1.6	Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2015 Supplement, section 518B.01, subdivision 4, is
1.7	amended to read:
1.8	Subd. 4. Order for protection. There shall exist an action known as a petition for
1.9	an order for protection in cases of domestic abuse.
1.10	(a) A petition for relief under this section may be made by any family or household
1.11	member personally or by a family or household member, a guardian as defined in section
1.12	524.1-201, clause (26), or, if the court finds that it is in the best interests of the minor, by a
1.13	reputable an adult age 25 or older on behalf of minor family or household members. A
1.14	minor age 16 or older may make a petition on the minor's own behalf against a spouse
1.15	or former spouse, or a person with whom the minor has a child in common, if the court
1.16	determines that the minor has sufficient maturity and judgment and that it is in the best
1.17	interests of the minor.
1.18	(b) A petition for relief shall allege the existence of domestic abuse, and shall be
1.19	accompanied by an affidavit made under oath stating the specific facts and circumstances
1.20	from which relief is sought.
1.21	(c) A petition for relief must state whether the petitioner has ever had an order for
1.22	protection in effect against the respondent.
1.23	(d) A petition for relief must state whether there is an existing order for protection
1.24	in effect under this chapter governing both the parties and whether there is a pending

lawsuit, complaint, petition or other action between the parties under chapter 257, 518, 2.1 518A, 518B, or 518C. The court administrator shall verify the terms of any existing order 2.2 governing the parties. The court may not delay granting relief because of the existence 2.3 of a pending action between the parties or the necessity of verifying the terms of an 2.4 existing order. A subsequent order in a separate action under this chapter may modify 2.5 only the provision of an existing order that grants relief authorized under subdivision 6, 2.6 paragraph (a), clause (1). A petition for relief may be granted, regardless of whether there 2.7 is a pending action between the parties. 28

2.11 (f) The court shall advise a petitioner under paragraph (e) of the right to file a motion

(g) The court shall advise a petitioner under paragraph (e) of the right to serve the
respondent by published notice under subdivision 5, paragraph (b), if the respondent is
avoiding personal service by concealment or otherwise, and shall assist with the writing
and filing of the affidavit.

609.748 HARASSMENT; RESTRAINING ORDER.

2.28 Subdivision 1. Definition. For the purposes of this section, the following terms have2.29 the meanings given them in this subdivision.

2.30 (a) "Harassment" includes:

(1) a single incident of physical or sexual assault or repeated incidents of intrusive or
unwanted acts, words, or gestures that have a substantial adverse effect or are intended to
have a substantial adverse effect on the safety, security, or privacy of another, regardless
of the relationship between the actor and the intended target;
(2) targeted residential picketing; and

3.1	(3) a pattern of attending public events after being notified that the actor's presence
3.2	at the event is harassing to another.
3.3	(b) "Respondent" includes any adults or juveniles alleged to have engaged in
3.4	harassment or organizations alleged to have sponsored or promoted harassment.
3.5	(c) "Targeted residential picketing" includes the following acts when committed on
3.6	more than one occasion:
3.7	(1) marching, standing, or patrolling by one or more persons directed solely at a
3.8	particular residential building in a manner that adversely affects the safety, security, or
3.9	privacy of an occupant of the building; or
3.10	(2) marching, standing, or patrolling by one or more persons which prevents an
3.11	occupant of a residential building from gaining access to or exiting from the property on
3.12	which the residential building is located.
3.13	(d) "Guardian" has the meaning given in section 524.1-201, clause (26).
3.14	Subd. 2. Restraining order; court jurisdiction. (a) A person who is a victim of
3.15	harassment may seek a restraining order from petition the district court for a restraining
3.16	order in the manner provided in this section. In addition:
3.17	(1) the parent, guardian, or stepparent of a minor who is a victim of harassment may
3.18	seek a restraining order from the district court on behalf of the minor-; or
3.19	(2) an adult age 25 or older may petition on behalf of the minor, if the court finds it
3.20	is in the best interests of the minor.
3.21	(b) An application for relief under this section may be filed in the county of residence
3.22	of either party or in the county in which the alleged harassment occurred. There are no
3.23	residency requirements that apply to a petition for a harassment restraining order.
3.24	Subd. 3. Contents of petition; hearing; notice. (a) A petition for relief must
3.25	allege facts sufficient to show the following:
3.26	(1) the name of the alleged harassment victim;
3.27	(2) the name of the respondent; and
3.28	(3) that the respondent has engaged in harassment.
3.29	A petition for relief must state whether the petitioner has had a previous restraining order
3.30	in effect against the respondent. The petition shall be accompanied by an affidavit made
3.31	under oath stating the specific facts and circumstances from which relief is sought. The
3.32	court shall provide simplified forms and clerical assistance to help with the writing and
3.33	filing of a petition under this section and shall advise the petitioner of the right to sue in
3.34	forma pauperis under section 563.01. The court shall advise the petitioner of the right to
3.35	request a hearing. If the petitioner does not request a hearing, the court shall advise the
3.36	petitioner that the respondent may request a hearing and that notice of the hearing date

