AN ACT

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the state of Missouri, as follows:

32.070. 1. This act shall be known and may be cited as the "Streamlined Sales and 2 Use Tax Agreement Act".

2. (1) Beginning the effective date of this act, all revenue generated under the streamlined sales and use tax agreement act that exceeds the amount of revenue that would have been collected if the streamlined sales and use tax agreement act were not effective shall be deposited in the streamlined sales and use tax agreement special fund created in this section and appropriated solely for the approved purposes. The department of revenue shall track and report the collections generated under this act.

9 (2) There is hereby created in the state treasury the "Streamlined Sales and Use Tax Agreement Special Fund", which shall consist of moneys collected under this 10 11 subsection. The state treasurer shall be custodian of the fund. In accordance with sections 12 30.170 and 30.180, the state treasurer may approve disbursements. The fund shall be a dedicated fund and, upon appropriation, moneys in the fund shall be transferred only to 13 14 pay for outstanding transportation bond debt. Notwithstanding the provisions of section 15 33.080 to the contrary, any moneys remaining in the fund at the end of the biennium shall 16 not revert to the credit of the general revenue fund. The state treasurer shall invest 17 moneys in the fund in the same manner as other funds are invested. Any interest and 18 moneys earned on such investments shall be credited to the fund.

19 3. The director of revenue shall enter into the streamlined sales and use tax 20 agreement with one or more states to simplify and modernize sales and use tax 21 administration in order to substantially reduce the burden of tax compliance for all sellers 22 and for all types of commerce. In furtherance of the streamlined sales and use tax 23 agreement, the director of revenue may act jointly with other states that are members of 24 the streamlined sales and use tax agreement to establish standards for certification of a 25 certified service provider and certified automated system and establish performance 26 standards for multistate sellers.

4. The director of revenue may take other actions reasonably required to implement the provisions set forth in the streamlined sales and use tax agreement act

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including, but not limited to, the promulgation of rules and the joint procurement, with other member states, of goods and services in furtherance of the streamlined sales and use tax agreement.

32 5. For the purposes of representing this state as a member of the agreement and, 33 if necessary, amending the agreement, three delegates shall represent this state: one of whom is appointed by the governor, one of whom is a member of the general assembly 34 35 appointed by mutual agreement of the president pro tempore of the senate and the speaker 36 of the house of representatives, and one of whom is the director of revenue or the director's 37 designee. Each year, the delegates shall recommend to the committees responsible for 38 reviewing tax issues in the senate and the house of representatives any amendment of state 39 statutes required to be substantially in compliance with the agreement. Such delegates 40 shall make a written report no later than the fifteenth day of January each year regarding 41 the status of the agreement.

42 6. The department of revenue shall promulgate rules necessary to implement the 43 provisions of the streamlined sales and use tax agreement. Any rule or portion of a rule, 44 as that term is defined in section 536.010, that is created under the authority delegated in 45 this section shall become effective only if it complies with and is subject to all of the 46 provisions of chapter 536 and, if applicable, section 536.028. This section and chapter 536 47 are nonseverable, and if any of the powers vested with the general assembly pursuant to 48 chapter 536 to review, to delay the effective date, or to disapprove and annul a rule are 49 subsequently held unconstitutional, then the grant of rulemaking authority and any rule 50 proposed or adopted after January 1, 2021, shall be invalid and void.

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7. Under section 23.253 of the Missouri sunset act:

52 (1) The provisions of this section shall automatically sunset five years after the 53 effective date of this section unless reauthorized by an act of the general assembly;

(2) If the provisions of this section are reauthorized, the provisions of this section
 shall automatically sunset five years after the effective date of the reauthorization of this
 section; and

57 (3) This section shall terminate on January first of the calendar year immediately 58 following the calendar year in which the provisions of this section are sunset.

32.086. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, for all local sales and use taxes collected by the department of revenue and remitted to a political jurisdiction or taxing district, the department shall remit one percent of the amount collected to the general revenue fund to offset the cost of collection unless a greater amount is specified in the local sales and use tax law. The department shall not commingle the remaining amounts collected with general revenue and shall remit the remaining amounts collected to the

7 political jurisdiction or taxing district, less any credits for erroneous payments, 8 overpayments, and dishonored checks.

32.087. 1. Within ten days after the adoption of any ordinance or order in favor of adoption of any local sales tax authorized under the local sales tax law by the voters of a taxing entity, the governing body or official of such taxing entity shall forward to the director of revenue by United States registered mail or certified mail a certified copy of the ordinance or order. [The ordinance or order shall reflect the effective date thereof.]

6 2. Any local sales tax so adopted shall become effective [on the first day of the second
7 calendar quarter after the director of revenue receives notice of adoption of the local sales tax,
8 except] as provided in subsection [18] 19 of this section, and shall be imposed on all transactions
9 on which the Missouri state sales tax is imposed.

3. Every retailer within the jurisdiction of one or more taxing entities which has imposed one or more local sales taxes under the local sales tax law shall add all taxes so imposed along with the tax imposed by the sales tax law of the state of Missouri to the sale price and, when added, the combined tax shall constitute a part of the price, and shall be a debt of the purchaser to the retailer until paid, and shall be recoverable at law in the same manner as the purchase price. The combined rate of the state sales tax and all local sales taxes shall be the sum of the rates, multiplying the combined rate times the amount of the sale.

17 4. [The brackets required to be established by the director of revenue under the provisions
 18 of section 144.285 shall be based upon the sum of the combined rate of the state sales tax and
 19 all local sales taxes imposed under the provisions of the local sales tax law.

20 <u>5.</u>] (1) The ordinance or order imposing a local sales tax under the local sales tax law 21 shall impose a tax upon all transactions upon which the Missouri state sales tax is imposed to 22 the extent and in the manner provided in [sections 144.010 to 144.525] chapter 144, and the 23 rules and regulations of the director of revenue issued pursuant thereto; except that the rate of 24 the tax shall be the sum of the combined rate of the state sales tax or state highway use tax and 25 all local sales taxes imposed under the provisions of the local sales tax law.

26 (2) Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary, local taxing jurisdictions, 27 except those in which voters have previously approved a local use tax under section 144.757, 28 shall have placed on the ballot on or after the general election in November 2014, but no later 29 than the general election in November 2022, whether to repeal application of the local sales tax 30 to the titling of motor vehicles, trailers, boats, and outboard motors that are subject to state sales 31 tax under section 144.020 and purchased from a source other than a licensed Missouri dealer. 32 The ballot question presented to the local voters shall contain substantially the following 33 language:

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35 Shall the (local jurisdiction's name) discontinue applying and 36 collecting the local sales tax on the titling of motor vehicles, trailers, boats, and 37 outboard motors that were purchased from a source other than a licensed 38 Missouri dealer? 39 Approval of this measure will result in a reduction of local revenue to provide for 40 (local jurisdiction's name) and it will place Missouri vital services for 41 dealers of motor vehicles, outboard motors, boats, and trailers at a competitive 42 disadvantage to non-Missouri dealers of motor vehicles, outboard motors, boats, 43 and trailers. 44 \Box NO \Box YES 45 46 If you are in favor of the question, place an "X" in the box opposite "YES". If you 47 are opposed to the question, place an "X" in the box opposite "NO". 48 49 (3) If the ballot question set forth in subdivision (2) of this subsection receives a majority 50 of the votes cast in favor of the proposal, or if the local taxing jurisdiction fails to place the ballot 51 question before the voters on or before the general election in November 2022, the local taxing 52 jurisdiction shall cease applying the local sales tax to the titling of motor vehicles, trailers, boats, 53 and outboard motors that were purchased from a source other than a licensed Missouri dealer. 54 (4) In addition to the requirement that the ballot question set forth in subdivision (2) of 55 this subsection be placed before the voters, the governing body of any local taxing jurisdiction 56 that had previously imposed a local use tax on the use of motor vehicles, trailers, boats, and 57 outboard motors may, at any time, place a proposal on the ballot at any election to repeal 58 application of the local sales tax to the titling of motor vehicles, trailers, boats, and outboard 59 motors purchased from a source other than a licensed Missouri dealer. If a majority of the votes 60 cast by the registered voters voting thereon are in favor of the proposal to repeal application of 61 the local sales tax to such titling, then the local sales tax shall no longer be applied to the titling 62 of motor vehicles, trailers, boats, and outboard motors purchased from a source other than a 63 licensed Missouri dealer. If a majority of the votes cast by the registered voters voting thereon are opposed to the proposal to repeal application of the local sales tax to such titling, such 64 65 application shall remain in effect. (5) In addition to the requirement that the ballot question set forth in subdivision (2) of

