) respite care services for children with severe emotional disturbances who are at risk of out-of-home placement;
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2.1	(4) children's mental health crisis services;
2.2	(5) mental health services for people from cultural and ethnic minorities;
2.3	(6) children's mental health screening and follow-up diagnostic assessment and treatment;
2.4	(7) services to promote and develop the capacity of providers to use evidence-based
2.5	practices in providing children's mental health services;
2.6	(8) school-linked mental health services, including transportation for children receiving
2.7	school-linked mental health services when school is not in session;
2.8	(9) building evidence-based mental health intervention capacity for children birth to age
2.9	five;
2.10	(10) suicide prevention and counseling services that use text messaging statewide;
2.11	(11) mental health first aid training;
2.12	(12) training for parents, collaborative partners, and mental health providers on the
2.13	impact of adverse childhood experiences and trauma and development of an interactive
2.14	website to share information and strategies to promote resilience and prevent trauma;
2.15	(13) transition age services to develop or expand mental health treatment and supports
2.16	for adolescents and young adults 26 years of age or younger;
2.17	(14) early childhood mental health consultation;
2.18	(15) evidence-based interventions for youth at risk of developing or experiencing a first
2.19	episode of psychosis, and a public awareness campaign on the signs and symptoms of
2.20	psychosis;
2.21	(16) psychiatric consultation for primary care practitioners; and
2.22	(17) providers to begin operations and meet program requirements when establishing a
2.23	new children's mental health program. These may be start-up grants.
2.24	(c) Services under paragraph (b) must be designed to help each child to function and
2.25	remain with the child's family in the community and delivered consistent with the child's
2.26	treatment plan. Transition services to eligible young adults under this paragraph must be
2.27	designed to foster independent living in the community.
2.28	(d) As a condition of receiving grant funds, a grantee must obtain all available third-party
2.29	reimbursement sources, if applicable.
2.30	EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective July 1, 2019.

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5.1	(d) The commissioner must establish a competitive grant process to award not less than
5.2	\$220,000 each year to Professional Educator Licensing and Standards Board-approved
5.3	teacher preparation programs, including alternative teacher preparation programs. The
5.4	competitive process must award grants based on program benchmarks, including licensure
5.5	rates, participation rates, and on-time graduation rates.
5.6	(e) By January 15 of each year, each institution shall prepare for the legislature a detailed
5.7	report regarding the funds used to recruit, retain, and induct teacher candidates who are of
5.8	color or who are American Indian. The report must include the total number of teacher
5.9	candidates of color, disaggregated by race or ethnic group, who are recruited to the institution,
5.10	are newly admitted to the licensure program, are enrolled in the licensure program, have
5.11	completed student teaching, have graduated, and are licensed and newly employed as
5.12	Minnesota teachers in their licensure field. The total number of teacher candidates who are
5.13	of color or who are American Indian at each stage from recruitment to licensed teaching
5.14	must be reported as a percentage of total candidates seeking the same licensure at the
5.15	institution. The report must include the graduation rate for each cohort of teacher candidates,
5.16	the placement rate for each graduating cohort of teacher candidates, and the retention rate
5.17	for each graduating cohort of teacher candidates, among other program outcomes.
5.18	(f) Any balance in the first year does not cancel but is available in the second year.
5.19	Subd. 7. Grow Your Own pathways to teacher licensure. (a) For grants to school
5.20	districts for Grow Your Own new teacher programs:

5.23	(b) Each year, at least \$3,000,000 of the grants are for school districts with more than
5.24	30 percent students of color for established and effective Professional Educator Licensing
5.25	and Standards Board-approved nonconventional teacher residency programs. The programs
5.26	must provide tuition scholarships or stipends to enable school district employees or
5.27	community members affiliated with a school district who seek an education license to
5.28	participate in a nonconventional teacher preparation program. School districts that receive
5.29	funds under this subdivision must have a program to recruit and retain candidates of color
5.30	and American Indian candidates to participate in the Grow Your Own new teacher programs.
5.31	Districts or schools providing financial support may require a commitment as determined
5.32	by the district to teach in the district or school for a reasonable amount of time that does
5.33	not exceed five years.

6.1	(c) Each year, at least \$3,000,000 is for grants for schools or districts where more than
6.2	25 percent of students are students of color or are American Indian. The grants are to provide
6.3	financial assistance, mentoring, and experiences to enable persons who are of color or who
6.4	are American Indian and who are working or living in the local community to become
6.5	teachers. Districts or schools providing financial support may require a commitment as
6.6	determined by the district to teach in the district or school for a reasonable period of time
6.7	that does not exceed five years. Grants under this paragraph may be used for:
6.8	(1) tuition scholarships or stipends to eligible teaching assistants, cultural liaisons, or
6.9	other nonlicensed employees who are of color or who are American Indian enrolled in any
6.10	teacher preparation program approved by the Professional Educator Licensing and Standards
6.11	Board; and
6.12	(2) supporting the development of innovative residency programs and any school, district,
6.13	or cooperative, as defined under Minnesota Statutes, section 123A.24, subdivision 2, for
6.14	persons who are of color or are American Indian seeking an education license through a
6.15	school-based, board-approved program.
6.16	(d) Each year, at least \$500,000 is for grants to school districts and charter schools to
6.17	develop innovative expanded Grow Your Own programs that encourage secondary school
6.18	students to pursue teaching, including developing and offering dual-credit postsecondary
6.19	course options in schools for "Introduction to Teaching" or "Introduction to Education"
6.20	courses consistent with Minnesota Statutes, section 124D.09, subdivision 10, and supporting
6.21	future teacher clubs involving middle and high school students who are of color or who are
6.22	American Indian to have experiential learning, support the success of younger students, and
6.23	pursue a teaching career.
6.24	(e) A school district must apply for a grant in the form and manner specified by the
6.25	commissioner. The commissioner must review all grant applications by September 15 and
6.26	notify grant recipients of the amount of the grant by September 30 of each year.
6.27	(f) Programs must annually report to the commissioner by the date determined by the
6.28	commissioner on their activities under this section, including the number of participants,
6.29	the percentage of participants who are of color or who are American Indian, and an
6.30	assessment of program effectiveness, including participant feedback, areas for improvement,
6.31	the percentage of participants continuing to pursue teacher licensure, and the number of
6.32	participants hired in the school or district as teachers after completing preparation programs.
6.33	(g) The department may retain up to three percent of the appropriation amount to monitor
6.34	and administer the grant program.