and time will be provided to the petitioner by mail at least five days before the hearing.
Upon receipt of the petition and a request for a hearing by the petitioner, the court shall
order a hearing. Personal service must be made upon the respondent not less than five
days before the hearing. If personal service cannot be completed in time to give the
respondent the minimum notice required under this paragraph, the court may set a new
hearing date. Nothing in this section shall be construed as requiring a hearing on a
matter that has no merit.

(b) Notwithstanding paragraph (a), the order for a hearing and a temporary order
issued under subdivision 4 may be served on the respondent by means of a one-week
published notice under section 645.11, if:

4.11 (1) the petitioner files an affidavit with the court stating that an attempt at personal
4.12 service made by a sheriff was unsuccessful because the respondent is avoiding service by
4.13 concealment or otherwise; and

4.14 (2) a copy of the petition and order for hearing and any temporary restraining order
4.15 has been mailed to the respondent at the respondent's residence or place of business, if
4.16 the respondent is an organization, or the respondent's last known residence or place of
4.17 business is not known to the petitioner.

4.18 (c) Regardless of the method of service, if the respondent is a juvenile, whenever
4.19 possible, the court also shall have notice of the pendency of the case and of the time and
4.20 place of the hearing served by mail at the last known address upon any parent or guardian
4.21 of the juvenile respondent who is not the petitioner.

4.22 (d) A request for a hearing under this subdivision must be made within 20 days4.23 of service of the petition.

Subd. 3a. Filing fee; cost of service. The filing fees for a restraining order under 4.24 this section are waived for the petitioner and the respondent if the petition alleges acts 4.25 that would constitute a violation of section 609.749, subdivision 2, 3, 4, or 5, or sections 4.26 609.342 to 609.3451. The court administrator and the sheriff of any county in this state 4.27 shall perform their duties relating to service of process without charge to the petitioner. 4.28 The court shall direct payment of the reasonable costs of service of process if served by a 4.29 private process server when the sheriff is unavailable or if service is made by publication. 4.30 The court may direct a respondent to pay to the court administrator the petitioner's filing 4.31 fees and reasonable costs of service of process if the court determines that the respondent 4.32 has the ability to pay the petitioner's fees and costs. 4.33 Subd. 3b. Information on petitioner's location or residence. Upon petitioner's 4.34

4.35 request, information maintained by the court regarding the petitioner's location or