66 (5) In addition to the requirement that the ballot question set forth in subdivision (2) of 67 this subsection be placed before the voters on or after the general election in November 2014, 68 and on or before the general election in November 2022, whenever the governing body of any 69 local taxing jurisdiction imposing a local sales tax on the sale of motor vehicles, trailers, boats, 70 and outboard motors receives a petition, signed by fifteen percent of the registered voters of such 71 jurisdiction voting in the last gubernatorial election, and calling for a proposal to be placed on 72 the ballot at any election to repeal application of the local sales tax to the titling of motor 73 vehicles, trailers, boats, and outboard motors purchased from a source other than a licensed 74 Missouri dealer, the governing body shall submit to the voters of such jurisdiction a proposal to repeal application of the local sales tax to such titling. If a majority of the votes cast by the 75 registered voters voting thereon are in favor of the proposal to repeal application of the local 76 77 sales tax to such titling, then the local sales tax shall no longer be applied to the titling of motor 78 vehicles, trailers, boats, and outboard motors purchased from a source other than a licensed 79 Missouri dealer. If a majority of the votes cast by the registered voters voting thereon are 80 opposed to the proposal to repeal application of the local sales tax to such titling, such 81 application shall remain in effect.

82 (6) Nothing in this subsection shall be construed to authorize the voters of any 83 jurisdiction to repeal application of any state sales or use tax.

84 (7) If any local sales tax on the titling of motor vehicles, trailers, boats, and outboard 85 motors purchased from a source other than a licensed Missouri dealer is repealed, such repeal 86 shall take effect [on the first day of the second calendar quarter after the election] as provided 87 in subsection 19 of this section. If any local sales tax on the titling of motor vehicles, trailers, 88 boats, and outboard motors purchased from a source other than a licensed Missouri dealer is 89 required to cease to be applied or collected due to failure of a local taxing jurisdiction to hold an 90 election pursuant to subdivision (2) of this subsection, such cessation shall take effect on March 91 1, 2023.

92 (8) Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, if any local sales tax on the 93 titling of motor vehicles, trailers, boats, and outboard motors purchased from a source other than 94 a licensed Missouri dealer is repealed after the general election in November 2014, or if the 95 taxing jurisdiction failed to present the ballot to the voters at a general election on or before 96 November 2022, then the governing body of such taxing jurisdiction may, at any election 97 subsequent to the repeal or after the general election in November 2022, if the jurisdiction failed 98 to present the ballot to the voters, place before the voters the issue of imposing a sales tax on the 99 titling of motor vehicles, trailers, boats, and outboard motors that are subject to state sales tax 100 under section 144.020 that were purchased from a source other than a licensed Missouri dealer. 101 The ballot question presented to the local voters shall contain substantially the following 102 language:

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104 Shall the _____ (local jurisdiction's name) apply and collect the local sales 105 tax on the titling of motor vehicles, trailers, boats, and outboard motors that are 106 subject to state sales tax under section 144.020 and purchased from a source other 107 than a licensed Missouri dealer? 108 Approval of this measure will result in an increase of local revenue to provide for 109 vital services for (local jurisdiction's name), and it will remove a 110 competitive advantage that non-Missouri dealers of motor vehicles, outboard 111 motors, boats, and trailers have over Missouri dealers of motor vehicles, outboard 112 motors, boats, and trailers. 113 \Box YES \Box NO

are opposed to the question, place an "X" in the box opposite "NO".

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(9) If any local sales tax on the titling of motor vehicles, trailers, boats, and outboard motors purchased from a source other than a licensed Missouri dealer is adopted, such tax shall take effect and be imposed [on the first day of the second calendar quarter after the election] as provided in subsection 19 of this section.

122 [6-] 5. On and after the effective date of any local sales tax imposed under the provisions 123 of the local sales tax law, the director of revenue shall perform all functions incident to the 124 administration, collection, enforcement, and operation of the tax, and the director of revenue 125 shall collect in addition to the sales tax for the state of Missouri all additional local sales taxes 126 authorized under the authority of the local sales tax law. All local sales taxes imposed under the 127 local sales tax law together with all taxes imposed under the sales tax law of the state of Missouri 128 shall be collected together and reported upon such forms and under such administrative rules and 129 regulations as may be prescribed by the director of revenue.

130 [7.] 6. All applicable provisions contained in [sections 144.010 to 144.525] chapter 144 131 governing the state sales tax and section 32.057, the uniform confidentiality provision, shall 132 apply to the collection of any local sales tax imposed under the local sales tax law except as 133 modified by the local sales tax law.

134 [8.] 7. All exemptions granted to agencies of government, organizations, persons and to 135 the sale of certain articles and items of tangible personal property and taxable services under [the 136 provisions of sections 144.010 to 144.525] chapter 144, as these sections now read and as they 137 may hereafter be amended, it being the intent of this general assembly to ensure that the same 138 sales tax exemptions granted from the state sales tax law also be granted under the local sales 139 tax law, are hereby made applicable to the imposition and collection of all local sales taxes 140 imposed under the local sales tax law.

141 [9.] 8. The same sales tax permit, exemption certificate and retail certificate required [by 142 sections 144.010 to 144.525] under chapter 144 for the administration and collection of the 143 state sales tax shall satisfy the requirements of the local sales tax law, and no additional permit 144 or exemption certificate or retail certificate shall be required; except that the director of revenue 145 may prescribe a form of exemption certificate for an exemption from any local sales tax imposed 146 by the local sales tax law.

147 [10.] 9. All discounts allowed the retailer under the provisions of the state sales tax law 148 for the collection of and for payment of taxes under the provisions of the state sales tax law are 149 hereby allowed and made applicable to any local sales tax collected under the provisions of the 150 local sales tax law.

[11.] 10. The penalties provided in section 32.057 and [sections 144.010 to 144.525]
chapter 144 for a violation of the provisions of those sections are hereby made applicable to
violations of the provisions of the local sales tax law.

154 [12, (1)] 11. For the purposes of any local sales tax imposed by an ordinance or order 155 under the local sales tax law, all sales, except the sale of motor vehicles, trailers, boats, and 156 outboard motors required to be titled under the laws of the state of Missouri, shall be deemed to 157 be consummated at the place of business of the retailer unless the tangible personal property sold 158 is delivered by the retailer or his agent to an out-of-state destination. In the event a retailer has 159 more than one place of business in this state which participates in the sale, the sale shall be deemed to be consummated at the place of business of the retailer where the initial order for the 160 161 tangible personal property is taken, even though the order must be forwarded elsewhere for acceptance, approval of credit, shipment or billing. A sale by a retailer's agent or employee shall 162 163 be deemed to be consummated at the place of business from which he works.

(2) For the purposes of any local sales tax imposed by an ordinance or order under the
 local sales tax law, the sales tax upon the titling of all motor vehicles, trailers, boats, and
 outboard motors shall be imposed at the rate in effect at the location of the residence of the
 purchaser, and remitted to that local taxing entity, and not at the place of business of the retailer,
 or the place of business from which the retailer's agent or employee works.
 (3) For the purposes of any local tax imposed by an ordinance or under the local sales

170 tax law on charges for mobile telecommunications services, all taxes of mobile

171 telecommunications service shall be imposed as provided in the Mobile Telecommunications

172 Sourcing Act, 4 U.S.C. Sections 116 through 124, as amended] shall be sourced as provided

173 by sections 144.111 to 144.114.

174 [13.] 12. Local sales taxes shall not be imposed on the seller of motor vehicles, trailers,
175 boats, and outboard motors required to be titled under the laws of the state of Missouri, but shall
176 be collected from the purchaser by the director of revenue at the time application is made for a

177 certificate of title, if the address of the applicant is within a taxing entity imposing a local sales 178 tax under the local sales tax law.

