AN ACT

To amend chapter 170, RSMo, by adding thereto one new section relating to instruction in public schools about genocide.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the state of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Chapter 170, RSMo, is amended by adding thereto one new section, to be 2 known as section 170.347, to read as follows:

170.347. 1. As used in this section, the term "holocaust" means the period from
1933 through 1945 when six million Jews and millions of others were murdered by Nazi
Germany and its collaborators as part of a structured, state-sanctioned program of
genocide.

5 2. The department of elementary and secondary education shall develop a program 6 of instruction about the holocaust and genocide. Beginning in the 2021-22 school year,

7 each school district and charter school shall provide such instruction to its students.

3. Instruction required under this section shall be designed to:

- 9 (1) Enable students to evaluate the morality of the holocaust, genocide, and similar 10 acts of mass violence and to reflect on the causes of related historical events;
- 11 (2) Develop students' respect for cultural diversity and help students gain insight 12 into the importance of the protection of international human rights for all people;
- (3) Promote students' understanding of how the holocaust revealed the need for the
 term "genocide" and led to international legislation that recognized genocide as a crime;
 (4) Stimulate students' reflection on the roles and responsibilities of citizens in
- 16 democratic societies to combat misinformation, indifference, and discrimination through
- 17 tools of resistance such as protest, reform, and celebration;

EXPLANATION — Matter enclosed in bold-faced brackets [thus] in the above bill is not enacted and is intended to be omitted from the law. Matter in **bold-face** type in the above bill is proposed language.

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(5) Provide students with opportunities to view in-context and analyze patterns of
 human behavior by individuals and groups that belong in one or more categories,
 including perpetrator, collaborator, bystander, victim, and rescuer;

- (6) Enable students to understand the ramifications of prejudice, racism, and
 stereotyping;
- (7) Preserve the memories of survivors of genocide and provide opportunities for
 students to discuss and honor survivors' cultural legacies;
- (8) Provide students with a foundation for examining the history of discrimination
 in this state; and
- (9) Explore the various mechanisms of transitional and restorative justice that help
 humanity continue in the aftermath of genocide.