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- 5.1 residence shall be sealed and may be disclosed only to court personnel or law enforcement
 5.2 for purposes of service of process, conducting an investigation, or enforcing an order.
- 5.3 Subd. 4. Temporary restraining order; relief by court. (a) The court may issue a
 5.4 temporary restraining order that provides any or all of the following:
- 5.5 (1) orders the respondent to cease or avoid the harassment of another person the
 5.6 petitioner; or
- 5.7 (2) orders the respondent to have no contact with another person the petitioner,
 5.8 whether in person, by telephone, social media, or electronic mail or message, through
 5.9 electronic devices; through a third party; or by any other means.
- (b) The court may issue an order under paragraph (a) if the petitioner files a petition
 in compliance with subdivision 3 and if the court finds reasonable grounds to believe that
 the respondent has engaged in harassment. When a petition alleges harassment as defined
 by subdivision 1, paragraph (a), clause (1), the petition must further allege an immediate
 and present danger of harassment before the court may issue a temporary restraining order
 under this section. When signed by a referee, the temporary order becomes effective
 upon the referee's signature.
- 5.17 (c) Notice need not be given to the respondent before the court issues a temporary
 5.18 restraining order under this subdivision. A copy of the restraining order must be served on
 5.19 the respondent along with the order for hearing and petition, as provided in subdivision 3.
- (d) If the respondent is a juvenile, whenever possible, a copy of the restraining order,
 along with notice of the pendency of the case and the time and place of the hearing,
 shall also be served by mail at the last known address upon any parent or guardian of the
 juvenile respondent who is not the petitioner. A temporary restraining order may be
 entered only against the respondent named in the petition.
- 5.25 (d) (e) The temporary restraining order is in effect until a hearing is held on the 5.26 issuance of a restraining order under subdivision 5. The court shall hold the hearing on 5.27 the issuance of a restraining order if the petitioner requests a hearing. 6.12	petitioner; or
6.13	(2) orders the respondent to have no contact with another person the petitioner,
6.14	whether in person; by telephone, social media, or electronic mail or message; through
6.15	electronic devices; through a third party; or by any other means.
6.16	(b) The court may issue an order under paragraph (a) if all of the following occur:
6.17	(1) the petitioner has filed a petition under subdivision 3;
6.18	(2) the sheriff has served respondent with a copy of the temporary restraining order
6.19	obtained under subdivision 4, and with notice of the right to request a hearing, or service

6.31	(e) When a referee presides at the hearing on the petition, the restraining order

8.7	(d) An order issued under this paragraph may restrain the harassing party from
8.8	committing acts of harassment and prohibit the harassing party from having any contact
8.9	from the petitioner, whether in person; by telephone, mail, social media, or electronic mail
8.10	or message; through electronic devices; through a third party; or by any other means.
8.11	Subd. 5c. Modifying order. (a) Upon application, notice to all parties, and hearing,
8.12	the court may modify the terms of an existing harassment restraining order.
8.13	(b) If the court orders relief for a period of up to 50 years under subdivision 5a,
8.14	the respondent named in the restraining order may request to have the restraining order
8.15	vacated or modified if the order has been in effect for at least five years and the respondent
8.16	has not violated the order. Application for relief under this paragraph must be made in the
8.17	county in which the restraining order was issued. Upon receipt of the request, the court
8.18	shall set a hearing date. Personal service must be made upon the petitioner named in the
8.19	restraining order not less than 30 days before the date of the hearing. At the hearing, the
8.20	respondent named in the restraining order has the burden of proving by a preponderance
8.21	of the evidence that there has been a material change in circumstances and that the reasons
8.22	upon which the court relied in granting the restraining order no longer apply and are
8.23	unlikely to occur. If the court finds that the respondent named in the restraining order has
8.24	met the burden of proof, the court may vacate or modify the order. If the court finds that the

Except in cases of imminent danger to the health 11.27 or safety of the employee or the employee's child, or unless impracticable, an employee 11.28 who is absent from the workplace shall give 48 hours' advance notice to the employer. 11.29 Upon request of the employer, the employee shall provide verification that supports the 11.30 employee's reason for being absent from the workplace. All information related to the 11.31 employee's leave pursuant to this section shall be kept confidential by the employer. 11.32

(b) An employer who violates paragraph (a) is guilty of a misdemeanor and may
be punished for contempt of court. In addition, the court shall order the employer to pay
back wages and offer job reinstatement to any employee discharged from employment in
violation of paragraph (a).

(c) In addition to any remedies otherwise provided by law, an employee injured by
a violation of paragraph (a) may bring a civil action for recovery of damages, together
with costs and disbursements, including reasonable attorneys fees, and may receive such
injunctive and other equitable relief, including reinstatement, as determined by the court.