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[14.] 13. The director of revenue and any of his deputies, assistants and employees who 180 have any duties or responsibilities in connection with the collection, deposit, transfer, transmittal, 181 disbursement, safekeeping, accounting, or recording of funds which come into the hands of the 182 director of revenue under the provisions of the local sales tax law shall enter a surety bond or 183 bonds payable to any and all taxing entities in whose behalf such funds have been collected 184 under the local sales tax law in the amount of one hundred thousand dollars for each such tax; 185 but the director of revenue may enter into a blanket bond covering himself and all such deputies, 186 assistants and employees. The cost of any premium for such bonds shall be paid by the director 187 of revenue from the share of the collections under the sales tax law retained by the director of 188 revenue for the benefit of the state.

189 [15.] 14. The director of revenue shall annually report on his management of each trust 190 fund which is created under the local sales tax law and administration of each local sales tax 191 imposed under the local sales tax law. He shall provide each taxing entity imposing one or more 192 local sales taxes authorized by the local sales tax law with a detailed accounting of the source 193 of all funds received by him for the taxing entity. Notwithstanding any other provisions of law, 194 the state auditor shall annually audit each trust fund. A copy of the director's report and annual 195 audit shall be forwarded to each taxing entity imposing one or more local sales taxes.

196 [16.] 15. Within the boundaries of any taxing entity where one or more local sales taxes 197 have been imposed, if any person is delinquent in the payment of the amount required to be paid 198 by him under the local sales tax law or in the event a determination has been made against him 199 for taxes and penalty under the local sales tax law, the limitation for bringing suit for the 200 collection of the delinquent tax and penalty shall be the same as that provided in sections 201 144.010 to 144.525] chapter 144. Where the director of revenue has determined that suit must 202 be filed against any person for the collection of delinquent taxes due the state under the state 203 sales tax law, and where such person is also delinquent in payment of taxes under the local sales 204 tax law, the director of revenue shall notify the taxing entity in the event any person fails or 205 refuses to pay the amount of any local sales tax due so that appropriate action may be taken by 206 the taxing entity.

207 [17.] 16. Where property is seized by the director of revenue under the provisions of any 208 law authorizing seizure of the property of a taxpayer who is delinquent in payment of the tax 209 imposed by the state sales tax law, and where such taxpayer is also delinquent in payment of any 210 tax imposed by the local sales tax law, the director of revenue shall permit the taxing entity to 211 join in any sale of property to pay the delinquent taxes and penalties due the state and to the 212 taxing entity under the local sales tax law. The proceeds from such sale shall first be applied to

all sums due the state, and the remainder, if any, shall be applied to all sums due such taxing entity.

215 [18.] 17. If a local sales tax has been in effect for at least one year under the provisions 216 of the local sales tax law and voters approve reimposition of the same local sales tax at the same 217 rate at an election as provided for in the local sales tax law prior to the date such tax is due to 218 expire, the tax so reimposed shall become effective [the first day of the first calendar quarter after 219 the director receives a certified copy of the ordinance, order or resolution accompanied by a map 220 clearly showing the boundaries thereof and the results of such election, provided that such 221 ordinance, order or resolution and all necessary accompanying materials are received by the 222 director at least thirty days prior to the expiration of such tax] as provided by subsection 19 of 223 this section. Any administrative cost or expense incurred by the state as a result of the 224 provisions of this subsection shall be paid by the city or county reimposing such tax.

225 18. If the boundaries of a city in which a sales tax has been imposed are thereafter 226 changed or altered, the city clerk shall forward to the director of revenue, by United States 227 registered mail or certified mail, a certified copy of the ordinance adding or detaching 228 territory from the city within ten days of adoption of the ordinance. The ordinance shall 229 reflect the effective date of the ordinance and shall be accompanied by a map of the city 230 clearly showing the territory added or detached from the city boundaries. Upon receipt 231 of the ordinance and map, the tax imposed under the local sales tax law shall be effective 232 in the added territory or abolished in the detached territory on the first day of a calendar 233 quarter after one hundred twenty days' notice to sellers.

19. (1) The effective date for the imposition, repeal, or rate change of each local sales and use tax is the first day of the calendar quarter after a minimum of one hundred twenty days' notice to sellers. In all cases where notice is required to be made to the director of revenue by a local taxing jurisdiction, such notice shall be made at least one hundred twenty days prior to the effective date for the imposition, repeal, or rate change of a local sales and use tax.

(2) The effective date for any local jurisdiction boundary change for sales and use
tax purposes is the first day of the calendar quarter after a minimum of one hundred
twenty days' notice to sellers.

243 **20.** (1) For a rate increase, the new rate shall apply to the first billing period 244 starting on or after the effective date.

245 (2) For a rate decrease, the new rate shall apply to bills rendered on or after the 246 effective date.

66.620. 1. All county sales taxes collected by the director of revenue under sections 2 66.600 to 66.630 on behalf of any county[, less one percent for cost of collection which shall be

3 deposited in the state's general revenue fund after payment of premiums for surety bonds as

4 provided in section 32.087,] shall be deposited in a special trust fund, which is hereby created, 5 to be known as the "County Sales Tax Trust Fund". [The moneys in the county sales tax trust fund shall not be deemed to be state funds and shall not be commingled with any funds of the 6 7 state.] The director of revenue shall keep accurate records of the amount of money in the trust 8 fund which was collected in each county imposing a county sales tax, and the records shall be 9 open to the inspection of officers of the county and the public. Not later than the tenth day of 10 each month, the director of revenue shall distribute all moneys deposited in the trust fund during 11 the preceding month to the county which levied the tax; such funds shall be deposited with the treasurer of the county and all expenditures of funds arising from the county sales tax trust fund 12 13 shall be by an appropriation act to be enacted by the legislative council of the county, and to the 14 cities, towns and villages located wholly or partly within the county which levied the tax in the 15 manner as set forth in sections 66.600 to 66.630.

16 2. In any county not adopting an additional sales tax and alternate distribution system 17 as provided in section 67.581, for the purposes of distributing the county sales tax, the county 18 shall be divided into two groups, "Group A" and "Group B". Group A shall consist of all cities, 19 towns and villages which are located wholly or partly within the county which levied the tax and 20 which had a city sales tax in effect under the provisions of sections 94.500 to 94.550 on the day 21 prior to the adoption of the county sales tax ordinance, except that beginning January 1, 1980, 22 group A shall consist of all cities, towns and villages which are located wholly or partly within 23 the county which levied the tax and which had a city sales tax approved by the voters of such city under the provisions of sections 94.500 to 94.550 on the day prior to the effective date of the 24 25 county sales tax. For the purposes of determining the location of consummation of sales for 26 distribution of funds to cities, towns and villages in group A, the boundaries of any such city, 27 town or village shall be the boundary of that city, town or village as it existed on March 19, 28 1984. Group B shall consist of all cities, towns and villages which are located wholly or partly 29 within the county which levied the tax and which did not have a city sales tax in effect under the 30 provisions of sections 94.500 to 94.550 on the day prior to the adoption of the county sales tax 31 ordinance, and shall also include all unincorporated areas of the county which levied the tax; 32 except that, beginning January 1, 1980, group B shall consist of all cities, towns and villages 33 which are located wholly or partly within the county which levied the tax and which did not have 34 a city sales tax approved by the voters of such city under the provisions of sections 94.500 to 35 94.550 on the day prior to the effective date of the county sales tax and shall also include all 36 unincorporated areas of the county which levied the tax.

37 3. Until January 1, 1994, the director of revenue shall distribute to the cities, towns and 38 villages in group A the taxes based on the location in which the sales were deemed consummated 39 under section 66.630 and subsection [12] 11 of section 32.087. Except for distribution governed 40 by section 66.630, after deducting the distribution to the cities, towns and villages in group A, 41 the director of revenue shall distribute the remaining funds in the county sales tax trust fund to 42 the cities, towns and villages and the county in group B as follows: to the county which levied 43 the tax, a percentage of the distributable revenue equal to the percentage ratio that the population 44 of the unincorporated areas of the county bears to the total population of group B; and to each 45 city, town or village in group B located wholly within the taxing county, a percentage of the 46 distributable revenue equal to the percentage ratio that the population of such city, town or 47 village bears to the total population of group B; and to each city, town or village located partly 48 within the taxing county, a percentage of the distributable revenue equal to the percentage ratio 49 that the population of that part of the city, town or village located within the taxing county bears 50 to the total population of group B.

