FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials from the **Missouri Ethics Commission (MEC)** assume the proposed legislation does not have fiscal impact on the Missouri Ethics Commission. It is assumed this prohibition would result in a minimal number of complaints; however, if this assumption is incorrect the Commission may require additional staff resources.

According to the MEC, in 2019 calendar year, the Missouri Ethics Commission issued 19 final actions relating to paid for by complaints and 2 final actions relating to the use of public funds.

Officials from the **Office of the Secretary of State (SOS)** assume many bills considered by the General Assembly include provisions allowing or requiring agencies to submit rules and regulations to implement the act. The SOS is provided with core funding to handle a certain amount of normal activity resulting from each year's legislative session. The fiscal impact for this fiscal note to the SOS for Administrative Rules is less than \$5,000. The SOS recognizes that this is a small amount and does not expect that additional funding would be required to meet these costs. However, the SOS also recognizes that many such bills may be passed by the General Assembly in a given year and that collectively the costs may be in excess of what the office can sustain with the core budget. Therefore, the SOS reserves the right to request funding for the cost of supporting administrative rules requirements should the need arise based on a review of the finally approved bills signed by the governor.

Oversight assumes the SOS could absorb the costs of printing and distributing regulations related to this proposal. If multiple bills pass which require the printing and distribution of regulations at substantial costs, the SOS could require additional resources.

Officials from the **Department of Transportation (MODOT)** assume this legislation would have a zero to unknown negative fiscal impact most likely no greater than \$10,000 per year on MoDOT/MHTC. Should an employee knowingly or accidentally violate these provisions, the Department and the employee can be fined. Since MoDOT is self-insured, this legislation could affect the Department.

Officials from the **Attorney General's Office (AGO)** assumes that Section 115.646 of the proposal would have an unknown negative fiscal impact on the Legal Expense Fund (LEF).

Oversight notes most LEF costs are reimbursed from the General Revenue Fund (GR). GR has paid for the majority of payments from the LEF since payments on LEF cases for agencies with designated reimbursable funds have been relatively small. According to Office of Administration - Risk Management (OARM), broader budget authority to transfer from Federal and Other Funds beginning in FY 18 allowed for an increase of percentage of payments from Federal and Other Funds. Table 1 below shows LEF costs broken down for GR versus Federal Funds/Other Funds.

OARM provided Oversight with claim payment data from FY 2015 to FY 2018. Based on the data provided, Oversight estimated the number of claims and amount paid by claim type shown in table 2 below. Motor vehicle claims accounted for 69% of the total number of claims but only 11% of the value of claims. Claims related to discrimination accounted for 8% of the total number of claims but 25% of the value of claims paid.

Oversight notes the cost of any potential liability would be entirely dependent of the number of claims and circumstances of the claims filed; therefore, the cost is ultimately unknown.

Oversight does not have any information to the contrary in regards to AGO's assumption; therefore, Oversight will range the fiscal impact from \$0 (does not increase litigation) to an "Unknown" cost (increased claims related to violations of provisions in Section 115.646) on the fiscal note.

Officials from the **Joint Committee on Administrative Rules (JCAR)** assume any additional rulemaking authorized by the legislation is not anticipated to have an increased fiscal impact on JCAR.

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Officials from the Office of Administration-Budget and Planning, Office of State Courts Administrator, Missouri House of Representatives, Department of Public Safety-Alcohol and Tobacco Control, Department of Public Safety-Veterans Commission, Department of Public Safety-National Guard, Department of Labor and Industrial Relations, Department of Mental Health, Department of Social Services, Department of Natural Resources, Department of Economic Development, Missouri Department of Conservation, State Auditor's Office, Department of Revenue, Department of Public Safety-Office of the Director, Department of Commerce & Insurance, Department of Corrections, Department of Health and Senior Services, Department of Elementary and Secondary Education, Office of the Governor, Missouri Lottery Commission, Department of Public Safety-Missouri State Highway Patrol, Department of Higher Education and Workforce Development, Office of Prosecution Services, Office of the State Public Defender, Missouri Tax Commission, Legislative Research, Oversight Division, Missouri State Employees' Retirement System, Department of Public Safety-Gaming Commission, Department of Public Safety-Capitol Police, Missouri Senate, Department of Public Safety-State Emergency Management Agency, Department of Revenue, MoDOT & Patrol Employees' Retirement System, Office of the State Courts Administrator, State Tax Commission, Missouri State Employee's Retirement System, Missouri Consolidated Health Care Plan, and Department of Public Safety-Fire Safety each assume the proposal will have no fiscal impact on their organizations.

Officials from the **City of Kansas City** assume this legislation could have a negative fiscal impact in an indeterminate amount on the City of Kansas City, Missouri, because it could increase litigation against Kansas City and limit Kansas City's ability to comment on ballot measures that could have a negative fiscal impact on Kansas City.

Officials from the City of Ballwin, City of St. Louis – Budget Division, City of O'Fallon and City of Springfield both assume the proposal will have no fiscal impact on their organization.

Oversight notes the cost of any potential liability would be entirely dependent of the number of claims and circumstances of the claims filed; therefore the cost is ultimately unknown. Oversight will range the fiscal impact from \$0 (does not increase litigation) to an "Unknown" cost (increased claims related to violations of provisions in Section 115.646) on the fiscal note for local political subdivisions.

Oversight only reflects the responses that we have received from state agencies and political subdivisions; however, other cities and counties were requested to respond to this proposed legislation but did not. A general listing of political subdivisions included in our database is available upon request.

FISCAL IMPACT - Small Business

No direct fiscal impact to small businesses would be expected as a result of this proposal.

FISCAL DESCRIPTION

This bill requires the Missouri Ethics Commission (MEC) to investigate violations of election statutes relating to the use of public funds for political advertising purposes on printed materials. Any person may file a complaint against a state department or its director for violations. The MEC has 30 days to dismiss the complaint or start an investigation and notify the complainant of the decision. If the MEC, or any person whose complaint is denied, wishes to proceed then they may file a petition in the Circuit Court of Cole County against the agency or political subdivision. Procedures for filing are specified in the bill. If the Court finds a violation, then civil penalties of 10 times the amount of an expenditure or \$10,000, whichever is greater, may be imposed on a department or political subdivision. Directors and administrators may be personally liable for up to \$1,000 in civil penalties. Injunctive relief and court costs shall also be imposed as specified in the bill.

Publications in compliance with federal election laws and the full text of proposed ballot measures may be printed as specified in the bill.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
