This appropriation is 40.27 available until June 30, 2023 2024. No less 40.28 than five percent of the amount of each grant 40.29 must be held back from reimbursement until 40.30 the grant recipient has completed a grant 40.31 accomplishment report by the deadline and in 40.32 the form prescribed by and satisfactory to the 40.33 Lessard-Sams Outdoor Heritage Council. The 40.34 commissioner must provide notice of the grant 40.35 program in the summary of game and fish law 40.36