51 4. From January 1, 1994, until December 31, 2016, the director of revenue shall 52 distribute to the cities, towns and villages in group A a portion of the taxes based on the location 53 in which the sales were deemed consummated under section 66.630 and subsection [12] 11 of 54 section 32.087 in accordance with the formula described in this subsection and in subsection 6. 55 After deducting the distribution to the cities, towns and villages in group A, the director of 56 revenue shall distribute funds in the county sales tax trust fund to the cities, towns and villages 57 and the county in group B as follows: to the county which levied the tax, ten percent multiplied 58 by the percentage of the population of unincorporated county which has been annexed or 59 incorporated since April 1, 1993, multiplied by the total of all sales tax revenues countywide, and 60 a percentage of the remaining distributable revenue equal to the percentage ratio that the 61 population of unincorporated areas of the county bears to the total population of group B; and 62 to each city, town or village in group B located wholly within the taxing county, a percentage of 63 the remaining distributable revenue equal to the percentage ratio that the population of such city, 64 town or village bears to the total population of group B; and to each city, town or village located 65 partly within the taxing county, a percentage of the remaining distributable revenue equal to the 66 percentage ratio that the population of that part of the city, town or village located within the 67 taxing county bears to the total population of group B.

5. (1) From and after January 1, 2017, in each year in which the total revenues from the county sales tax collected under sections 66.600 to 66.630 in the previous calendar year are less than or equal to the amount of such revenues which were collected in the calendar year 2014, the director of revenue shall distribute to the cities, towns, and villages in group A and the cities, towns, and villages, and the county in group B, the amounts required to be distributed under the formula described in subsection 4 and in subsection 6 of this section. From and after January 1, 2017, in each year in which the total revenues from the county sales tax collected under

75 sections 66.600 to 66.630 in the previous calendar year is greater than the amount of such 76 revenues which were collected in the calendar year 2014, the director of revenue shall distribute 77 to the cities, towns, and villages in group A a portion of the taxes based on the location in which 78 the sales were deemed consummated under section 66.630 and subsection [12] 11 of section 79 32.087, in accordance with the formula described in this subsection and in subsection 6. After 80 deducting the distribution to the cities, towns, and villages in group A, the director of revenue 81 shall, subject to the limitation described in subdivision (2) of this subsection, distribute funds in 82 the county sales tax trust fund to the cities, towns, and villages, and the county in group B as 83 follows: to the county which levied the tax, ten percent multiplied by the percentage of the 84 population of unincorporated county which has been annexed or incorporated since April 1, 85 1993, multiplied by the total of all sales tax revenues countywide, and a percentage of the 86 remaining distributable revenue equal to the percentage ratio that the population of 87 unincorporated areas of the county bears to the total population of group B as adjusted such that 88 no city, town, or village in group B shall receive a distribution that is less than fifty percent of 89 the amount of taxes generated within such city, town, or village based on the location in which 90 the sales were deemed consummated under section 66.630 and subsection [12] 11 of section 91 32.087; and to each city, town, or village in group B located wholly within the taxing county, a 92 percentage of the remaining distributable revenue equal to the percentage ratio that the 93 population of such city, town, or village bears to the total population of group B, as adjusted such 94 that no city, town, or village in group B shall receive a distribution that is less than fifty percent 95 of the amount of taxes generated within such city, town, or village based on the location in which 96 the sales were deemed consummated under section 66.630 and subsection [12] 11 of section 97 32.087; and to each city, town, or village located partly within the taxing county, a percentage 98 of the remaining distributable revenue equal to the percentage ratio that the population of that 99 part of the city, town, or village located within the taxing county bears to the total population of 100 group B, as adjusted such that no city, town, or village in group B shall receive a distribution that 101 is less than fifty percent of the amount of taxes generated within such city, town, or village based 102 on the location in which the sales were deemed consummated under section 66.630 and 103 subsection [12] 11 of section 32.087.

(2) For purposes of making any adjustment required by this subsection, the director of revenue shall, prior to any distribution to the county or to each city, town, or village in group B located wholly or partly within the taxing county, identify each city, town, or village in group B located wholly or partly within the taxing county that would receive a distribution that is less than fifty percent of the amount of taxes generated within such city, town, or village based on the location in which the sales were deemed consummated under section 66.630 and subsection [12] 11 of section 32.087 if no adjustments were made and calculate the difference between the

amount that the distribution to each such city, town, or village would have been without any adjustment and the amount that equals fifty percent of the amount of taxes generated within such city, town, or village based on the location in which the sales were deemed consummated under section 66.630 and subsection [12] 11 of section 32.087. Thereafter, the director of revenue shall determine the amount of any adjustment under this subsection as follows:

116 (a) If the aggregate amount of the difference calculated in accordance with this 117 subsection is less than or equal to the aggregate increase in the remaining distributable revenue 118 for the applicable period in the current calendar year over the remaining distributable revenue 119 for the corresponding period in the calendar year 2014, the director of revenue shall deduct the 120 amount of such difference from the remaining distributable revenue and distribute an allocable 121 portion of the amount of such difference to each city, town, or village that would otherwise have 122 received a distribution that is less than fifty percent of the amount of taxes generated within such 123 city, town, or village based on the location in which the sales were deemed consummated under 124 section 66.630 and subsection [12] 11 of section 32.087 if no adjustment were made, such that 125 each such city, town, or village receives a distribution that is equal to fifty percent of the amount 126 of taxes generated within such city, town, or village based on the location in which the sales were 127 deemed consummated under section 66.630 and subsection [12] 11 of section 32.087;

128 (b) If, however, the aggregate amount of the difference calculated in accordance with this 129 subsection is greater that the aggregate increase in the remaining distributable revenue for the 130 applicable period in the current calendar year over the remaining distributable revenue for the 131 corresponding period in the calendar year 2014, the director of revenue shall deduct from the 132 remaining distributable revenue an amount equal to the difference between the remaining 133 distributable revenue for the applicable period in the current calendar year and the remaining 134 distributable revenue for the corresponding period in the calendar year 2014 and distribute an 135 allocable portion of the amount of such difference to each city, town, or village that would 136 otherwise have received a distribution that is less than fifty percent of the amount of taxes 137 generated within such city, town, or village based on the location in which the sales were deemed 138 consummated under section 66.630 and subsection [12] 11 of section 32.087 if no adjustment 139 were made, such that each such city, town, or village receives a distribution that includes an 140 adjustment that is proportionate to the amount of the adjustment that would otherwise have been 141 made if such adjustment were calculated in accordance with paragraph (a) of this subdivision;

142 (c) After determining the amount of the adjustment and making the allocation in 143 accordance with paragraph (a) or (b) of this subdivision, as applicable, the director of revenue 144 shall thereafter distribute the remaining distributable revenue, as adjusted, to the county and to 145 each city, town, or village in group B located wholly or partly within the taxing county in the 146 manner provided in this subsection.

(1) For purposes of administering the distribution formula of subsections 4 and 5 of 157 this section, the revenues arising each year from sales occurring within each group A city, town 158 or village shall be distributed as follows: until such revenues reach the adjusted county average, 159 as hereinafter defined, there shall be distributed to the city, town or village all of such revenues 160 reduced by the percentage which is equal to ten percent multiplied by the percentage of the 161 population of unincorporated county which has been annexed or incorporated after April 1, 1993; 162 and once revenues exceed the adjusted county average, total revenues shall be shared in 163 accordance with the redistribution formula as defined in this subsection.

