# **HOUSE BILL NO. 2008**

### 101ST GENERAL ASSEMBLY

#### INTRODUCED BY REPRESENTATIVE SCHWADRON.

## AN ACT

To repeal sections 160.011 and 170.231, RSMo, and to enact in lieu thereof two new sections relating to materials used for instruction.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the state of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Sections 160.011 and 170.231, RSMo, are repealed and two new sections enacted in lieu thereof, to be known as sections 160.011 and 170.231, to read as follows:

160.011. As used in chapters 160, 161, 162, 163, 164, 165, 167, 168, 170, 171, 177 and 178, the following terms mean:

- 3 (1) "District" or "school district", when used alone, may include seven-director, urban, and metropolitan school districts;
- (2) "Educational activity", includes, but is not limited to, an assembly, guest 6 lecture, or other educational event facilitated by the school board or school board employees including, but not limited to, an educational event conducted by individuals or organizations that are not associated with the school board. "Educational activity" does not include presentations given by pupils;
- (3) "Elementary school", a public school giving instruction in a grade or grades not 10 higher than the eighth grade; 11
- 12 [(3)] (4) "Family literacy programs", services of sufficient intensity in terms of hours, and of sufficient duration, to make sustainable changes in families that include: 13
  - (a) Interactive literacy activities between parents and their children;
- 15 (b) Training of parents regarding how to be the primary teacher of their children and full partners in the education of their children;

EXPLANATION — Matter enclosed in bold-faced brackets [thus] in the above bill is not enacted and is intended to be omitted from the law. Matter in **bold-face** type in the above bill is proposed language.

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17 (c) Parent literacy training that leads to high school completion and economic self 18 sufficiency; and

(d) An age-appropriate education to prepare children of all ages for success in school;

- [(4)] (5) "Graduation rate", the quotient of the number of graduates in the current year as of June thirtieth divided by the sum of the number of graduates in the current year as of June thirtieth plus the number of twelfth graders who dropped out in the current year plus the number of eleventh graders who dropped out in the preceding year plus the number of tenth graders who dropped out in the second preceding year plus the number of ninth graders who dropped out in the third preceding year;
- [(5)] (6) "High school", a public school giving instruction in a grade or grades not lower than the ninth nor higher than the twelfth grade;
- [(6)] (7) "Metropolitan school district", any school district the boundaries of which are coterminous with the limits of any city which is not within a county;
- [(7)] (8) "Public school" includes all elementary and high schools operated at public expense;
- 32 [(8)] (9) "School board", the board of education having general control of the 33 property and affairs of any school district;
  - [(9)] (10) "School term", a minimum of one hundred seventy-four school days, as that term is defined in section 160.041, for schools with a five-day school week or a minimum of one hundred forty-two school days, as that term is defined in section 160.041, for schools with a four-day school week, and one thousand forty-four hours of actual pupil attendance as scheduled by the board pursuant to section 171.031 during a twelve-month period in which the academic instruction of pupils is actually and regularly carried on for a group of students in the public schools of any school district. In school year 2019-20 and subsequent years, one thousand forty-four hours of actual pupil attendance shall be required with no minimum number of school days required. A school term may be within a school year or may consist of parts of two consecutive school years, but does not include summer school. A district may choose to operate two or more terms for different groups of children. A school term for students participating in a school flex program as established in section 160.539 may consist of a combination of actual pupil attendance and attendance at college or technical career education or approved employment aligned with the student's career academic plan for a total of the required number of hours as provided in this subdivision;
    - [(10)] (11) "Secretary", the secretary of the board of a school district;
  - [(11)] (12) "Seven-director district", any school district which has seven directors and includes urban districts regardless of the number of directors an urban district may have unless otherwise provided by law;

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"Taxpayer", any individual who has paid taxes to the state or any 53  $[\frac{(12)}{(13)}]$ 54 subdivision thereof within the immediately preceding twelve-month period or the spouse of 55 such individual:

- [(13)] (14) "Town", any town or village, whether or not incorporated, the plat of which has been filed in the office of the recorder of deeds of the county in which it is situated;
- [(14)] (15) "Urban school district", any district which includes more than half of the population or land area of any city which has not less than seventy thousand inhabitants, other than a city which is not within a county;
- (16) "Used for pupil instruction", a learning material or educational activity that is, or is planned to be, any of the following during the school year:
- (a) Assigned, distributed, or otherwise presented to pupils in a course for which pupils receive credit;
- (b) Assigned, distributed, or otherwise presented to pupils if the use of the learning material or participation in the educational activity is required by the school;
- (c) Assigned, distributed, or otherwise presented to pupils and at least a majority of pupils in a grade level are expected to use the learning material or participate in the educational activity;
- (d) Among learning materials from which pupils are required to select one or more materials if the available selection of learning materials is restricted to specific titles; or
- (e) Created by the school board or a teacher employed by the school board 74 including, but not limited to, lesson plans, presentations, and videos.
- 170.231. 1. The school board of each school district shall provide that all public 2 school instructional material intended for use in connection with any public school classroom 3 instruction, or any public school research or experimentation program or project, shall be 4 available for inspection by any person. For the purpose of this section, "classroom 5 instruction" shall mean any public school instruction involving teachers and students or peers and students; "research or experimentation program or project" shall mean any public school research or experimentation program or project designed to explore or develop new and unproven teaching methods and techniques.
  - 2. (1) The school board of each school district shall prominently post on the home page of the school board's website, in such a manner that the information is available to the public, a list of the following:
  - (a) The learning materials and educational activities that will be used for pupil instruction at each school in the school district during the school year, organized by subject area, grade level, and teacher; and

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- **(b)** Any procedures or policies in effect for the documentation, review, or approval of learning materials or educational activities used for pupil instruction and 17 for the documentation, review, or approval by principals; administrators; teachers; school board members; or a committee created by the school board, an administrator, 19 or a principal.
- 20 (2) The list posted under subdivision (1) of this subsection shall include at least 21 all of the following for each item posted:
  - (a) Bibliographic information necessary to identify specific learning materials including, but not limited to, textbooks and curricula, and educational activities used for pupil instruction. Such bibliographic information shall include at least the title, author, organization, and any website associated with each specific learning material or educational activity;
  - (b) The full text or a copy of any learning materials or educational activities created by the school board or a teacher employed by the school board including, but not limited to, lesson plans, presentations, and videos; and
  - (c) An internet link to any curricula adopted by the school board to comply with the school board's duties under paragraph (b) of this subdivision or any other requirement under state law.
  - (3) Each school board shall update the list posted under subdivision (1) of this subsection at least twice each school year. Each school board shall perform the first update before the first day of the school term and perform another update between January first and January fifteenth. Each school board shall notify parents and guardians that the list has been updated by posting a notice on the school board's website and providing notice in a newsletter or other written communication that is regularly distributed to parents and guardians.
  - (4) Each school board shall ensure that each list posted under subdivision (1) of this section remains available to the public on the school board's website for at least five years after the date the list is first posted on the school board's website.
    - (5) This subsection shall not be construed to require a school board to:
  - (a) Digitally reproduce learning materials other than learning materials created by a teacher employed by the school board; or
  - (b) Post or distribute a learning material or educational activity in a manner that would constitute an infringement of copyright under the federal Copyright Act of 1976 (17 U.S.C. Section 101 et seq.), as amended.
  - (6) A resident of a school district that is governed by a school board may bring an action for injunctive relief or a writ of mandamus in the circuit court with jurisdiction over the school district to compel the school board to comply with this

- attorney's fees not to exceed fifteen thousand dollars.
