1.6	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:
1.7	Section 1. [136A.1285] ASPIRING PEACE OFFICER GRANTS.
1.8	Subdivision 1. Program established. The office shall establish a grant program for
1.9	eligible students preparing to become licensed peace officers in Minnesota. Grants under
1.10	this section are available from the 2023-2024 academic year through the 2026-2027 academic
1.11	year.
1.12	Subd. 2. Eligible students. (a) A student is eligible for a grant under this section if the
1.13	student:
1.14	(1) is a resident student;
1.15	(2) is a citizen of the United States;
1.16	(3) attends an eligible institution;
1.17	(4) is in good academic standing and making satisfactory academic progress;
1.18	(5) passes a criminal history screening to determine the student has not been convicted
1.19	of a crime that is a bar to licensure as a peace officer; and
1.20	(6) meets either of the two following criteria:

2.1	(i) for a student who has not already earned a bachelor's degree or associate's degree
2.2	from a regionally accredited postsecondary institution, be enrolled full time in a
2.2	degree-granting professional peace officer education program certified by the Board of
2.3	Peace Officer Standards and Training; or
2.5	(ii) for a student who has already earned a bachelor's degree or associate's degree from
2.6	a regionally accredited postsecondary institution, be enrolled full time in a certificate-granting
2.7	professional peace officer education program for degree holders certified by the Board of
2.8	Peace Officer Standards and Training.
2.9	(b) To receive a grant under this section, a student must:
2.10	(1) apply in the form and manner specified by the commissioner; and
2.11	(2) sign a contract agreeing to fulfill the employment obligation under subdivision 4.
2.12	Subd. 3. Grant amounts. (a) The amount of a grant awarded under this section must
2.13	be equal to the recipient's recognized cost of attendance after deducting:
2.14	(1) the amount of the federal Pell grant award for which the recipient is eligible;
2.15	(2) the amount of the state grant award for which the recipient is eligible;
2.16	(3) the amount of any other state or federal financial aid received; and
2.17	(4) the sum of all institutional grants, scholarships, tuition waivers, and tuition remission
2.18	amounts.
2.19	(b) For purposes of this section, "recognized cost of attendance for a public institution"
2.20	has the meaning given in Code of Federal Regulations, title 20, chapter 28, subchapter IV,
2.21	part F, section 1087ll. The recognized cost of attendance for a private institution equals the
2.22	lesser of:
2.23	(1) the cost of attendance for the institution as calculated under Code of Federal
2.24	Regulations, title 20, chapter 28, subchapter IV, part F, section 108711; or
2.25	(2) for two-year programs, an amount equal to the highest recognized cost of attendance
2.26	charged at a public two-year institution, or for four-year programs, an amount equal to the
2.27	highest recognized cost of attendance at a public university.
2.28	(c) The grant shall be paid directly to the institution where the recipient is enrolled.
2.29	Subd. 4. Employment obligation. (a) Beginning within six months of the completion
2.30	of the academic program for which the grant was awarded, a grant recipient must:
2.31	(1) pass the Minnesota peace officer licensure exam; and