164 (2) For purposes of this subsection, the "adjusted county average" is the per capita 165 countywide average of all sales tax distributions during the prior calendar year reduced by the 166 percentage which is equal to ten percent multiplied by the percentage of the population of 167 unincorporated county which has been annexed or incorporated after April 1, 1993; the 168 redistribution formula is as follows: during 1994, each group A city, town and village shall 169 receive that portion of the revenues arising from sales occurring within the municipality that 170 remains after deducting therefrom an amount equal to the cumulative sales tax revenues arising 171 from sales within the municipality multiplied by the percentage which is the sum of ten percent 172 multiplied by the percentage of the population of unincorporated county which has been annexed 173 or incorporated after April 1, 1993, and the percentage, if greater than zero, equal to the product 174 of 8.5 multiplied by the logarithm (to base 10) of the product of 0.035 multiplied by the total of 175 cumulative per capita sales taxes arising from sales within the municipality less the adjusted 176 county average. During 1995, each group A city, town and village shall receive that portion of 177 the revenues arising from sales occurring within the municipality that remains after deducting 178 therefrom an amount equal to the cumulative sales tax revenues arising from sales within the 179 municipality multiplied by the percentage which is the sum of ten percent multiplied by the 180 percentage of the population of unincorporated county which has been annexed or incorporated 181 after April 1, 1993, and the percentage, if greater than zero, equal to the product of seventeen 182 multiplied by the logarithm (to base 10) of the product of 0.035 multiplied by the total of

cumulative per capita sales taxes arising from sales within the municipality less the adjusted 183 184 county average. From January 1, 1996, until January 1, 2000, each group A city, town and 185 village shall receive that portion of the revenues arising from sales occurring within the 186 municipality that remains after deducting therefrom an amount equal to the cumulative sales tax 187 revenues arising from sales within the municipality multiplied by the percentage which is the 188 sum of ten percent multiplied by the percentage of the population of unincorporated county 189 which has been annexed or incorporated after April 1, 1993, and the percentage, if greater than 190 zero, equal to the product of 25.5 multiplied by the logarithm (to base 10) of the product of 0.035191 multiplied by the total of cumulative per capita sales taxes arising from sales within the 192 municipality less the adjusted county average. From and after January 1, 2000, the distribution 193 formula covering the period from January 1, 1996, until January 1, 2000, shall continue to apply, 194 except that the percentage computed for sales arising within the municipalities shall be not less 195 than 7.5 percent for municipalities within which sales tax revenues exceed the adjusted county 196 average, nor less than 12.5 percent for municipalities within which sales tax revenues exceed the 197 adjusted county average by at least twenty-five percent.

(3) For purposes of applying the redistribution formula to a municipality which is partly within the county levying the tax, the distribution shall be calculated alternately for the municipality as a whole, except that the factor for annexed portion of the county shall not be applied to the portion of the municipality which is not within the county levying the tax, and for the portion of the municipality within the county levying the tax. Whichever calculation results in the larger distribution to the municipality shall be used.

204 (4) Notwithstanding any other provision of this section, the fifty percent of additional 205 sales taxes as described in section 99.845 arising from economic activities within the area of a 206 redevelopment project established after July 12, 1990, pursuant to sections 99.800 to 99.865, 207 while tax increment financing remains in effect shall be deducted from all calculations of 208 countywide sales taxes, shall be distributed directly to the municipality involved, and shall be 209 disregarded in calculating the amounts distributed or distributable to the municipality. Further, 210 any agreement, contract or covenant entered into prior to July 12, 1990, between a municipality 211 and any other political subdivision which provides for an appropriation of incremental sales tax 212 revenues to the special allocation fund of a tax increment financing project while tax increment 213 financing remains in effect shall continue to be in full force and effect and the sales taxes so 214 appropriated shall be deducted from all calculations of countywide sales taxes, shall be 215 distributed directly to the municipality involved, and shall be disregarded in calculating the 216 amounts distributed or distributable to the municipality. In addition, and notwithstanding any 217 other provision of this chapter to the contrary, economic development funds shall be distributed 218 in full to the municipality in which the sales producing them were deemed consummated.

219 Additionally, economic development funds shall be deducted from all calculations of countywide 220 sales taxes and shall be disregarded in calculating the amounts distributed or distributable to the 221 municipality. As used in this subdivision, the term "economic development funds" means the 222 amount of sales tax revenue generated in any fiscal year by projects authorized pursuant to 223 chapter 99 or chapter 100 in connection with which such sales tax revenue was pledged as 224 security for, or was guaranteed by a developer to be sufficient to pay, outstanding obligations 225 under any agreement authorized by chapter 100, entered into or adopted prior to September 1, 226 1993, between a municipality and another public body. After the adoption of the county 250 sales tax ordinance, any city, town or village in group A may by adoption of an ordinance by its 251 governing body cease to be a part of group A and become a part of group B. All sales taxes collected by the director of revenue under this section on behalf of any 68 county[, less one percent for cost of collection which shall be deposited in the state's general revenue fund after payment of premiums for surety bonds as provided in section 32.087,] shall 69 70 be deposited in a special trust fund, which is hereby created, to be known as the "County Law 71 Enforcement Sales Tax Trust Fund". 218 If a majority of the votes cast favor the extension, then the sales tax shall remain in effect at the 219 rate and for the time period approved by the voters. If a sales tax extension is not approved, the 220 district may submit another sales tax proposal as authorized in this section, but the district shall 221 not submit such a proposal to the voters sooner than twelve months from the date of the last 222 extension submitted.

223 [13.] 14. Once the sales tax authorized by this section is abolished or terminated by any 224 means, all funds remaining in the trust fund shall be used solely for the purposes approved in the 225 ballot question authorizing the sales tax. However, in no event shall a proposal pursuant to this section be submitted to the voters sooner than twelve months from the date of the last proposal pursuant to this section.

64 3. All revenue received by a city from the tax authorized under the provisions of this 65 section shall be deposited in a special trust fund and shall be used solely for improving the public 66 safety for such city for so long as the tax shall remain in effect.

4. Once the tax authorized by this section is abolished or is terminated by any means, all funds remaining in the special trust fund shall be used solely for improving the public safety for the city. Any funds in such special trust fund which are not needed for current expenditures may be invested by the governing body in accordance with applicable laws relating to the investment of other city funds.

72 5. All sales taxes collected by the director of the department of revenue under this 73 section on behalf of any city, less one percent for cost of collection which shall be deposited in 74 the state's general revenue fund after payment of premiums for surety bonds as provided in 75 section 32.087, shall be deposited in a special trust fund, which is hereby created, to be known 76 as the "City Public Safety Sales Tax Trust Fund". The moneys in the trust fund shall not be 77 deemed to be state funds and shall not be commingled with any funds of the state. The director of the department of revenue may make refunds from the amounts in the 90 trust fund and credited to any city for erroneous payments and overpayments made, and may 91 redeem dishonored checks and drafts deposited to the credit of such cities. If any city abolishes 92 the tax, the city shall notify the director of the department of revenue of the action at least ninety 93 days prior to the effective date of the repeal and the director of the department of revenue may 94 order retention in the trust fund, for a period of one year, of two percent of the amount collected 95 after receipt of such notice to cover possible refunds or overpayment of the tax and to redeem 96 dishonored checks and drafts deposited to the credit of such accounts. After one year has elapsed 97 after the effective date of abolition of the tax in such city, the director of the department of 98 revenue shall remit the balance in the account to the city and close the account of that city. The 99 director of the department of revenue shall notify each city of each instance of any amount 100 refunded or any check redeemed from receipts due the city.

410 [(7)] (52) "Load and leave", delivery to the purchaser by use of a tangible storage
 411 media if the tangible storage media is not physically transferred to the purchaser;

(53) "Maintains a place of business in this state" includes maintaining, occupying,
or using, permanently or temporarily, directly or indirectly, or through a subsidiary or
agent, by whatever name called, an office, place of distribution, sales or sample room or
place, warehouse or storage place, or other place of business;

416 (54) "Manufactured home", the same meaning as such term is defined under 417 section 700.010;

418 (55) "Mobile telecommunications service", the same meaning as such term is
419 defined under the Mobile Telecommunications Sourcing Act, Section 124(7) of Pub. L.
420 106-252;

421 (56) "Mobility-enhancing equipment", equipment, including repair and 422 replacement parts to the same, that:

423 (a) Is primarily and customarily used to provide or increase the ability to move
424 from one place to another and that is appropriate for use either in a home or motor
425 vehicle;

426 (b) Is not generally used by persons with normal mobility; and

427 (c) Is within the classification of devices eligible for MO HealthNet and Medicare

"Prewritten computer software" shall include 519 software designed and developed by the author or other creator to the specifications of a 520 specific purchaser if it is sold to a person other than the specific purchaser. If a person 521 modifies or enhances computer software of which the person is not the author or creator, 522 the person shall be deemed to be the author or creator only of such person's modifications 523 or enhancements. Prewritten computer software or a prewritten portion thereof that is 524 modified or enhanced to any degree, if such modification or enhancement is designed and 525 developed to the specifications of a specific purchaser, remains prewritten computer 526 software; provided that, such modification or enhancement shall not constitute prewritten 527 computer software where there is a reasonable, separately stated charge, invoice, or other 528 statement of the price given to the purchaser;

529 (73) "Private communication service", a telecommunications service that entitles 530 the customer to exclusive or priority use of a communications channel or group of channels 531 between or among termination points, regardless of the manner in which such channel or 532 channels are connected, and includes switching capacity, extension lines, stations, and any 533 other associated services that are provided in connection with the use of such channel or 534 channels;

535 (74) "Product-based exemption", an exemption based on the description of the 536 product and not based on who purchases the product or how the purchaser intends to use 537 the product;

538 (75) "Product which is intended to be sold ultimately for final use or consumption", 539 [means] tangible personal property[$_{7}$] or any service that is subject to state or local sales or use 540 taxes[$_{7}$] or any tax that is substantially equivalent thereto, in this state or any other state;

(1) For any discount offered by a seller that is a reduction of the sales price of 64 the product, the discounted sales price shall determine whether the sales price falls below 65 the price threshold provided in subsection 1 of this section. A coupon that reduces the sales 66 price shall be treated as a discount only if the seller is not reimbursed for the coupon 67 amount by a third party.

68 (2) If a discount applies to the total amount paid by a purchaser rather than to the 69 sales price of a particular product and the purchaser has purchased both exempt property 70 and taxable property, the seller shall allocate the discount based on the total sales prices 71 of the taxable property compared to the total sales prices of all property sold in the same 72 transaction.

8. Items that are normally sold as a single unit shall continue to be sold in that
manner and shall not be priced separately and sold as individual items.

9. Items that are purchased during an exemption period but that are not delivered to the purchaser until after the exemption period due to the item not being in stock shall qualify for an exemption. The provisions of this subsection shall not apply to an item that was delivered during an exemption period but was purchased prior to or after the exemption period.

10. (1) If a purchaser purchases an item of eligible property during an exemption
period but later exchanges the item for a similar eligible item after the exemption period,
no additional tax shall be due on the new item.

(2) If a purchaser purchases an item of eligible property during an exemption

144.105. 1. A seller shall be allowed a deduction from taxable sales for bad debts 2 attributable to taxable sales of such seller that have become uncollectable. Any deduction 3 taken that is attributed to bad debts shall not include interest.

4 2. The amount of the bad debt deduction shall be calculated under 26 U.S.C. 5 Section 166(b), except that such amount shall be adjusted to exclude financing charges or 6 interest, sales or use taxes charged on the purchase price, uncollectable amounts on 7 property that remain in the possession of the seller until the full purchase price is paid, and expenses incurred in attempting to collect any debt or repossessed property. 8

Bad debts may be deducted on the return for the period during which the bad 10 debt is written off as uncollectable in the seller's books and records and is eligible to be 11 deducted for federal income tax purposes. If the amount of bad debt exceeds the amount of taxable sales for the period 20 during which the bad debt is written off, a refund claim may be filed by the seller within 21 the applicable statute of limitations for refund claim; however, the statute of limitations 22 shall be measured from the due date of the return on which the bad debt could first be 23 claimed.

24 6. If filing responsibilities have been assumed by a certified service provider, such 25 service provider may claim, on behalf of the seller, any bad debt allowance provided by 26 this section. The certified service provider shall credit or refund the full amount of any 27 bad debt allowance or refund received to the seller.

28 7. For the purposes of reporting a payment received on a previously claimed bad 29 debt, any payments made on a debt or account shall first be applied proportionally to the 30 taxable price of the property or service and the sales tax thereon and secondly to interest, 31 service charges, and any other charges.

32 8. If the books and records of the seller or certified service provider on behalf of 33 the seller claiming the bad debt allowance support an allocation of the bad debts among 34 the member states, such an allocation shall be permitted.

144.108. 1. Service providers to model 1 sellers shall not be certified unless:

2 (1) The provider's system has been designed and tested to ensure the anonymity of 3 purchasers, unless otherwise required by law;

4 (2) Personally identifiable information is only used and retained to the extent 5 necessary for the administration of model 1 sellers with respect to exempt purchasers, and 6 for the identification of taxing jurisdictions;

7 (3) The provider provides consumers with clear and conspicuous notice of its information practices, including what information it collects; how it collects such 8 9 information; how it uses such information; how long, if at all, it retains such information; 10 and whether it discloses such information to the department of revenue or the state. Such notice shall be satisfied by a written privacy policy statement accessible by the public on 11 12 the certified service provider's website;

13 (4) The provider's collection, use, and retention of personally identifiable information is limited to that required by the department of revenue to ensure the validity 14 15 of exemptions from taxation that are claimed by reason of a purchaser's status or the 16 intended use of the goods or services purchased, and for the documentation of correct 17 assignment of taxing jurisdictions; and

18 (5) The provider provides adequate technical, physical, and administrative safeguards in order to protect personally identifiable information from unauthorized 19 access and disclosure. 20

21 2. (1) When any personally identifiable information that has been collected and 22 retained is no longer required for the purposes set forth in subdivision (4) of subsection 1 23 of this section, such information shall no longer be retained by the department of revenue.

24 (2) When personally identifiable information regarding an individual is retained 25 by or on behalf of the department of revenue, the department shall provide reasonable 26 access by such individual to his or her own information in the state's possession, as well as 27 a right to correct any inaccurately recorded information.

28 (3) If anyone other than the department of revenue, or a person authorized by the 29 department, seeks to discover personally identifiable information of an individual, the

department shall make a reasonable and timely effort to notify the individual of such
 request.

32 **3.** The attorney general for the state of Missouri shall have the power to enforce the 33 provisions of this section.

144.109. 1. The department of revenue shall review software submitted to the streamlined sales and use tax governing board for certification as a certified automated 2 system (CAS) under Section 501 of the streamlined sales and use tax agreement. Such 3 4 reviewshall include a review to determine that the program adequately classifies the state's product-based exemptions. Upon completion of the review, the department shall certify 5 to the governing board its acceptance of the classifications made by the system. 3. If the department of revenue determines that an item or transaction is incorrectly classified as to its taxability, it shall notify the CSP or model 2 seller of the incorrect classification. The CSP or model 2 seller shall have ten days to revise the classification after receipt of notice from the department of the determination. Upon expiration of the ten days, such CSP or model 2 seller shall be liable for failure to collect the correct amount of sales or use taxes due and owing to the state.

144.111. 1. (1) All retail sales in this state, excluding leases and rentals, of tangible personal property or digital goods shall be sourced to the location where the order is received by the seller.

(2) This subsection shall apply only if:

5 (a) The location where the order is received by the seller and the location where the 6 purchaser receives the product are both in this state;

7 (b) The location where receipt of the product occurs is determined in accordance 8 with subsection 2 of this section; and

An order is "received" when all of the 34 information from the purchaser necessary to determine whether the order can be accepted 35 has been received by or on behalf of the seller. The location from which a product is shipped shall not be used in determining the location where the order is received by the 36 37 seller.

(6) If taxable services are sold with tangible personal property or digital products
under a single contract or in the same transaction, are billed on the same billing statement
or statements, and, because of the application of this section, would be sourced to different
jurisdictions, this subsection shall apply to determine the source for tax.

42 **2.** Except as provided under section 144.112, if the location where the order is 43 received by the seller and the location where the product is received by the purchaser or

44 the purchaser's donee, as designated by the purchaser, are in different states, then the 45 retail sale, excluding lease or rental, of a product shall be sourced as follows:

46 (1) If the product is received by the purchaser at a business location of the seller, 47 the sale shall be sourced to such business location;

8 (2) If the purchaser provides the permit, certificate, or statement referred to in 9 paragraph (a) or (b) of subdivision (1) of subsection 1 of this section, the seller, in the 10 absence of bad faith, is relieved of all obligations to collect, pay, or remit any tax on any 11 transaction involving advertising and promotional direct mail to which the permit, 12 certificate, or statement applies. The purchaser shall source the sale to the jurisdictions 13 to which the advertising and promotional direct mail is to be delivered to the recipients and 14 shall report and pay any applicable tax due.

In the absence of bad faith, the seller is relieved of any further obligation to collect any additional tax on the sale of advertising and promotional direct mail if the seller has sourced the sale according to the delivery information provided by the purchaser.

(4) If the purchaser does not provide the seller with any of the items listed in paragraph (a), (b), or (c) of subdivision (1) of subsection 1 of this section, the sale shall be sourced according to subdivision (5) of subsection 2 of section 144.111. The state to which the advertising and promotional direct mail is delivered may disallow credit for tax paid on sales sourced under this subdivision.

27 (5) Notwithstanding section 144.111, this subsection shall apply to sales of 28 advertising and promotional direct mail.

2. (1) Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, sales of other direct mail are

Notwithstanding subdivision (1) of this subsection, the sale shall be sourced to the jurisdictions to which the other direct mail is to be delivered to the recipients, and the purchaser shall report and pay applicable tax due.

3. (1) (a) This section applies to a transaction characterized under state law as the
 sale of services only if the service is an integral part of the production and distribution of
 printed material that meets the definition of direct mail; and

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5. The sale of ancillary service is sourced to the customer's place of primary use.

144.123. 1. The director of revenue shall provide and maintain a database that describes boundary changes for all taxing jurisdictions and the effective dates of such 2 3 changes for sales and use tax purposes.

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2. The director of revenue shall provide and maintain a database of all sales and use tax rates for all taxing jurisdictions. For the identification of counties and cities, codes 5 corresponding to the rates shall be provided according to Federal Information Processing 6 7 Standards (FIPS) as developed by the National Institute of Standards and Technology. For 8 the identification of all other jurisdictions, codes corresponding to the rates shall be in a 9 format determined by the director.

10 3. The director of revenue shall provide and maintain a database that assigns the 11 proper tax rates and jurisdictions to each five- and nine-digit zip code within this state. 12 The lowest combined tax rate imposed in the zip code area shall apply if the area includes 13 more than one tax rate in any level of taxing jurisdiction. The database records shall be in the same approved format 25 as the database records required under subsection 3 of this section and shall meet the 26 requirements developed under the federal Mobile Telecommunications Sourcing Act, 4 27 U.S.C. Section 119(a). If the director develops address-based assignment database records 28 under the agreement, sellers that register under the agreement shall be required to use 29 such database records. If a 31 seller or CSP is unable to determine the applicable rate and jurisdiction using an address-32 based database record after exercising due diligence, the seller or CSP may apply the nine-33 digit zip code designation applicable to a transaction. If a nine-digit zip code designation 34 is not available for a street address or if a seller or CSP is unable to determine the ninedigit zip code designation applicable to a transaction after exercising due diligence to 35

36 determine the designation, the seller or CSP may apply the rate for the five-digit zip code 37 area. For the purposes of this section, there shall be a rebuttable presumption that a seller 38 or CSP has exercised due diligence if the seller or CSP has attempted to determine the tax 39 rate and jurisdiction by utilizing software approved by the director and makes the 40 assignment from the address and zip code information applicable to the transaction. If the director has met the requirements of subsection 3 of this section, the director may also elect 41 42 to certify vendor-provided address-based databases for assigning tax rates and 43 jurisdictions. The databases shall be in the same approved format as the database records 44 under this section and meet the requirements developed under the federal Mobile Telecommunications Sourcing Act, 4 U.S.C. Section 119(a). If the director certifies a 45 vendor-provided address-based database, a seller or CSP may use such database in place 46 47 of the database provided for in this subsection.

48 5. The electronic databases provided for in subsections 1 to 4 of this section shall 49 be in downloadable format as determined by the director of revenue. The databases shall be 53 provided at no cost to users. No seller or CSP shall be liable for reliance upon erroneous data provided by the director of revenue on tax rates, boundaries, or taxing jurisdiction assignments. 56

144.124. 1. The director of revenue shall complete a taxability matrix. The state's entries in the matrix shall be provided and maintained by the director in a database that is in a downloadable format.

4 **2.** The director of revenue shall provide reasonable notice of changes in the 5 taxability of the products or services listed in the taxability matrix.

6 **3.** A seller or certified service provider (CSP) shall be relieved from liability to this 7 state or any local taxing jurisdiction for having charged and collected the incorrect amount 8 of state or local sales or use tax resulting from such seller's or CSP's reliance upon 9 erroneous data provided by the director of revenue in the taxability matrix.

144.125. 1. (1) Amnesty shall be granted for uncollected or unpaid sales or use tax to a seller who registers to pay or to collect and remit applicable sales or use tax on sales made to purchasers in this state in accordance with the terms of the streamlined sales and use tax agreement, provided that the seller was not so registered in this state in the twelvemonth period preceding the effective date of this state's participation in the agreement.

6 (2) Amnesty shall preclude assessment for uncollected or unpaid sales or use tax 7 together with penalty or interest for sales made during the period the seller was not registered in this state, provided registration occurs within twelve months of the effective 8 9 date of this state's participation in the agreement.

10 (3) Amnesty shall be provided if this state joins the agreement after the seller has registered. 11

12 2. Amnesty shall not be available to a seller with respect to any matter or matters 13 for which the seller received notice of the commencement of an audit and for which the 14 audit is not yet finally resolved, including any related administrative and judicial processes. The amnesty shall not be available for sales or use taxes already paid or 15 16 remitted to this state or to taxes collected by the seller.

17 3. Amnesty provided under this section shall be fully effective, absent the seller's 18 fraud or intentional misrepresentation of a material fact, if the seller continues registration 19 and payment or collection and remittance of applicable sales or use taxes for a period of 20 at least thirty-six months. The statute of limitations applicable to asserting a tax liability 21 during this thirty-six-month period shall be tolled.

22 4. Amnesty provided under this section shall be applicable only to sales or use taxes 23 due from a seller in its capacity as a seller and not to sales or use taxes due from a seller in 24 its capacity as a purchaser.

25 5. The provisions of this section shall become effective as of the date that this state 26 joins and becomes a member state of the agreement.

144.140. 1. From every remittance to the director of revenue made on or before the date when the same becomes due, the person required to remit the same shall be entitled to deduct and 2 retain an amount equal to two percent thereof. 3

4 2. If the director of revenue enters into the streamlined sales and use tax agreement 5 under section 32.070, the director shall provide a monetary allowance from the taxes 6 collected to each of the following:

7 (1) A certified service provider, in accordance with the agreement and under the 8 terms of the contract signed with the provider;

9 (2) Any vendor registered under the agreement that selects a certified automated 10 system to perform part of its sales or use tax functions; and

11 (3) Any vendor registered under the agreement that uses a proprietary system to 12 calculate taxes due and has entered into a performance agreement with states that are 13 members of the streamlined sales and use tax agreement.

Any vendor receiving an allowance under subsection 2 of this section shall not

144.190. 1. If a tax has been incorrectly computed by reason of a clerical error or mistake on the part of the director of revenue, such fact shall be set forth in the records of the director of revenue, and the amount of the overpayment shall be credited on any taxes then due from the person legally obligated to remit the tax under chapter 144, and the balance shall be refunded to the person legally obligated to remit the tax, such person's administrators or executors, as provided for in section 144.200.

2. If any tax, penalty or interest has been paid more than once, or has been erroneously or illegally collected, or has been erroneously or illegally computed, such sum shall be credited on any taxes then due from the person legally obligated to remit the tax under chapter 144, and the balance, with interest as determined by section 32.065, shall be refunded to the person legally obligated to remit the tax, but no such credit or refund shall be allowed unless duplicate copies of a claim for refund are filed within ten years from date of overpayment.

3. Every claim for refund must be in writing and signed by the applicant, and must state the specific grounds upon which the claim is founded. Any refund or any portion thereof which is erroneously made, and any credit or any portion thereof which is erroneously allowed, may be recovered in any action brought by the director of revenue against the person legally obligated to remit the tax. In the event that a tax has been illegally imposed against a person legally obligated to remit the tax, the director of revenue shall authorize the cancellation of the tax upon the director's record.

4. Notwithstanding the provisions of section 32.057, a purchaser that originally paid sales or use tax to a vendor or seller may submit a refund claim directly to the director of revenue for such sales or use taxes paid to such vendor or seller and remitted to the director, provided no sum shall be refunded more than once, any such claim shall be subject to any offset, defense, or other claim the director otherwise would have against either the purchaser or vendor or seller, and such claim for refund is accompanied by either:

(1) A notarized assignment of rights statement by the vendor or seller to the purchaser allowing the purchaser to seek the refund on behalf of the vendor or seller. An assignment of rights statement shall contain the Missouri sales or use tax registration number of the vendor or seller, a list of the transactions covered by the assignment, the tax periods and location for which the original sale was reported to the director of revenue by the vendor or seller, and a notarized statement signed by the vendor or seller affirming that the vendor or seller has not received a refund or credit, will not apply for a refund or credit of the tax collected on any transactions

33 covered by the assignment, and authorizes the director to amend the seller's return to reflect the 34 refund; or

35 (2) In the event the vendor or seller fails or refuses to provide an assignment of rights 36 statement within sixty days from the date of such purchaser's written request to the vendor or 37 seller, or the purchaser is not able to locate the vendor or seller or the vendor or seller is no 38 longer in business, the purchaser may provide the director a notarized statement confirming the 39 efforts that have been made to obtain an assignment of rights from the vendor or seller. Such 40 statement shall contain a list of the transactions covered by the assignment, the tax periods and 41 location for which the original sale was reported to the director of revenue by the vendor or 42 seller.

44 The director shall not require such vendor, seller, or purchaser to submit amended returns for 45 refund claims submitted under the provisions of this subsection. Notwithstanding the provisions 46 of section 32.057, if the seller is registered with the director for collection and remittance of sales 47 tax, the director shall notify the seller at the seller's last known address of the claim for refund. 48 If the seller objects to the refund within thirty days of the date of the notice, the director shall not 49 pay the refund. If the seller agrees that the refund is warranted or fails to respond within thirty 50 days, the director may issue the refund and amend the seller's return to reflect the refund. For 51 purposes of section 32.069, the refund claim shall not be considered to have been filed until the 52 seller agrees that the refund is warranted or thirty days after the date the director notified the 53 seller and the seller failed to respond.

Notwithstanding the provisions of section 32.057, when a vendor files a refund claim 55 on behalf of a purchaser and such refund claim is denied by the director, notice of such denial 56 and the reason for the denial shall be sent by the director to the vendor and each purchaser whose 57 name and address is submitted with the refund claim form filed by the vendor. Notwithstanding the provisions of this section, the director of revenue shall authorize 67 direct-pay agreements to purchasers which have annual purchases in excess of seven hundred 68 fifty thousand dollars pursuant to rules and regulations adopted by the director of revenue. For 69 the purposes of such direct-pay agreements, the taxes authorized under chapters 66, 67, 70, 92,

94, 162, 190, 238, 321, and 644 shall be remitted based upon the location of the place of businessof the purchaser.

72 7. Special rules applicable to error corrections requested by customers of mobile 73 telecommunications service are as follows:

(1) For purposes of this subsection, the terms "customer", "home service provider",
"place of primary use", "electronic database", and "enhanced zip code" shall have the same
meanings as defined in the Mobile Telecommunications Sourcing Act incorporated by reference
in section 144.013;

78 (2)Notwithstanding the provisions of this section, if a customer of mobile 79 telecommunications services believes that the amount of tax, the assignment of place of primary 80 use or the taxing jurisdiction included on a billing is erroneous, the customer shall notify the 81 home service provider, in writing, within three years from the date of the billing statement. The 82 customer shall include in such written notification the street address for the customer's place of 83 primary use, the account name and number for which the customer seeks a correction of the tax 84 assignment, a description of the error asserted by the customer and any other information the 85 home service provider reasonably requires to process the request;

86 (3) Within sixty days of receiving the customer's notice, the home service provider shall 87 review its records and the electronic database or enhanced zip code to determine the customer's 88 correct taxing jurisdiction. If the home service provider determines that the review shows that 89 the amount of tax, assignment of place of primary use or taxing jurisdiction is in error, the home 90 service provider shall correct the error and, at its election, either refund or credit the amount of 91 tax erroneously collected to the customer for a period of up to three years from the last day of 92 the home service provider's sixty-day review period. If the home service provider determines 93 that the review shows that the amount of tax, the assignment of place of primary use or the taxing 94 jurisdiction is correct, the home service provider shall provide a written explanation of its 95 determination to the customer.

8. For all refund claims submitted to the department of revenue on or after September 96 97 1, 2003, notwithstanding any provision of this section to the contrary, if a person legally 98 obligated to remit the tax levied under chapter 144 has received a refund of such taxes for a 99 specific issue and submits a subsequent claim for refund of such taxes on the same issue for a 100 tax period beginning on or after the date the original refund check issued to such person, no 101 refund shall be allowed. This subsection shall not apply and a refund shall be allowed if the 102 refund claim is filed by a purchaser under the provisions of subsection 4 of this section, the 103 refund claim is for use tax remitted by the purchaser, or an additional refund claim is filed by a 104 person legally obligated to remit the tax due to any of the following:

105 (1) Receipt of additional information or an exemption certificate from the purchaser of 106 the item at issue;

Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, the director of revenue shall 111 respond to a request for a binding letter ruling filed in accordance with section 536.021 within 112 sixty days of receipt of such request. 123 **11.** A cause of action against the seller by a purchaser for a tax erroneously or 124 illegally collected under this chapter does not accrue until a purchaser has provided 125 written notice to a seller and the seller has had sixty days to respond. (2) Maintains an office, distribution facility, warehouse, or storage place, or similar
 place of business in this state to facilitate the delivery of property or services sold by the

17 (3) Delivers, installs, assembles, or performs maintenance services for the vendor's
 18 customers within this state;

(4) Facilitates the vendor's delivery of property to customers in this state by
allowing the vendor's customers to pick up property sold by the vendor at an office,
distribution facility, warehouse, storage place, or similar place of business maintained by
the person in this state; or

(5) Conducts any other activities in this state that are significantly associated with
 the vendor's ability to establish and maintain a market in this state for sales.

25 **3.** The presumption in subsection 2 may be rebutted by demonstrating that the 26 person's activities in this state are not significantly associated with the vendor's ability to 27 establish or maintain a market in this state for the vendor's sales.

Notwithstanding subsection 2 or 3 of this section, a vendor shall be presumed to 29 engage in business activities within this state if the vendor enters into an agreement with 30 one or more residents of this state under which the resident, for a commission or other 31 consideration, directly or indirectly refers potential customers, whether by a link on a 32 website, an in-person oral presentation, telemarketing, or otherwise, to the vendor, if the 33 cumulative gross receipts from sales by the vendor to customers in this state who are 34 referred to the vendor by all residents with this type of an agreement with the vendor 35 exceeds ten thousand dollars during the preceding twelve months.

5. The presumption in subsection 4 may be rebutted by submitting proof that the residents with whom the vendor has an agreement did not engage in any activity within this state that was significantly associated with the vendor's ability to establish or maintain the vendor's market in this state during the preceding twelve months. Such proof may consist of sworn written statements from all of the residents with whom the vendor has an

41 agreement stating that they did not engage in any solicitation in this state on behalf of the

42 vendor during the preceding year, provided that such statements were provided and 43 obtained in good faith.

144.655. 1. Every vendor, on or before the last day of the month following each calendar quarterly period of three months, shall file with the director of revenue a return of all taxes 2 collected for the preceding quarter in the form prescribed by the director of revenue, showing the 3 total sales price of the tangible personal property sold by the vendor, the storage, use or 4 5 consumption of which is subject to the tax levied by this law, and other information the director 6 of revenue deems necessary. The return shall be accompanied by a remittance of the amount of the tax required to be collected by the vendor during the period covered by the return. Returns 7 8 shall be signed by the vendor or the vendor's authorized agent. The return shall be filed and the taxes paid on or before January thirty-first of the succeeding year.
